Pair Slated For Return

Two men, both wanted for violations involving bad checks, are to be returned here soon, Sheriff Murray Britton said Tuesday.

Wanted here are Kermit Francis Brooks, 33, now being held in the Oakland, California, jail, and Lewis E. Baker, 26, now in a federal institution at LaTuna, Texas.

Britton said Brooks was wanted for writing several bad checks in the Chiloquin area, one of them for \$40. He said the alleged offenses occurred in 1953. Oakland authorities arrested Brooks on a Klamath County warrant and then found they wanted him themselves.

Baker, the sheriff said, is about to complete a term at LaTuna and will be returned here on a circuit court bench warrant charging violation of probation. He was sentenced November 1, 1952 to five years in the penitentiary on a check charge, but was placed on probation. Subsequently, the sheriff said, he allegedly wrote worthless checks amounting to \$66 and \$56, on July 20, 1957, forging the name of Robert F. Hartley.

Britton said Deputy Sheriff Del Summers would return Brooks from Oakland when extradition processes have been completed — probably next week — and Deputy Dale Mattoon would leave for Texas after Baker's release November 16.

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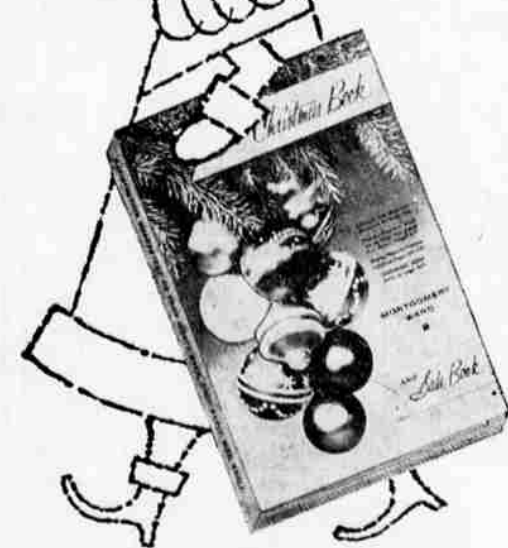
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
