

Hunter Hurt In Accident

Everett Gunter, Ponders, California, 19-year-old employee of the Cheney - Grant Lumber Company, was critically wounded Monday morning in a hunting accident about one and one half miles from Ponders.

He was moved 31 miles to McCloud by car following the shooting and underwent immediate surgery. His condition was still listed as critical Tuesday morning.

Gunter was hunting in company with J. D. Alexander, Ponders, when the accident occurred.

Investigating officers Deputy Sheriff Lawrence Taylor of Mount Shasta and Constable Al Hegre of McCloud report that Gunter apparently was climbing a tree when his 30-06 rifle accidentally discharged wounding him in the stomach.

Alexander returned on foot to Ponders where he enlisted aid and loaded Gunter into a car for the trip to McCloud. He reports that Gunter remained conscious during the drive.

FOOD INDUSTRY INQUIRY

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) has begun a broad investigation of competitive methods and practices in the food industry. The FTC said it had received complaints of concentration of economic power, collusive price action and unfair competitive methods in food distribution.

Crews Fight Grass Fires

Burning grass and flooded oil stoves accounted for eight runs by three different firefighting agencies in the Klamath Falls area in the 24-hour period ended at 8:30 a.m. Tuesday.

Little damage resulted from any of the five grass fires. One on a vacant lot at 1111 Alameda Avenue, reported to city firemen at 11:54 a.m. Monday, also involved a power pole, while some sawdust was concerned in another, at the old Ewauna lumber yard, Sixth and Spring streets, dealt with by city firemen at 12:51 p.m. Monday.

The city's third grass fire was at the Mary Hatfield residence, 245 Martin Street, at 3:53 p.m. Monday.

The other Monday grass fires were handled by different departments. The Suburban Fire Department put out a grass fire at the Dorothy Bull residence, 1538 Ward Street at 11:50 a.m. This was the only grass fire of the day in which the cause was easily determined; it started from a neighbor's grass-burning operation that got out of hand. The county fire department put out a blaze at the Copco substation near the Great Northern roundhouse at 3:17 p.m. The oil stove calls included one to the Ron Schill residence, 445 East Main Street, and another to the Willie Nuse residence, 1016 Martin Street, both answered by the city firemen. The third oil stove fire was at the David Romsted residence, 3962 Clinton Avenue. This same home accounted for the ninth run of the 24-hour period. Two hours after the Suburban Fire Department answered the oil stove call it was summoned back to deal with billowing smoke, apparently caused by a dirty flue. No damage resulted from any of these stove troubles.

Aurora Mayor Put In Jail For Disorderly Conduct

AURORA, Ill. (AP) — Mayor Paul Egan, who has been feuding and fussing with the police chief and fussed but who has refused to quit, was jailed Tuesday night by the chief.

Egan, the controversial and publicity-minded chief executive, stayed in his cell about five hours, long after his bond of \$200 was posted. He had been charged with disorderly conduct.

The 60-year-old mayor wouldn't leave until bond for four college youths had been posted. They had been arrested when they refused to disperse from the mayor's emergency citizen's meeting. Police broke up the meeting, declaring it an unlawful assembly.

The stumpy little mayor put up a brief struggle.

Egan had called the meeting to organize a law enforcement group to replace the city's 68-man police force, which he also has fired.

He was in the midst of a tirade against the world in general and Police Chief Donald Curran in particular when the chief and eight policemen walked into the Council chamber.

"We got 10,000 people in America worse than anything they've got in Russia," Egan told the crowd of about 400. "And that Curran is the worst criminal in the whole world. He's worse than Khrushchev."

Curran, speaking over a portable loud-speaker, drowned out the mayor's words, as he said: "Mayor Egan, I arrest you in the name of the law for disorderly conduct and creating a disturbance."

"You'll hear about this," Egan shouted as the cops seized him. "This is going to be the most costly thing you ever did."

leave, he said, until similar bonds were posted for the four youths arrested on similar charges.

At 12:30 a.m., bond was posted for the college boys. Egan still refused to leave. He said he would stay until his 250-pound bodyguard, V. L. Stevenson, 59, of Chicago, was released. Police, however, held Stevenson for investigation and refused to let him out.

Egan, under persuasion from his wife, finally left the jail—at 12:45 a.m. He ducked out a side door

and got into a car.

The mayor's troubles with the police erupted about three weeks ago when he fired Curran and the police force for failing to clamp

down on bingo. But the City Council, voting 4-1, backed Curran and the police force. Egan's efforts to take charge have been frustrated on every front.

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"BAKE-A-FRYER" . . . San Souci

- 3 tablespoons salad oil
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 (2 1/2-lb.) Oregon fryers, cut up
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1 can condensed chicken consommé

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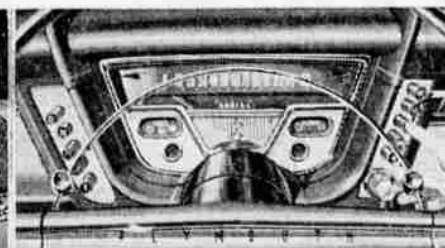
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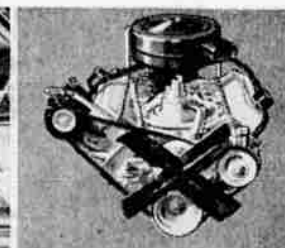
