Motor Chief Notes Law

If you should have an automobile accident but aren't certain whether an accident report is mandatory, please be advised that it is.

All accidents must be reported, however trivial. And this involves accidents on private property, such as a parking lot, and accidents involving parked cars without a driver or occupants.

So says James F. Johnson, director of the State Department of Motor Vehicles in a letter to all police departments and sheriffs offices in Oregon.

The question arose in Klamath Falls regarding accidents involving parked cars. Johnson was asked to interpret the law. He felt the issue was sufficiently important to distribute his answer to all state and local law enforcement officers.

The details of the question involve minor legal technicalities, but what they amount to is that the chapter of Oregon Law must be interpreted as written "except where the context otherwise requires."

Certainly, Johnson said, the context makes no exceptions for parked cars and private property. The rule to remember: Report all accidents.

Johnson also said the fact that a police officer investigates an accident and makes his own report does not relieve the drivers involved of making their reports. And they must be made within 24 hours.
