LAKEVIEW — The Chiloquin Timber Company of Klamath Falls was successful in the bidding for the Pole Butte timber sale on the Paisley District of the Fremont National Forest Tuesday, October 14, at the office of the supervisor in Lakeview.

The 15,600,000 board feet of ponderosa pine, appraised at \$14.95 per thousand, sold at \$22.10, after 75 raises. White fir and other species in the amount of 1,700,000 board feet went at the appraised price of \$2.35 per thousand.

Ivan Kesterson was the representative for the successful bidder, and Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, the other bidder, was represented by Vincent Bousquet.
