Texans Topple Oklahoma

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Substitute quarterback Vince Matthews led a dramatic Texas charge with only three minutes to go Saturday to fell mighty Oklahoma 15-14.

Matthews passed the Longhorns over most of 70 yards of a desperate touchdown drive and Bobby Lackey, the regular Texas quarterback, came in to pass for the touchdown—and kick the extra point that knocked down the nation's No. 2 team...

More than 76,000 fans jammed into the Cotton Bowl and watched the struggle that found Texas leading for three quarters, Oklahoma taking back the lead on the grab of a Texas handoff, fumbled in the air, by Sooner guard Jim Davis, who lumbered 24 yards to a touchdown...

The deciding Texas touchdown was made on a pass from the busy Lackey to end Bob Bryant on the Oklahoma 5-yard line. The stands were hushed as the tall Longhorn quarterback stepped to the line and plunked the ball between the goal posts. Then pandemonium broke loose.

Texas scored a touchdown in the second period on a 10-yard pass from the left-handed Rene Ramirez to George Blanch. Don Allen, Texas fullback, ran across the conversion to make the score 8-0.

Oklahoma got a touchdown on a 5-yard run by Dickey Carpenter in the third quarter. In the fourth quarter, Texas had the ball on its 24, where it had taken over. Lackey handed off to Texas fullback Mike Dowdle, who fumbled in the air when hit by Jerry Thompson, the Oklahoma left guard, and Davis grabbed the ball and ran to the touchdown. Boyd passed to Tillery for the extra points.

But the story doesn't end there. Hornberger's tee shot on the 240-yard third hole hooked into the rough. Sure enough, the sea gull again closed in on the ball. The gull swooped up over the green before realizing it had made the same mistake twice, then dropped the ball about 10 feet from the pin.

Hornberger got his birdie. Two very good football quotes from last weekend's play: From Ron Stover, Oregon All-American end candidate after Oklahoma's 6-0 win over the Webbs: "These guys (Oklahoma) really were fast—all of them. But we were pretty well prepared for anything they tried. Man, everybody down there has a draw. One tackle kept asking me, 'You all coming my way this time?' I did, but he kept asking. It was a real tough game all the way. After it was over, everybody said to us, 'You all sure played a heck of a ball game.'"

From Ed Henke of the San Francisco Chronicle: "The Bears, winning their second in a row for Coach Pete Elliott, had a 26-0 lead midway in the third quarter when the third and fourth stringers went in to complete the game."

Quarterback Joe Kapp sparked the California pass attack to the first two touchdowns with sophomore fullback Billy Patton going three yards for each score. Fullback Walt Arnold plunged a yard for the third Cal score. The fourth touchdown came on a 68-yard run by tackle Frank Sully who grabbed a Lee Grosscup pass on his own 32.

With Willie Shoemaker in the saddle, the hard-hitting, 4-year-old from Travis M. Kerr's stable boosted his total earnings to \$1,336,364 with first money of \$73,259. He supplanted Nashua as the world's richest thoroughbred. Nashua won \$1,208,565 before retiring.

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Oregon Clobbers USC Rebs

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon's rugged defense smothered Southern California 25-0 Saturday night, and Oregon took over the lead in the Pacific Coast Conference.

Southern California got into Oregon territory only four times, and never pierced deeper than the Oregon 24. Oregon took over on the deepest drive as a hard tackle jarred the ball loose from halfback Rex Johnson.

Oregon scored the first time it got the ball. The Ducks took the opening kickoff, ran two plays into the line, and needed only two more yards for a first down.

Southern California braced for the expected line plunge, but it never came. Halfback Willie West dashed around right end. He got a key block from quarterback Dave Gross and went 66 yards to a touchdown.

The winners added a short field goal by John Clarke in the second quarter, and then ran up two more touchdowns in the fourth period.

One came on a 60-yard march with Gross plunging the final two yards. The other was produced by Oregon reserves, a 49-yard march with a 34-yard pass from quarterback Sandy Fraser to halfback Len Read providing the score.

The issue never was in doubt after the first touchdown. The Oregon defense stopped Southern California cold, jarring the ball loose from Trojan backs four times.

There had been pre-game speculation that Southern California's beely line might turn the tide against the team that went to the Rose Bowl last season.

But the Trojan line showed to advantage only in the first quarter. Twice the Trojans punched over the middle stripe. The first time the visitors got only to the 44, there being forced to punt.

The next time USC got to the Oregon 35, where the first of their fumbles stopped the Trojans.

The Trojans emerged from their own territory again in the closing seconds of the third quarter. They opened the third period by driving 42 yards before Johnson's fumble stopped the Trojans on the Oregon 24.

Against Oregon reserves, USC later moved to the Oregon 47 just before the final gun.

Oregon, which had marched 72 yards to set up a four-yard field goal in the second period, opened a 60-yard drive late in the third quarter. West came up with the key play.

Oregon was on the Trojan 18, fourth down and needing 10 yards. West, just as on his earlier scoring jaunt, burst around right end. A desperation lunge by two Trojans knocked him out of bounds on the three.

A crowd of 32,734 watched Oregon earn its second conference victory against no defeats. The only other team with an unsullied conference record is California, which has one victory.

Tribe Upsets Washington In PCC Fray

STANFORD, Calif. (AP)—Stanford's power-packed halfback Rick McMillen staged a running show, including two touchdowns, as the Indians opened their Pacific Coast Conference campaign Saturday by whipping favored Washington 22-12.

The 186-pound junior, who was moved into the starting spot this week by Coach Jack Curtice in seeking his first triumph of the season, scored on runs of 5 and 20 yards.

He set up the third touchdown by taking a pass on a 15-yard play and carrying to the Washington 1. From there quarterback Bob Nicolet pitched a short pass to John Bond for the touchdown.

A crowd of 25,000 under sunny skies saw Washington take a 12-7 halftime lead after two fumbles, both at the Washington six, ruined a pair of long Stanford drives.

The Indians came back in the second half, capitalizing on a pass interception and a Washington fumble to score twice again.

Skip Face booted the first two Stanford conversions and Nicolet passed to Chris Burford for two points after the third touchdown.

Sophomore left half Dick Nicholl, starting because of injuries to Luther Carr and George Flemming, scored first for Washington on a smash off guard. Fleming went in for the conversion—missed the kick.

In the second period, McMillen scored on his 5-yard run but Washington went ahead on quarterback Bob Hivner's 2-yard run for a touchdown, capping a 63-yard drive. It included 39 yards on a pass interception call to the Stanford 21.

Round Table Money Leader

LA GRANDE—The Oregon Tech Owls from Klamath Falls kept their 1958 Oregon Collegiate Conference football slate clean here Saturday night, thanks to a pair of long touchdown passes that sparked a second half comeback which sank the hopes of an Eastern Oregon College upset.

The Owls, winning their second straight OCC game, dumped the Mountaineers 27-6. But to notch the victory, coach Rex Hunsaker's Owls had to snap a 6-all deadlock that opened the second half's play.

Eastern Oregon out-fought the visiting Tech gridders for nearly three periods of play, when the roof caved in on the Mounties. And the wrecking machine that helped the EOC cause tumble was the strong right arm of Owl quarterback Charlie Ganter.

Ganter threw two long touchdown passes, both coming in the fourth quarter with Tech leading 13-6 to break open the otherwise tight battle. The first heave came early in the last stanza when Ganter found end Ardel Hamilton in the clear behind EOC defenders for a play that covered 40 yards for the score.

The second long TD toss was to straight OCC game, dumped the Mountaineers 27-6. But to notch the victory, coach Rex Hunsaker's Owls had to snap a 6-all deadlock that opened the second half's play.

Eastern Oregon couldn't recover from these two lightning quick scores and were forced to be content with their second straight defeat in conference play.

The first OTI score came in the last minutes of the second quarter as they trailed 6-0. Al "Tiger" Everson carried the ball two yards to clinch a drive of 42 yards for the initial Tech tally. The placement attempt by Roy Johnson was blocked.

Eastern Oregon scored first on a two-yard plunge by halfback George Aliverti to cap a first quarter drive of 42 yards by the Mounties that took 12 plays. John Wilmarth, EOC fullback and the league's leading punter, carried the biggest share of this drive until he was injured on the play just prior to the Mountaineer score.

The Owls go-ahead touchdown came in the third period when fullback Allen Leach rolled around end from the nine-yard line to put the Tech machine in the lead for the first time in the conference battle. Leach's score was set up when Foster intercepted an Eastern Oregon pass on the Tech 45. Eleven plays later, Leach countered. Ganter ran over the extra point.

Leach, who returned to full physical strength this past week after a hip injury, ran for 90 yards, an average of 5.3 per carry to lead the Owl rushing attack. Ganter completed eight of 16 passes, good for 158 yards, the turning point in the game.
