Morse Vows 'No Let Up'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) said he will not let up on his criticism of Dulles-Eisenhower Far Eastern policy.

Morse, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, wired the committee chairman, Sen. Theodore F. Green (D-R.I.), "News reports reaching me are to the effect that Secretary Dulles yesterday urged that you try to persuade Democrats to confine to discussion with the President and Department of State their differences with the administration Chinese policy and not debate it in public."

"I wish to assure you that I shall continue to criticize the Eisenhower-Dulles foreign policy on the public platform because it is a matter the American people are entitled to have discussed freely and openly."

Morse urged Green to lead the Senate in debate on the Far Eastern policy.

Green said after his talk with Dulles only that the two agreed it would be "a serious mistake on the part of the Chinese Communists to misconstrue Democratic discussion as a sign of weakness."

SUMS UP CAREER ATLANTA (UPI) — The Rev. W. P. Allison today summed up his career as being "20 years in and out of jail."

He has been chaplain of the Fulton County Jail and prison camp since 1938 and is the only full-time county chaplain in the nation.

Pope's Requiem Services Continue In St. Peter's

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Requiem services for Pope Pius XII continued today before a symbolic coffin in St. Peter's Basilica as more cardinals arrived to elect his successor.

The late pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church was buried Monday in the grotto beneath St. Peter's. An empty coffin was placed in the church for mourning Masses that continue through Sunday.

The titular Bishop of Adana, Msgr. Diego Venini, stepped before the coffin in the Chapel of the Chorus and celebrated today's Mass.

The cardinals already in the Vatican later in the day were to receive members of the diplomatic corps accredited to the Holy See. Eugene Cardinal Tisserant, dean of the College of Cardinals, is presiding over their official functions until a new pope is chosen.

On Sunday, when the nine-day mourning period ends, the cardinals will receive special envoys of foreign governments paying their respects to the late Pope. The U.S. envoys will be Secretary of State Dulles, former Ambassador to Italy Clare Boothe Luce and John A. McCone, director of the Atomic Energy Commission.

About a dozen cardinals were expected to arrive today to join the 28 already in the Vatican. All but two of the 55 cardinals probably will be here for the conclave beginning Oct. 25 to elect a new pope. The two who won't make it are Alojzije Cardinal Stepinac of Yugoslavia and Josef Cardinal Mindszenty and Hungary.

Nudist Camp Pair Sought For Slaying

FRESNO, Calif. (AP)—A nudist camp couple was sought today as suspects in the murder of a camp caretaker.

An all-points bulletin went out Monday night for Jack and Sue Patterson, aged 35 and 42, suspected of fleeing in the 1947 black Plymouth coupe which belonged to the dead man, Guy P. Brenkman. He was 39-year-old former railway worker and World War I veteran who worked as a handyman at the Calypso nudist camp 25 miles northeast of here.

Brenkman was found Monday morning by Logan Bachar, operator of the camp. An autopsy showed he died of a fractured skull caused by two blows from some heavy metal instrument.

Sheriff's Sergeant Leo Clapp and Joseph Quick said Bachar gave them this account: The Pattersons showed up at the camp Oct. 2 to visit Brenkman, whom they reportedly had met on a bus trip from Ogden, Utah, last month. When they failed to locate friends they said lived in Fresno, they registered at the camp as nudists and moved into Brenkman's cottage with him.

Last Thursday night the three visited with Bachar in his cottage. Bachar said the Pattersons seemed "nice and refined." He didn't know where they came from.

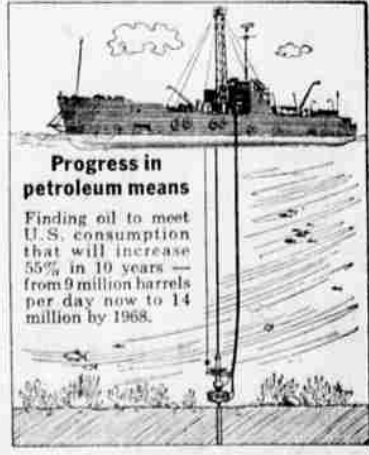
