Lakeview Man's Death Reported

LAKEVIEW — Dr. Charles E. Leithead, 83, resident of Lakeview since 1918, died in Lakeview, October 14. He was born May 2, 1875, in Barre, Vermont, son of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Page Leithead.

He was graduated from the University of Iowa at the age of 20 years and practiced medicine in South Dakota and San Francisco in the early 1900s. He practiced in Lakeview from the time of his arrival until his retirement in 1946.

Dr. Leithead was a life member of the Elks Lodge, Lakeview; Al Kadar Shrine, Portland; Scottish Rite Bodies, Portland; Oriental Chapter of the Eastern Star, Lakeview; Lake County Shrine Club.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Elsie Leithead, Lakeview; a daughter, Queena Klem, San Francisco; three stepsons, Delmar McGrath, Lakeview, and James Stovall, Eugene; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Jessie Arkarow, Alturas; and a nephew, Lloyd Leithead, Klamath Falls.

Masonic funeral services will be held from the Lakeview Methodist Church, at 2 p.m. Saturday, October 18 with the Rev. Claude Brown officiating. Final rites and interment will be in the Fort Bidwell Cemetery.

Bar Association Endorses Judge

The Klamath County Bar Association this week endorsed Judge David R. Vandenberg for reelection in a resolution citing the judge for his work in the county.

The resolution also observed that the judge's work load has increased tremendously.

It read, in part, that "the Thirteenth Judicial District has seen a greatly increased judicial load because of many factors, including an increase of population of the district, increase of additional jurisdiction upon the circuit court, and a general increase of both litigation and probate and juvenile affairs."

The bar association, through the resolution, expressed "its appreciation of the outstanding public services rendered by Judge Vandenberg."

The judge, although unopposed in his candidacy for a fourth term, said he was "immensely pleased and flattered" by the association's action.

California's Election Carries Impact, Drama

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — California's election campaign carries dramatic impact and national significance probably unmatched in modern political history.

It spins around the races for governor and U.S. senators. Four leading figures and such controversial issues as "right-to-work" dominate the scene.

There is Sen. William F. Knowland, blunt, independent-minded Senate Republican leader. He renounced a virtual sure-thing reelection to run for governor—a risk that has potential presidential consequences for a hotly contested presidential contest.

There is his Democratic opponent, Atty. Gen. Edmund G. Brown, an amiable, self-styled moderate and his party's best vote-getter yet in California.

There is Republican Gov. Goodwin J. Knight, an avowed candidate for re-election, until Knowland's decision to bid for his job prompted him to shoot, most reluctantly, for Knowland's Senate seat.

And there is Rep. Clair Engle, eight-time congressman from a 19-county mountain-valley district.

County Receives Highway Share

Klamath County has received its quarterly share of state highway funds, an amount totaling \$95,507, County Treasurer Eva Cook said today.

The money represents about one-fourth of the county's annual share of receipts from vehicle and drivers' license fees, gasoline taxes, motor carrier fees and traffic fines, Mrs. Cook said.

Nineteen per cent of those funds are redistributed to counties four times a year. Klamath County, with 25,336 vehicles registered in 1957, ranked 11th in the amount received throughout the state.

The funds go to the county road department.

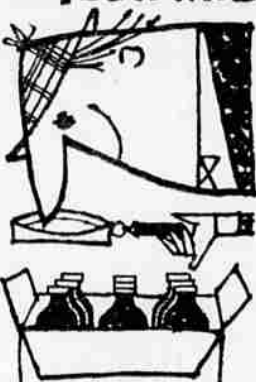

Knowland as a reactionary, pushing his way on a rule-or-ruin course set for the White House.

Knowland, in turn, warns that labor bosses are trying to take over the state, and that "Pat" Brown is their captive candidate.

Knowland, whom even Democrats consider has been a "good governor," has made no secret of his own coolness toward the head of the GOP ticket. In fact, he has peppered away at Knowland on the labor issue and his supposed presidential ambitions.

Knowland, barnstorming furiously after his slow start, says the tide is beginning to turn away from Brown. He predicts the 64 million voters will choose the man, rather than the party, and that he will win by upwards of 125,000.

Brown has stayed away from the crystal ball but he is confident of his chances. His headquarters figures he'll top Knowland by no less than half a million—perhaps as high as 1,200,000.

Knowland is probably the most optimistic of the Republican candidates. He trailed Engle by 560,000 votes in the primary, although he had competition for the Republican nomination for the Senate. Engle was unopposed within his own party.

The governor says a new statewide poll now gives him the lead. He says Engle made a serious miscalculation in strategy in assailing President Eisenhower's foreign policy, and that he has tried to wisecrack his way to the Senate.

The Democrats, far from conceding Engle's defeat, predict they'll pick up two more House seats—possibly three. The present lineup in the California delegation is 17 Republicans, 13 Democrats.

The Democratic challenge has brought two campaign swings by Vice President Nixon, who has more than a Californian's interest in the outcome. President Eisenhower's two-day visit to California next week also points up the national importance of the state's vote.

Knowland insists he intends to serve out his four-year term if elected governor. Clearly, though, a victory for the Republican senator would enhance his own, or his party's, chances in the 1960 presidential race.
