Teacher Vows Homework Dip

PITTSBURGH (AP)—A Rankin High School history teacher has agreed to reduce the homework of 88 junior pupils if they return to school.

Thomas A. Rodgers made the promise Tuesday night at the second stormy School Board meeting in two nights.

The pupils walked out Monday, protesting that Rodgers assigned as much as four hours of homework each night. They carried placards stating he was unfair.

At Tuesday night's meeting Supt. Maurice Silverstein announced that Rodgers would not teach history to the junior class for a 20-day "cooling-off" period.
