Home Extension

Hearth rugs, window drapes, or other fabrics that might be fire hazards in the home can be given a simple but effective flame-retarding treatment, using a recipe suggested by U.S. Department of Agriculture researchers. Halloween partygivers should be interested in this if candles are used in decorations or games.

Make a paste of three ounces (slightly more than one fourth cup) of powdered boric acid and a little water. Dissolve this paste in two quarts of hot water. Then add seven ounces of borax (slightly less than one cup) and stir until it also dissolves. You may need to double or even triple the recipe for large items like draperies or rugs.

Be sure the fabrics or clothes you're going to treat are dry. Then soak them in the solution until they are thoroughly wet. If a fabric doesn't soak up water easily, add one teaspoonful of liquid detergent for each gallon of solution used.

You can then put the treated fabrics through the spin cycle of your automatic washer to get out most of the moisture, but be sure to rinse out the washer immediately afterward to remove deposits left from the solution. Dry the fabric on a clothesline, and for ironing use only a moderately hot iron.

The flame retardant easily washes out of treated materials, so it has to be renewed after each laundering.

USDA chemists say this treatment is good for ordinary cotton, linen, and rayon, but not for acetate, nylon, orlon, other synthetics, or crease-resistant fabrics.

To test the effect of the flame-retarding solution, try it out on a small scrap of the fabric used in the items to be treated. When the test sample is dry, touch a match to it. Be careful not to hold the fabric in your hand for this test. Also, don't lay it on a surface that fire might damage. The fabric will burn as long as it is in contact with a lighted match, but if properly treated, it should stop burning as soon as you take the match away.

The glow remaining in the charred portion should die a few seconds later.

Hunting season is in full swing at this time of the year and many Klamath County homemakers will be cooking the delicacy to suit the family's taste. Here are a few hints on cooking that might be useful.

All game birds should be allowed to hang at a temperature just above freezing for at least 48 hours before they are cooked. The length of time and the temperature at which they are allowed to hang that period will control how "high" or gamey they are allowed to become. This should be determined by personal taste.

For the bird in the bag, here is a recipe for quail with mushrooms that might be appealing: Bind each bird with a slice of bacon. Put birds into a buttered pan and baste occasionally while they are roasting. Roast about one half hour for large birds. Remove bird from roaster and add a tablespoonful of butter, a little hot water and the juice of half a lemon to the fat. Stir constantly. Serve the birds on toast with the gravy poured over them, garnish with a wedge of lemon, currant or grape jelly. On the same plate serve mushrooms that have been broiled in butter salt and pepper.

For variation, stuff a wild duck with the following orange dressing: three cups dry bread cubes, toasted; one half cup water; two teaspoons grated orange peel; two thirds cup orange pulp; three cups diced celery; one fourth cup melted butter; one beaten egg; one half teaspoon salt; dash of pepper and one fourth teaspoon poultry seasoning.

Soften bread cubes in hot water 15 minutes. Add remaining ingredients; combine lightly. Stuff duck. This delicious stuffing is enough for a five pound duck.

If you are wondering how to prepare the less tender cuts from that deer, why not try a venison meat loaf? The recipe includes: one

pound ground venison, one third pound ground pork, one egg, one half cup dried bread crumbs, one cup milk, one and one half teaspoons salt, one half tablespoon chopped onion. After mixing the meats thoroughly, add egg, milk, bread crumbs and mix with meat. Place in greased pan and bake for one hour in a 350 degree Fahrenheit oven.
