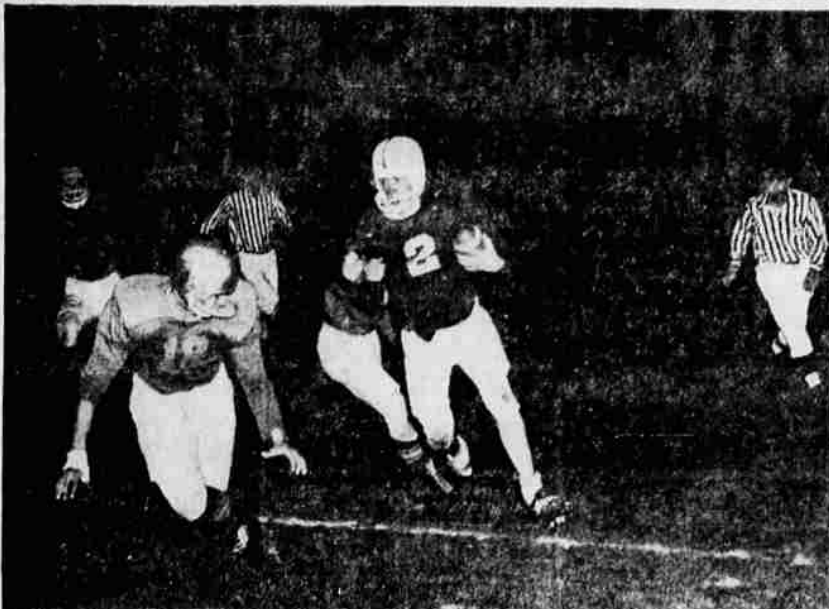

With only three games remaining in regular District 5 B competition the Merrill Huskies have finally scrambled to the top of the heap off their convincing 22-7 win over the Bonanza Antlers last Friday in Merrill.

The Antlers slipped into a three-way tie for second position with the Malin Mustangs and the Jack-

sonville Redskins. The Chiloquin Panthers have a reserved seat in fifth place with the St. Mary's Crusaders rating sixth. Tied for last place are the Sacred Heart Trojans and the Talent Bulldogs, both of whom are still looking for their first win.

The Huskies, in theory at least, have faced the last of the serious threats to their District 5 B supremacy. The next target is Talent, whom the Merrill squad meets in Talent this Friday night. Following the Talent test, the Huskies face Jacksonville at Merrill then close against the Chiloquin Panthers in a game to be played in Chiloquin.

All of the remaining Merrill opponents have been beaten, at least once, by previously vanquished Husky foe.

Bonanza and Malin are determined to drop each other out of second slot contention as they meet Friday night under the lights at Merrill while Jacksonville figures to hold its place in a contest with Sacred Heart at Jacksonville.

Chiloquin and St. Mary's are scheduled to close the week's festivities with a game to be played in Chiloquin Saturday afternoon. It will be the Panthers' first home stand.

In other games played this past weekend the Redskins blasted a squad of Crusaders weakened through disciplinary action, by a score of 41-12; the Malin Mustangs handed the Talent Bulldogs a 20-0 thumping and the Chiloquin Panthers swamped the SHA Trojans 33-13 in Gem Stadium.

Newman Recovers Rapidly

Washington State quarterback Bob Newman is recuperating from a leg injury like the way he passes—"in a miraculous manner."

Those are the words the WSC trainer used Wednesday when Newman turned out for practice wearing a special brace on the knee he injured in Saturday's game against Idaho.

The Cougars will need all the impetus Newman can provide. Their assignment for the weekend is to master the Oregon Ducks, who are unscathed on after two Coast Conference games.

Newman's appearance on the practice field seemed to add vitality to the WSC drills. The nation's 1957 total offense leader did not participate in contact work, however, and Coach Jim Sutherland didn't say how much Newman will play Saturday.

Oregon, meanwhile, has returned to full strength. Fullback Marlan Holland, who had been out with injuries, rejoined the Ducks at practice Wednesday. The team had fair luck drilling against a WSC-type passing and running game.

The California Bears, aiming for their first victory over USC since 1950, got no comfort when Pete Elliott reported that halfback Gus Gianulias may have to sit out Saturday's game. Gianulias has a pulled leg muscle and Elliott says he doesn't appear to be responding to treatment.

In Los Angeles, the Trojans also released what may be a significant casualty report. One of their captains, guard Monte Clark, has a badly bruised instep that could keep him out of the Cal game, Clark is not yet definitely out, but he hasn't worked out this week.

The UCLA Bruins, figuring they may run into rain at Seattle Saturday, worked out with wet footballs. They held closed drills for the second straight day.

Their Saturday opponents, the light drills, concentrating on defense. Coach Jim Owens said the Huskies will be at full strength practice.

At Corvallis, fullback Nub Reamer returned to practice with Oregon State. He missed the Wyoming game last week because of injuries but may be able to play against Idaho Saturday. Also back after being idled by injuries were three linemen, Ted Bates, Jim Brackins and Jerry Doman.

Idaho, unable to coordinate its offense against WSC Saturday, scrimmaged for the third straight day. Coach Skip Stahley spent about half the drill running his first unit through offensive patterns.

Stanford, the only PCC team not playing a conference game this week, continued drilling for its Saturday meeting with the Air Force Academy.

The Henley Hornets can unpack their bags for the balance of the regular 1958 football season upon returning from their clash with the Glendale Pirates in Glendale Friday night. The Glendale-Henley match is the last one away from home for the Hornets and the next to the last Little Rogue Conference contest.

Of the six games they have played so far this season the Hornets have met only one opponent on their home field, and that one just this last Saturday afternoon, when they clobbered Illinois Valley Cougars 25-0.

Following their junket to Glendale the Henleyites host Surprise Valley in a non-conference test then meet Phoenix, also at Henley, in the Hornet homecoming game, which will wrap up regular season play.

For coach Ted Ammerman's Hornets, currently tied with Illinois Valley for second place in the standings, the Glendale test can be a crucial. A portion of the only chance the Hornets have to get a

crack at the league crown depends on a victory over the Pirates. The other "if" concerned depends on the strong Eagle Point Eagles losing to Illinois Valley Friday night.

The Hornets (2-1), with a victory Friday, are assured of a tie with Eagle Point (3-0) should the Eagles fall to Illinois Valley (2-1).

According to the dope sheets the Eagles are the odds-on favorites to stop Illinois Valley, since Henley was tripped up by Eagle Point 12-0 and Illinois Valley was defeated at Henley 25-0.

There can be some doubt, however, as to the complete validity of these comparisons since at the time of the loss to Eagle Point the Hornets were missing the services of three starting players; two backs and a center.

The squad was intact, for the first time in the major portion of the season, when the Hornets bombed Illinois Valley. Despite the injuries which have plagued them the Hornets have collected a 3-win, 1-loss, 1-tie record while amassing 85 points to 25 for their opposition.

In the Illinois Valley game the Hornets exhibited a fine scoring punch as fullback Phil Swisher and halfback Lawrence Lugo turned in some fine groundwork which combined with two successful passes from halfback Burrell Goble to end Leroy Larson, for the Henley counters. Spearheading a tough defensive unit was center Joe Tachini and his mates kept the Cougars from penetrating deeper than the Hornet 17.

Other Rogue conference activity slated for the weekend finds the unmet-minded Phoenix gridder combating Rogue River. The two clubs are tied for cellar-occupancy. Phoenix tripped Ashland, an A1 school, 19-13, in their last outing.

Seattle U Chiefs Begin Practice

SEATTLE (AP)—The Seattle University Chieftains, a new coach at the helm and minus the talents of all American Elgin Baylor, opened 1958 basketball drills Wednesday.

Vince Cazzetta took over the head coach position from John Castellani after last season when the Chieftains were banned from NCAA tournament play for two years because of recruiting violations.

Dawkins Tops US Scorers

NEW YORK (AP) — Pete Dawkins, one-half of Army's fearsome backfield duo, is showing the way in major college individual football scoring with 42 points.

The 197-pound halfback from Royal Oak, Mich., who with Bob Anderson gives Army its best one-two punch since Glenn Davis and Doc Blanchard, crossed the goal line seven times in pacing the Cadets to three straight victories.

Figures released today by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau shows Dawkins leading Colorado's Howard Cook by one point. Cook scored 23 of his 41 points against Arizona last Saturday. The 25 equalled the season's one-game high by Kentucky's Calvin Bird against Hawaii.

Bill Patton of California is third with 36 points. Bird, Dick Bass of College of the Pacific and versatile Bill Austin of Rutgers are next in line with 32 each.

Arizona's Dave Hibbert is the top pass catcher. He has been on the receiving end of 22 aerials, the highest four-game total in five years. Hibbert's closest competitor is Ulmo Randall of Virginia, whose 19 receptions is five more than he caught all last season.

Bobby Walden has averaged 48.1 yards on 15 punts to top that department. Second at 46.5 is Don Croker of North Carolina.

The honor of being the hardest working back goes to Austin. The Rutgers ace has handled the ball on an average of 36.3 plays of all types per game. In addition he has scored five touchdowns and two extra points, tossed three touchdown passes and a pair of two-point conversion aerials. That makes him responsible for 54 of Rutgers' 72 points.

Vernon Cole of North Texas State, in one more game than Austin, also has had a hand in scoring 34 points (12 touchdowns, 5 TD passes and 6 two-point conversion passes). Responsible for only one point less is Cook who figured in 6 TDs, 2 TD passes, 2 extra points and a field goal.

Vanderbilt's David Ray is tops in punt returns with 4 for 120 yards and a 10-yard edge over John Horrolo of Oregon State. Tom Newell of Drake has run back 11 kickoffs for 219 yards, eight more than Virginia's Randall.

Football Mentors Earn Daily Bread From Week To Week

Don't begrudge the college football coach his daily bread. He is earning it from week to week trying to keep abreast of the changing offenses with a suitable defense. And equally important, trying to keep his own attack working.

This is a problem that bothers many coaches to the extent that some have to prepare for a different type attack each week. This entails:

1. Setting up and teaching a different type defense than the one learned the previous week.

2. Tutoring the scouts on the opposition's plays so they can present reasonable facsimiles against the varsity.

3. Using the combination of the first two in scrimmages until the defense knows its job.

Since the defensive personnel are also the offense in this primary one-plateau era, where do they get time to polish their attack? That is the problem.

It is one facing Wake Forest Coach Paul Amen today. The Bears play Villanova Saturday and

must face a T formation which makes extensive use of flankers, then will suddenly shift into an "I" formation.

Last week, Amen had to tutor his lads against North Carolina State's multiple offense. The Bears won 13-7. The week before his boys had their initial shot at the "I" formation, losing to Florida State 27-24. Prior to that, they beat two split-T teams, Maryland 34-0 and Virginia Tech 13-6.

Pitt meets West Virginia in a big rivalry game and the Panthers Coach Johnny Michelson faces his fourth offense in five games. The Mountaineers have a split-T as their basic attack, from which they have run up 122 points in four games.

Pitt, specializing more in defense than offense this season, succumbed to Michigan State's multiple offense (22-3) last week, but conquered Minnesota's split-T 13-7, Holy Cross' T-variations 17-0 and UCLA's single wing, with balanced and unbalanced lines, 27-6.

Notre Dame's Terry Brennan hemoaned the fact last week that

his boys have not faced the same type offense in any of their first three games. Army's "bazooka" and "lonesome end" did them in 14-2, and this week they must face Duke's split-T and "lonesome end" and world champion sprinter Dave Sims.

The Blue Devils' offense still differs from Army's in many respects, but Brennan so far had to conquer Indiana's single wing, 18-0, and Southern Methodist's spreads, 14-0. He promised more offense work and Wednesday had two backfields working on offensive formations.

Picture Kansas' Jack Mitchell. He faces Oklahoma's "smorgasbord" offense, which at times has the center snapping the ball as an end. Mitchell takes it all in stride. He beat Iowa State's single wing last week 7-0, but lost to Colorado's multiple offense 31-0. Oregon State's balanced line single wing 17-0, and Texas Christian's conventional T-formation 42-0.

Those losses show that the offense needed some more time. That's what Mitchell is taking care of this week.

Cross Country Begun At UO

EUGENE (AP)—The University of Oregon opens its cross country season Thursday with a meet with Oregon State and Lewis and Clark.

The Oregon squad, led by miler Jim Grelle, is favored to win.

The Oregon Fresh also opens this season here Thursday. Pryor Burleson of Cottage Grove—who last spring ran the fastest prep mile in Oregon history—is on the freshman squad.
