

Garden State Firse Captured By Quill

CAMDEN, N.J. (AP)—Quill won the duel of East vs. West and perhaps the 1953, 2-year-old filly championship Saturday, capturing the \$135,000 Garden State Stakes at Garden State Park.

R. N. Webster's Kentucky-bred juvenile proved his class in pegging back the California contender for the divisional title, William N. Modlin's Khalita, who finished fourth after setting all the pace in the mile and one sixteenth race.

Quill earned \$81,576, boosting her 1953 earnings to \$140,302. It was her sixth win in eight starts. She was second choice in the field of 12 and returned backers in the crowd of 34,873 fans, \$6.40 \$3.60 and \$2.80.

Carrying 119 pounds, Quill was seventh at the half-mile pole when jockey Paul Bailey let her out. She moved quickly to second place.

Meanwhile, Khalita, ridden by

Eddie Arcaro, led 4 lengths after half a mile and was still 3 1/2 to the good after three-quarters. But once Quill sped up a full head of steam she was no stopping the fleet.

As Khalita faded, Arcaro challenged for the lead, failed by a length and a half, and Quill was third and Khalita wound up fourth.

Quill raced the race in 1:43.1. Resca paid \$7.60 \$3.80 and Ruwenzo \$13.40.

In two trials to best Saturday's \$250,000-plus race, Garden State Stakes First Landing odds-on favorite, and Rico 10, a rank outsider, triumphed.

The veteran Eddie Arcaro rode Christopher T. Chen's First Landing to his ninth win in 10 starts, a come-from-behind effort made necessary when the sensational 2-year-old, 8-bumped slightly at the start and trailed the field.

First Landing, clocked in 1:44.3 for the \$100,000 mile if one-sixteenth run, moved from about an eighth of a mile to go, and then fought off a stubborn challenge of the pace set, Charlan Stable's crafty Sher. Mrs. Ben Cohen's Pen Boleas was third followed by Brookfield Farm's In The.

The Chenery colt, then only 10 months, returned \$2,600 to \$2.20. A minus pool of \$34 developed in the First Landing race. He went off at 1-5.

Howard Grant rode Tesio to his surprise victory the first half of the two races, riding the chestnut colt home by lengths in 1:45.4. It was Rico 10's second win in seven starts.

Rico Tesio trailed throughout, running last in the early stages, but the seven horse led was closely bunched as they neared the line. Rico Tesio was 14th about 2 lengths off the lead.

Twain Lane Farm's Modest Count shot to the front the top of the stretch. Llanzo Farm's co-favorite, Restless W. raced about a head away, with Fred W. Hooper's Pryson third.

The next bout for the Panthers is the Potato Festival game with Malin next Friday night. The game is to be played on the Merrill grid.

Army '11' Defeats Virginia

WEST POINT, N.Y. (AP)—Joe Caldwell, a ball-taking Houdini who played only two minutes last year, and Bullet Bob Anderson passed and ran Army's top-ranked football team to a 35-6 victory over Virginia Saturday at Michie Stadium.

Hampered by fumbles in the opening half, the Cadets recovered their poise behind their 100-pound quarterback Caldwell and turned what started out as a close game into a rout. The game was so fiercely played that two of Army's stars, halfback-captain Pete Dawkins and fullback Harry Walters, were sent to the sidelines with leg injuries.

Caldwell personally scored one of Army's five touchdowns with a six-yard run. He set up another with a 39-yard sprint on a fake pass, and sparked two other touchdowns drives with accurate passes, one of them a 60-yard play to the fabled Army "lone some end," Bill Carpenter.

Anderson, hard-running junior halfback who was the team's chief offensive weapon a year ago but who has been overshadowed most of this season by teammate Dawkins, came into his own with a brilliant display of ball-carrying.

Army's defense, lethargic in the early stages, also finally rose to the occasion by twice stopping Virginia within its 10-yard line in the second half.

The lone Virginia score came in the second period following one of the four fumbles Army lost. Henry Minor, sub Army halfback, let the ball get away on a handoff, and it was recovered by Virginia's Vivian Hydon on the 46.

Halfback Fred Shepherd's running and passes by quarterback Arnold Dempsey and Fred Russell carried to the Army seven where Russell passed to Ulmo Randle for the touchdown. The kicking attempt was blocked by Walters.

Huskies Overpower Bulldogs In Talent

TALENT—Coach Al Keck used nearly every player on his bench as his District 5B leading Merrill Huskies gamboled to a 51-13 victory over the Talent Bulldogs here Friday night. The Huskies, in maintaining an unbeaten 1953 season have won five straight. The Bulldogs have yet to notch their first win.

Halfback Bud Maupin, behind a tremendous blocking effort on the parts of teammates Dean Haskins and Bill Beasley, paced the Merrill attack as he put together two runs of 27 yards, one for seven and a 54 yard pass interception to score four of the eight Husky TDs. Maupin also contributed a pair of conversion kicks for good measure.

The Bulldogs, unable to cope with the steamrolling Huskies for the major portion of the test, finally broke into the scoring column as halfback Sandy Knudsen broke through the Merrill reserve line for a pair of touchdowns late in the fourth stanza. Corns picked up the only Talent conversion on a scot around left end.

Merrill quarterback Dennis Salvadori connected on three of his five pass attempts, two of them good for six-painters. Charles Rolter hauled in a 35 yard heave and traveled 20 more yards for one of them and Bill Artery collected a 29 yard toss for the other.

Bill Beasley, ordinarily a line-man, moved into the backfield to help relieve the slightly injured John Haskins at halfback and scored on a 22 yard run. Fullback Troy Patterson, also a converted lineman, counted the other Merrill counter as he plunged into the end zone from the five.

Statistically Talent picked up the most first downs, 11-7, but were far behind in overall yardage gains. The Bulldogs registered 96 rushing and 98 passing while the

Huskies collected 260 and 90. The next test for the strong Merrill club comes against Jacksonville at Merrill next Saturday afternoon.

Auburn, Engineers In Draw

ATLANTA (AP)—Underdog Georgia Tech threw up an impenetrable clutch defense Saturday and held unbeaten Auburn, the nation's second-ranked football power, to a 7-7 tie in their Southeastern Conference battle.

Thus the Yellow Jackets gave Auburn a taste of its own medicine—for Auburn's string of 17 straight victories was built on a defense rated the nation's best.

Auburn dominated the first half and scored early in the second period. When Tech crashed through for its touchdown in the fourth quarter, Coach Bobby Dodd played it safe rather than gamble for the two-point conversion, which would have brought victory if good, or defeat if missed.

Tommy Wells, a sophomore kicking specialist, coolly booted the tying point.

In the final seconds of the game, Wells tried a field goal from the Auburn 39 but it was short and off line as the final whistle blew.

Until Tech quarterback Fred Braselton intercepted an Auburn pass and returned it 16 yards to the visitors 36, Tech had never seriously threatened.

Two Braselton passes to Frank Nix and Jerome Green took the ball to the Auburn 11. Then Braselton took aim at Jack Rudolph and the Tech ended with a falling catch at the one after Auburn's Tommy Lorino tipped the ball into the air but couldn't bat it down.

It took Braselton three quarters to speak to ram it the final yards. And that was the first time anyone had scored on Auburn on a ground play from scrimmage since Alabama did it in the final game of the 1952 season.

McMurtry Earns Verdict

NEW YORK (UPI)—Pat McMurtry, the redeeming United States heavyweight who was saved from a possible knockout by the "image of Gene Tunney," will get another fight soon at Madison Square Garden because of his upset decision over Canadian champion George Chuvalo.

The opponent probably will be fourth-ranked contender Nino Valdes of Cuba in late November or early December.

Before ex-Marine Sergeant McMurtry of Tacoma, Wash., took charge in the third round Friday night and gave 10th-ranked Chuvalo a bloody beating, he was staggered by a terrific Chuvalo left hook in the second session.

"The instant that punch knocked me groggy," unranked Irish Pat said Saturday, "the image of Gene Tunney popped up in my mind, and I ran like a thief until my head cleared."

After that, the rangy boxer-puncher from the Northwest hammered out a lopsided victory that ended the most disastrous four months for United States heavyweights in ring history. He broke our losing streak in international heavyweight competition at eight straight since June 15.

The Panthers, sparked by the running of quarterback Don McCrea scored twice in the second and third periods to sew up the non-league triumph in a hurry. McCrea, one of the top backs in the state, scored three times, once on a 32-yard run, the others coming on scampers of 20 and 14.

Leo Seal scored the other two Redmond touchdowns as he carried the ball on drives of 30 and two yards into paydirt.

Stan Newman countered Lakeview's only score of the evening's grid battle as he tallied on an 8-yard sweep around end in the last quarter. Lakeview threatened in the first period by driving to the Redmond 20, but an incomplete pass in the end zone ended that drive.

who have handed our Oregon men some embarrassing beatings."

Prescott Sullivan of the San Francisco Examiner said after the Webfoots' 25-0 trouncing of Southern Cal last week in Portland:

"We'll always wonder what the score would have been if Casanova—one of the most underrated coaches in the business—went into the game with Hayes' material." Sullivan was thinking not only of Oregon's 10-7 loss to Ohio State, but Oregon's performance against Oklahoma two weeks ago when Oregon topped the statistic department.

It was good to see an ex-Northwest football coach turn the tide as Texas defeated Oklahoma last Saturday. The man in question is Texas coach Darrel Royal.

Royal spent one year at the University of Washington before he realized he was about ready to be mixed up with the Southern Reds, a point he wanted nothing to do with. So the popular ex-Oklahoma star quarterback packed his bags and went to Texas, a school that had been down in football for some time. Darrel was mentioned on all-American selections in 1949 while playing for Bud Wilkinson, the man he defeated in coaching status last Saturday.

Royal, who at Washington in 1953 won five, lost four and tied one, moved into Texas and had a real bad first year, winning only 10. But Texas fans were happy with his job and gave him lots of support. In 1957 he won six and tied one of 10 games. This year—through Saturday's game against Arkansas—Royal's Longhorns had won four straight.

It would seem that Washington's loss was Texas' gain.

Oregon Tech's coaching staff came up with a real fine tribute to the "unsung" standouts of football during Saturday's Homecoming game against Southern Oregon College.

As head coach Rex Hunsaker stated after the game, "The offense is all most of the fans in the stands see at a football game, so today we thought we would give the other side of the football picture a break and put our boys who play defense before the public."

What Hunsaker was talking about was the pre-game introduction of the Oregon Tech defensive unit. The game program also listed the Owls' 11-man defensive lineup. In case some of the fans were wondering why the program had Roy Johnson a quarterback in the starting center spot, and regular quarterback Charlie Ginter also listed, it was because Johnson plays line-backer on defense and quarterback on offense. And a real fine job he does.

Hunsaker and his staff have a real fine idea. There are two sides to football and defense plays a very important part, but it is sometimes overlooked. Give us the best defensive team in the nation and we'll challenge the top offensive club and spot you six points.

Washington Blanked By UCLA Bruins

SEATTLE (AP)—The UCLA Bruins generated a head of steam off the opening kickoff Saturday and, combining passes with a slashing defense, whipped Washington 20-0 for their first Pacific Coast Conference football victory of the season.

With Don Long and Kirk Wilson pitching, and Dick Butler and 187-pound Joe Harper leading the stop department, the Bruins put on a spectacular show in the regionally televised tussle. A Homecoming Day crowd of 33,500 saw six UCLA seniors close out their half-season of eligibility.

Long was one of the half-dozen and he celebrated the end of his collegiate career with three touchdowns passes. The last one, a 9-yard toss to Dick Wallen, was thrown in disdain of an earlier hand injury. Long had been trapped on an intended pass early in the third quarter and his hand was injured when he was smashed down by Washington tacklers on the UCLA 1.

Wilson got the Bruins out of

that trouble with a 66-yard quick kick.

UCLA scored in all but the final period, when a roaring windstorm swept through the field and almost stalled proceedings.

The Bruins had the touchdown route well mapped from the start. Thrusting by ground and air, they marched 78 yards in 12 plays to score after the opening kickoff. Long hit Mary Luster, with a 22-yard pass for that tally, and in the second quarter targeted Jim Steffen with a 25-yard tally toss.

Washington's pass defense was a leaky and its offense sputtered. Three times the Huskies gave away the ball on fumbles and five times they lost it on pass interceptions.

One of these was turned in by Harper, the busy right guard who also pounced on one of the fumbles. Butler at center turned in 12 tackles as the Bruins stopped the Washington ground game. Phil Parslow at right half intercepted two Husky passes and another was speared by tackle Bill Leeka.

Leeka was another of the seniors penalized a year in the conference action against UCLA for illegal payment of athletes. The others were Wallen, Clint Whitfield, Butler and Steve Gertman. All saw action in the Bruin triumph.

Washington's deepest penetration was to the UCLA 7, midway in the second quarter but a clipping penalty yanked the ball back to the Bruins' 28 before Washington could capitalize on the threat.

After their first tally the Bruins never lost command. Late in the first quarter they started a drive on their own 26 and finished it up with Long's toss to Steffen 11 yards into the second period. Steffen kicked the conversion.

Wilson, who had kicked the first conversion, threw the crucial pass in the second touchdown drive. Almost trapped deep in his own territory, he shook free and ached a 51-yard toss to end John Brown for a first down on the Washington 12.

The Bruins had to score twice to make that second touchdown. From his own 8 Long hit Steffen, who made a beautiful catch in the end zone as he tumbled. A 15-yard holding penalty nullified the score and put the ball back to the Washington 25. Long very calmly filled the ball to Steffen again on the 2-yard line and the receiver fell across the goal for the score.

A Leeka interception set up the final score. Starting at the Washington 34 Long hit Wallen for 12 yards, Luster made 10 on a reverse and Long tossed again to Wallen for the counter. An attempted pass for the conversion was incomplete.

Michigan Clobbered

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP)—Northwestern's undefeated Wildcats rose to unbelievable heights Saturday in handing Michigan one of its worst beatings in history, 30-24.

It was the fourth straight victory and the second in Big Ten play for the Wildcats, who last year didn't win a game.

Five touchdowns in the second quarter—four within a period of 7 minutes almost demoralized the Wolverines, who entered the game four point favorites.

Cheers from the crowd of 41,343 turned into uproarious laughter as the Wildcats started turning Michigan errors into touchdowns.

Interceptions, fumbles, some great running by Ron Burton and Wilmer Fowler, and exceptional ball handling and passing by quarterback Dick Thornton all played a part in the Wildcat victory.

Irish Nip Duke
SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP)—Monty Stickles, 235-pound end, snagged an 8-yard scoring pass and booted a 23-yard field goal for all penalty-bogged Notre Dame's scoring in a tough 9-7 football triumph over Duke's Blue Devils Saturday.

In the first gridiron meeting between the two schools, Notre Dame—trailing 7-0 until Stickles booted his perfect three-pointer midway in the third period—Irish quarterback Bob Williams, who tossed the touchdown shot to Stickles early in the first quarter, also held the ball for the field goal.

OCE Drubs PSU
PORTLAND (AP)—An intercepted pass and a fumble paved the way for Oregon College of Education's 22-7 football victory over Portland State here Saturday.

Late in the second half, Stan Kenyon intercepted a Portland State pass and Jack Kapig later dove two yards for the score.

OCE led the Oregon Collegiate Conference triumph early in the second half as Kapig again plunged over from two yards out. That score was set up when OCE recovered a fumble after the seven-minute half.

Only a 73-yard kick return by George Kane with 11 minutes remaining in the game kept Portland State from being shut out.
