

Football's a big and happy family. Both collegiate and professional football fans have been hearing charge and counter charge this past week on everything from cheating to poor officiating.

In college football, Ohio State coach Woody Hayes isn't bowling over his opponents by 50 points as he likes to do, so it's poor officiating which kills defensive play. And Kansas coach Jack Mitchell joins hands with Hayes as the two do a war dance in hopes of frightening away all pigskin arbitrators.

On the pro front, Los Angeles defensive back Don Burroughs and Chicago Bear coach George Halas engage in a shoving war in a game, after which the Rams say the Bears tapped their scouting phones and knew what the Los Angeles club was doing before quarterback Billy Wade called the play. Meanwhile, the Washington Redskins owner goes to a Baltimore Colts booster meeting and calls a Colt footballer a liar.

Hayes' Buckeyes have been pushed harder than most experts expected and may be needing an excuse for their alumni. Some fans across the country may agree with Hayes and Mitchell that officials leave a lot to be desired, but there are few who will go along with Hayes' program to disguise his team's inability to clobber everything the Buckeyes meet—such as last New Year's Rose Bowl game against Oregon.

Being an official, of any type, is not an easy job, or there would be more of them around. But like Joe Kuharich, Washington Redskins coach, says if the game is played correctly and all rules are followed, there won't be any hard feelings. If everything was followed to the letter, there wouldn't be any need for officials.

Chicago was the scene of some very interesting copy earlier this week. The Rams blasted the Bears and the Bears in turn ripped the Rams. Everybody's happy.

The Rams say the Bears tapped their scouting phones from the press box to the bench on the field. When the Rams scouts would send instructions the Bears would be ready. In fact, one Ram scout in the box said every time he rang the LA bench, one of the assistants on the Chicago bench would lift up a second phone on the Bears side of the field. The Rams point out that when Del Schofner went back on a fake punt the Bears seemed to know he intended passing and didn't rush in.

Come to think of it, the whole situation sounds phony. Not to say anything about the Rams being penalized 100 yards in the first half compared to the Bears five.

Now for the Chicago side of the story. Halas, who had his hands full on the field during the game, said afterwards he thought the Rams were "terrible" for threatening to get Bear halfback Willie Gailimore out of the game, says Halas, "This type of thing should never be said in pro football, that isn't the way the game is played."

But what the naive Halas doesn't say is that his Cards and other teams around the National Football League seem to have forgotten the opposing defensive teams "shoot" for quarterbacks. Bobby Lane, Norm Van Brocklin, Y. A. Little or Johnny Unitas when the Lions, Steelers, Rams, 49ers or Colts were moving. That's why thousands and thousands of fans turn out every Saturday. Pro football is not a game for youngsters and Halas knows it.

The story of the week that takes the cake comes from Baltimore. Seems the Colt boosters were having a luncheon meeting and Washington Redskins owner George Preston Marshall was a special guest. When Colt center Buzz Nutter jokingly remarked during the program that he was cut from the skins, told to go back to college and that he had to "thumb his way" out of Washington, Mar-

shall leaped to his feet, banged his forehead with one hand, then rushed to the microphone, pushing Nutter aside.

"This young gentleman," he boomed, "is a liar."
Needless to say, the festive, party air dissipated in a wink and even a quick apology by Nutter, who admitted he was "riding" Marshall, failed to soothe the Redskins boss. Marshall remarked later that he came to the luncheon to be entertained and if that was the kind of a meeting the Colts were having, then leave the outsiders out.

One big happy family.
A hard-driving fullback who likes to run like the wind during the game and take a somewhat slower pace during practice, Earl Green, has moved into the lead of most Oregon Tech football offensive statistics this week.

Green, a brute-force runner from Sacramento, has taken over the rushing leadership from teammates Charlie (Go Go) Wilson and Al (Tiger) Everson with a total of 276 net yards in 62 carries for an average of 4.4 yards per carry.

The transfer from American River Junior College also leads the Owls in scoring with 25 points. Green's 13 points against Southern Oregon College last Saturday placed him atop the Oregon Collegiate Conference point ladder, one ahead of Portland State's George Kane and Southern Oregon's Larry Maurer.

Quarterback Charlie Gantler leads the team in total offense via passing and running with a total of 515 yards, all in the air. Wilson tops the club in over-all offensive figures with 190 yards rushing and 165 more on pass receptions giving him a season high of 355 yards in five games for an average of 71 yards per game.

Oregon To Meet Cal Bears

The California Bears, who must entertain Oregon suitably before entertaining further Rose Bowl ambitions too seriously, probably will be under full strength when they meet the Ducks Saturday.

But the odds—which appear to favor Oregon slightly—may not be tilted by this intelligence. It appears the Ducks will be a couple of men short themselves.

Cal's team physician, Brick Muller, said Tuesday that the Bears can forget about first-string center Frank Doretti for the weekend. He's got a sprained ankle and a bruised knee.

And it appears doubtful that No. 2 quarterback Gus Gianullas, out for the past two weeks with a pulled leg muscle, will be ready to go against Oregon.

At Eugene, there were indications the Ducks may have to get along without two first-unit linemen, guard Joe Schaffel and tackle Jim Linden. Schaffel has a wrenched knee and Linden a high temperature.

Southern California and Washington State, principals in the other key Coast Conference game this weekend, appear better off physically.

Willie Wood, the No. 1 USC quarterback who has been out three weeks with a shoulder injury will almost certainly be able to play at least part time at Spokane Saturday. And Clark Holden, the fullback bothered by a charley-horse most of the season, is just about fully recovered.

Quarterback Bobby Newman, the nation's leading passer, showed no effects of a recent knee injury during Washington State's workout Tuesday. He was able to play only part time last week, when the Cougars beat Oregon.

WSC, still a formidable Rose Bowl candidate with a 3-1 conference record, worked Tuesday on a defense against Wood's passing and USC's swift halfback Angelo Cal. "If we have any hopes of winning that one," said Cougar Coach Jim Sutherland, "we've got to stop Cal and Wood."

At Oregon State and Washington, the coaches apparently had the same strategy in mind. OSC Coach Tommy Prothro put four different fullbacks through a long passing drill and Washington Coach Jim Owens had his quarterbacks go through a full set of pass patterns against an Oregon State defensive setup. The teams play Saturday in Portland.

In Los Angeles, UCLA Coach Bill Barnes named the players he'll use against Stanford Saturday as replacements for the seniors he lost last week through PCC penalties. All-America end Dick Wallen will be replaced by John Brown, tailback Don Long by Chuck Kendall, guard Clint Whitfield by Bob King, tackle Bill Leeka by Paul Oglesby and center Dick Butler by Harry Baldwin. The Bruins also lost quarterback Steve Gertman through penalties for illegal aid to athletes, but he was injured and not playing regularly.

The Stanford game, at Memorial Coliseum, will be UCLA's homecoming.

UO-Oklahoma Movie Slated

A movie of the 1958 Oregon-Oklahoma football game will be the feature of a special Pelican Booster Club meeting to be held in the Willard Hotel at 6:30 this evening.

Denny Moyer Pockets Win Over Saxton

PORTLAND (AP)—Denny Moyer won his 17th straight bout Tuesday night—over a former champion who now has fought only twice in the past 13 months.

Former welterweight champion Johnny Saxton was bleeding heavily from the mouth—and covering up—when the 10-round bout ended.

Saxton had set a fast pace in the first two rounds, and had carried the fight to the 19-year-old, undefeated Moyer.

But by the third round, Saxton began to tire. And he was very tired when Moyer dropped him to the canvas in the 10th for the fight's only knockdown.

In both the eighth and ninth rounds, Moyer drove Saxton into the ropes, and the former champion appeared ready to go down. Both times he rallied.

It was a different story in the 10th.

Moyer slammed a right to Saxton's head, and the New Yorker settled into a kind of squatting position on the ropes.

Then Saxton shuffled across the ring, Moyer in pursuit. The young Portland fighter caught up with Saxton, and belted him to the head again.

This time Saxton fell to the canvas. He took an eight count, rose and for the remainder of the round covered up—and drew a chorus of boos from a crowd of 1,358.

Moyer had a wide margin on all cards: 60-50 from referee Herman Volk, and 61½-48½ from judges Herman DeVault and Mike Smith.

The announced gate was \$3,707.

Young Mentor Opens Practice

WALTHAM, Mass. (AP)—Rudy Finderson, who graduated last June from Brandeis, greets candidates for the university's 1958-59 basketball team today as one of the nation's youngest head coaches.

A native of Cliffside Park, N.J., the 21-year-old Finderson was named head coach of Brandeis basketball Tuesday, succeeding Harry Stein, who moved up to director of physical education and intramural activities.

Finderson established virtually every Brandeis scoring record in four years of varsity play. He scored a total of 1,733 points, averaging 20.6 in 84 games.

Brown Nearing NFL High

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Statistics are proving what many opposing football players already accept as fact—that Jim Brown may be the greatest rusher in the history of the National Football League.

Official NFL figures released today show that the bruising fullback of the Eastern Division—leading Cleveland Browns—is well on his way to setting a rushing record for one season and also has a good shot at a scoring record.

The former Syracuse star has accounted for 635 yards on 94 running attempts in the Browns' four winning efforts this year. That figures out to a 6.8 yard average per carry and a game average of almost 159 yards. The game figure is about 65 yards more than Steve Van Buren averaged when he set the present NFL league rushing record with 1,146 yards for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1949.

Another big reason for the Browns' success is rookie Bob Mitchell whose season total of 370 yards rushing is second best in the league. Mitchell has averaged 8.8 yards for each of his 42 runs. Tom Wilson of Los Angeles is a distant third with 302 yards by running.

Eddie Lebaron of the Washington Redskins, John Brodie of San Francisco and John Unitas of Baltimore continue to head the passers. Lebaron has the best average gain per pass attempt, 9.70 yards. Brodie has the best completion average, 58.3 per cent in 68 attempts. Unitas' passing has accounted for the most yards, 907.

Brown heads the scoring parade with 10 touchdowns for 60 points in his four games. The league record for TDs in one season is 18 in 10 games by Van Buren.

Willie Gailimore of the Chicago Bears has 42 points for second place in the scoring race.

Ray Berry of the Colts has caught the most passes in the 1958 season, 23 good for 361 yards. But Del Schofner of the Los Angeles Rams has gained the most yards, 424 in 19 catches.

The Pelicans get their second taste of Southern Oregon Conference football action this weekend as they host the powerful Grants Pass Cavemen on Modoc Field Friday night.

The contest with the Cavemen will be the highlight of a Homecoming celebration on the KU campus. In addition to the preparations being made by coach Andy Knudsen and his gridders for the Grants Pass invasion the festivities will be complete with a queen, four princesses, a huge bonfire and rally to be held Thursday night, a pep rally and assembly Friday afternoon and a gala dance to be staged in Pelican Court following the football game.

In 1957 the Pelicans fell 40-0 to the Cavemen on the Grants Pass gridiron, a victory that gave the Grants Passers an eight-straight edge over the Pels, the KU squad having lost every game between the two since 1950.

In the Cavemen, the Pels face a team that bodes trouble in any league, being ranked eighth in the state off a 3-win, 2-tied, 1-loss record to date. The Grants Passers collected convincing wins over Albany and Central Point and just this past weekend romped to an easy 33-7 victory over the Ashland Grizzlies. Coach Mel Ingram's squad stood powerful Marshfield to a 6-6 tie and drew a 0-0 decision with Roseburg. Their only loss of the season was at the hands of North Bend, 7-0, in their second outing this year. Following this week's match with the Pels the Cavemen stand idle for a week and then meet the Medford Black Tornado in what could be the league decider on November 7. Grants Pass has scored 84 points.
