

Hayes' Blast Opens Conference Crossfire

CHICAGO (AP)—Woody Hayes, Ohio State football coach, found himself in a cross fire today between Big Ten Commissioner K. L. Wilson and Illinois Coach Ray Eliot. But Woody stood his ground and fired back.

Wilson rebuked Hayes for saying earlier this week that collegiate defenses "are getting away with a lot of dirty football" while game officials are "officiating the offense right out of existence."

Wilson said in a statement: "I can assure that he (Hayes) has generalized because I saw his Illinois game of last Saturday and I observed nothing in that game which I could say supported his allegations."

"He has done a disservice to college football by his broad charges which leave the public with an impression that college football is dirty, for this is not a fact."

In Columbus, Hayes shot back: "Let them prove me wrong. If they want me to turn my films over to an unprejudiced body I'll be glad to do it."

He referred to movies of nearly 20 games played this season. Hayes said he had analyzed them and concluded the defense is getting away with dirty tactics.

Wilson also said Hayes "knows full well that we do not condone dirty play as having a place in college. We do not permit our officials to tolerate it."

Hayes had made his remarks at a Columbus press luncheon. Wilson said he had postponed commenting until Hayes put his charges in writing. But Wilson added he never received a letter and "I therefore have to go on what he said to the press."

Hayes countered: "I said I had communicated with him (Wilson) and I did. I talked with him by phone last Saturday night."

Eliot, whose Illini were defeated 19-13 by the defending champion Buckeyes in Champaign, Ill., Saturday, was incensed by a published report that Hayes complained too much piling-on was permitted in the game.

"I'm surprised and shocked to read of the insinuation that Illinois plays anything but a clean and fine game," he said. "Anyone who has the audacity or temerity to infer that Illinois players played anything but clean football throughout the game must be a man who is out of his mind or likes to hear himself talk."

"There are enough people already running down college football. Hayes' statements left a bad taste in the mouths of Illinois players and coaches. The last thing we want is a smear campaign. We get sick and tired of hearing the same old rantings and ravings of Woody Hayes."

OTI Spirits On Upswing As Homecoming Tilt Nears

"Evidently the slow start and lackadaisical play by our kids at Eastern Oregon last Saturday was just a temporary letdown, because they've begun to show the best spirit of the season in this week's practices."

That was Oregon Tech football coach Rex Hunsaker talking in the coaches' dressing room at the close of Wednesday night's practice. The Owls meet Southern Oregon College here Saturday afternoon in the annual Oregon Tech Homecoming Week football game.

Hunsaker and his coaching staff expressed some concern over the OTI spirit and team desire after the 27-6 come-from-behind victory over EOC. But this down-in-the-mouth feeling was erased after very fine team spirit in Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday's practices.

"We feel," Hunsaker said Wednesday night, "that the boys know this is the big game, and they worked harder the first three days of this week than any other week this season. It's real fine to see the great team spirit that has begun to take hold in this club. They'll be ready Saturday afternoon," the Owl mentor added.

Along with the good news, Hunsaker also revealed that he lost a first-string defensive halfback who was looking well in practice sessions. Vernon Stirm, the prize halfback from Lodi, California, had to withdraw from school Wednesday and return home where his mother suffered a stroke. Stirm joined the Tech club late, but was expected to move into the Owls' first defensive unit for the Southern Oregon contest here Saturday.

The Owls are in good physical condition and if the team escapes any injuries in Thursday's final day of head-to-head contact, the squad will be at full strength Saturday.

Southern Oregon will bring one of its best football teams to Modoc Field Saturday in an effort to spoil the Owls' Homecoming Weekend. Last year, Southern Oregon defeated the Owls 33-7, but the year before, also a Homecoming game, OTI won a narrow 27-20 decision over the Raiders. Saturday's game is rated as a tossup, with the Owls having a slim advantage.

This weekend's contest will go a long way in deciding the Oregon Collegiate Conference championship. Both clubs are undefeated in conference play. The Owls have beaten Portland State and Eastern Oregon, while Southern Oregon holds a win over Portland State. The Red Raiders are defending conference champions.

Heading up the Southern Oregon attack will be Jack Brown, a line passer throwing quarterback, who played two years of football for Hunsaker at Oregon Tech before he entered the service. Brown, after returning from his hitch with Uncle Sam, returned to Southern Oregon last year but did not play football. So far this year, after a long layoff, the former Owl signal caller has looked very sharp.

Against Lewis and Clark two weeks ago, Brown set a new national small college pass completion record. In the Raiders 44-12 defeat, Brown hit 23 of 29 passes good for 367 yards. The old record was 21 passes thrown by Andy McDonald of Central Michigan in 1951.

Writers Cite Bob Turley Man Of Year

NEW YORK (UPI)—Bob Turley, who clinched a 21-1 victory season by pitching the New York Yankees to their World Series triumph over the Milwaukee Braves, today was named the United Press International's American League player of the year.

The 28-year-old native of Troy, Ill., one of the few pitchers ever honored, won over a field that included eight other players. A UPI board of experts, three baseball writers from each city in the league, gave him seven votes — three more than were polled by both Kansas City's Bob Cerv and Boston's Jackie Jensen.

Next in the balloting came Mickey Mantle of the Yankees with three votes followed by Cleveland's Rocky Colavito with two and Cal McLish, Vic Power, Sherman Lollar and Ted Williams with one each.

For Turley, the award was the climax of a season in which he finally blossomed from a promising but erratic thrower into a full-fledged big league star pitcher. Turley, quiet and unassuming despite his imposing 6-2, 220-pound physique, credited that transformation to Yankee coach Jim Turner.

"Harry Breechen (a Baltimore coach) taught me how to live like a big leaguer," said Turley.

OUT OF DOORS with Field & Stream

Take your choice, you can hunt or fish this weekend as deer season moves into its third weekend, duck and goose season is in its second, pheasant, quail and other upland birds are starting their second week and Klamath River continues to produce some fine fishing reports.

There's something for just about everyone who wants to take to the outdoors this weekend.

Deer season is still slow and the storm that was expected to hit here last weekend failed to materialize making conditions all the worse. The timberlands are bone-dry, making stalking of deer useless. A few hunters are having results on "drives" through popular hunting spots, but these are few and far between.

Most of the reports on deer kills have been coming in from the Greensprings and Lake of the Woods country, where ninorods have been bagging blacktail bucks. Swan Lake, Gearhart and Quartz Mountain and mule deer country to the east of Klamath Falls.

Beginning also this weekend—Saturday—is the state's first attempt in a unit deer hunt. There are 60 different unit ranges in the state, and public drawings were held earlier in the year to issue a specified number of permits for either-sex hunting in these respective areas. The unit hunt deer season starts Saturday, October 18, and continues through October 26, a week from Sunday.

Only those persons who were issued permits will be allowed to kill does throughout the state this year, a drastic changeover from past either-sex hunting practices. Hunters are warned that special law enforcement checks will be made to see that only those with tags bring in antlerless deer.

The regular general deer season (bucks) runs through October 26.

Duck and goose season got off to probably one of the worst opening weekends local hunters can remember. The "blue bird" weather, along with the rain, kept the success ration down tremendously. Only a few scattered limits were taken last weekend, and the midweek reports of limits are even less.

A good storm, something all deer hunters are looking for, would help the duck and goose hunters also. A large number of trailer camps were noticed on both the north and south ends of the state line reserve area. The "firing line" got a good play and lots of birds were shot, but it was nothing like expected.

The evening shooting hours in the state line sections seem to be the best. Most birds are remaining on the reserve to feed and in the absence of bad weather, find no reason to leave their safe confines. Other favorite hunting spots—including Upper Klamath Lake—seem to be best during the late afternoon hours.

Pheasant hunters greeted the warm opening weekend with smiles while the duck and goose and deer seekers were frowning.

Some very good results were had in the Merrill and Malin sections of the country by pheasant hunters. Bud Cloake and his party of scattergunners found limits Saturday without too much trouble. Other reports from hunters in the Basin's southern section also found success.

Stengel Picks Yanks For 59 AL Pennant

NEW YORK (AP)—Casey Stengel, fortified with a new two-year, \$80,000 contract, predicts his New York Yankees will make it five American League pennants in a row next year.

"If I didn't think we'd win again," he told a mammoth press conference, "I wouldn't have signed this piece of paper."

The 68-year-old pilot, still flush with what he called his greatest World Series triumph, said he would seek to strengthen the club for next year by trades.

"We could use another pitcher, another outfielder and a right-handed pinch hitter. I'd say that this past year I was weaker than I've been during my 10 years here in the right-handed pinch-hitting department."

Stengel didn't identify any of the players he would seek but he hinted strongly he'd like to get either Pedro Ramos or Camilo Pascual, Washington's top two pitchers, and Roy Sievers, the Senators' slugging left fielder.

"I read the other day where they (Washington) said we'd have to give up four or five players if we wanted to do business with them. Then they said that three of them (presumably Ramos, Pascual and Sievers) were not for trade. Well, who else do they have besides those three?"

Stengel said he had a surplus of infielders who were expendable but did not say which ones would be offered in trade. He has three third basemen in Andy Carey, Jerry Lumpe and Bobby Richardson. Carey appears the most expendable.

Norm Siebern, who was benched after his unfortunate fielding misplays in left field in the fourth game of the World Series, will not be traded, according to Stengel.

"I haven't given up on the left fielder," is the way he put it. "No amount of money can have him." Stengel indicated that Elston Howard, who led the club in batting this year, would replace the aging Yogi Berra as the team's No. 1 catcher.

"Howard proved to me he's the best catcher in baseball," Stengel said. "He's amazing. If Berra wants to play more games, I'll use him as my four-way man. He can play first base, in the outfield. He can pinch hit and he can catch."

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Picture Distinct: D'Amato

NEW YORK (AP)—The heavyweight picture is very clear today, at least in the eyes of Cus D'Amato, manager of world champion Floyd Patterson.

Here is the way D'Amato sizes it up:

1. England's Henry Cooper and Sweden's undefeated Ingemar Johansson are worthy challengers.
2. Eddie Machen (knocked out in the first round by Johansson), Zora Foley (outpointed by Cooper) and Willie Pastrano (stopped on cuts by England's Brian London) were overrated when they were ranked 1-2-3 among the contenders. (Machen, Foley and Pastrano are Americans.)
3. But since everyone had ranked them 1-2-3 before, then these same people must concede the worthiness of Cooper and Johansson.
4. He will consider a title fight in London next spring or summer with Cooper but he also intends to go through with a commitment for a summer title defense in Colorado Springs, Colo. He had promised London promoter Harry Levene that if Levene had a worthy opponent he would go to London and fight for him.
5. Patterson will not fight for anyone remotely connected with the International Boxing Club. And that's why he won't accept a big home television offer for a Dec. 5 fight in Madison Square Garden.

Ned Irish, executive vice president of the Garden, said Wednesday that D'Amato had rejected a \$300,000 bid from the National Broadcasting Co. on behalf of Gillette, sponsors of the IBC's Friday night fights, for a Dec. 5 fight in the Garden. The unnamed opponent was expected to be Cuba's Nino Valdes. Irish said D'Amato also had turned down five other dates in the arena.

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
