Grand Master Slates Visit

Klamath Lodge 77, Klamath Falls, will be host to lodges of Masonic district 21 Monday, on the occasion of the official visit to the district of Walter L. Lansing, Salem, grand master of Masons in Oregon. The guest lodges will include Paisley 86, Malin 194, Chiloquin 197, Crater Lake 211 of Klamath Falls, Ponderosa 229 of Klamath Falls, and Lakeview 71.

Officers and members of all the lodges in the district will attend, while several other Grand Lodge officers, in addition to Lansing, are expected. Ray M. Grams, Klamath Falls, district deputy of the grand master, is in charge of arrangements.

The grand master will outline his program for the year, with emphasis on the interest Freemasons should be taking in the public schools. Lakeview Lodge 71 and Klamath Lodge 77, chartered in 1878 and 1880, respectively, are two of the oldest Masonic lodges of eastern Oregon.

IOOF Chief Plans Visit

WEED — Donald R. Smith is the youngest person to ever hold that office in the history of Independent Order of Odd Fellows. He was elected and installed grand master, head of the state organization at 25. H. Sanders Angala, vice mayor of Nashville, Tennessee, and retiring sovereign grand master of the international governing body of the order, held the office of grand master of Tennessee at the age of 26.

Named for its designer, the noted sculptor, Saint Gaudens, this design was struck only part of one year, 1907, and then discontinued since the high relief made the coin difficult to stack and roll and caused excessive wear in a short time.

New members of the Klamath Stamp and Coin Club are Mollie St. John Brooks and David Griffith. The club now has 70 members, including five members from Chiloquin, four from Springfield, and one each from Portland, Bend, Grants Pass and Medford.

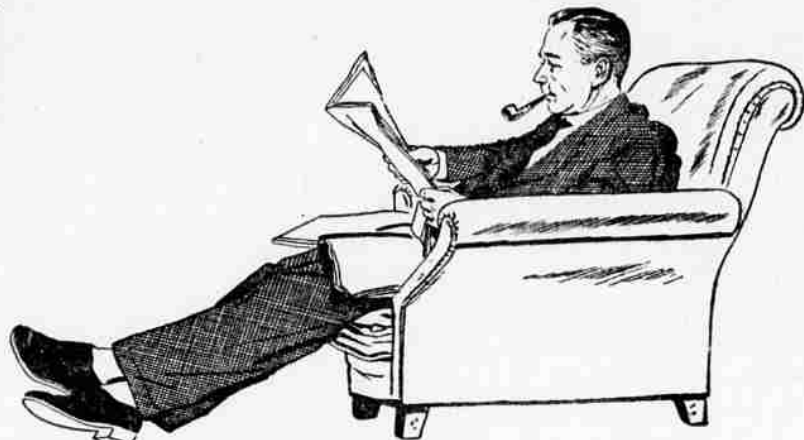

MONTAGUE — Lee Owen, field representative of the Youth Authority from Sacramento, appeared as guest speaker before members of the Montague Parent Teachers Association at a meeting held in the multipurpose room of the Montague school on Thursday evening, October 16.

The executive board of the Montague PTA met Tuesday evening, October 14, at the school. The spring production of another variety show in March with Mrs. Maxine Foote named as the director and general chairman of the event was discussed.

It was decided that letters would be mailed to all parents, requesting that anyone interested in assisting with the production will be welcomed. There will be a need for seamstresses to help with costumes, makeup, ticket and candy sales, as well as participate in the show itself. Mrs. Foote stated that last spring's production had over 100 persons, many of them non-members of the PTA, working on various phases of the show. Dates set for the show are March 5, 6 and 7, 1959.

The regular meeting of the Mills School PTA was held in the school auditorium on October 8 at 2:15 p.m. The meeting was called to order by Mrs. Murray Britton, president.

Peggy Barnes was appointed chairman of the bylaws committee, with Mrs. Leonard and Mrs. Bryant, assisting.

Peggy Barnes also introduced the speaker, Bob Bonney. Bonney, city recreation director, gave facts and figures on the need for local support of the proposition on the November ballot which asks the voters of the city of Klamath Falls to approve a \$27,900 increase to the city park and recreation department.

In 1953 residents of Klamath Falls were paying \$3.70 per capita taxes, which sum has now dropped to \$2.70, or a loss of revenue of \$1 per capita while the population has increased 30.2 per cent and participation and attendance in recreation areas has increased 24.5 per cent.

Ten years ago the city had four playgrounds, Stukel, Moore Park, Alameda and Hot Springs. Today there are 12.

While the per capita total for recreation has dropped, Bonney said, attendance in the various recreation areas, which now include the city swimming pool, an ice rink, boat launching ramp, sled run, Gem Stadium, Kiwanis Park, Conger Field, Fairview Recreation Field, Henderson Park, Veterans Memorial Park and Kit Carson Way Park now under construction, has jumped from 350,000 to 850,000 participants.

The amount asked for on the ballot is for continued operation and maintenance of the fine recreation facilities already established. Bonney stated.
