## Ernie Banks Voted UPI's Top NL Star

NEW YORK (UPI) — Ernie Banks, perhaps the National League's best shortstop since Honus Wagner, was an overwhelming choice today as the United Press International's 1953 National League Player of the Year.

The 27-year-old Banks, who set a major league record for shortstops by hitting 47 homers and sparked the Chicago Cubs to tie for fifth place, was the choice of 22 of the 24 baseball writers who made up UPI's special committee.

Second baseman Bill Mazaroski of the Pittsburgh Pirates and pitcher Lew Burdette of the league champion Milwaukee Braves received one vote each. The committee was composed of three writers from each city in the league.

Banks, a lithe, 180-pound Negro from Dallas, Tex., enjoyed the finest season of his career. His 47 homers broke a record which he previously had set in 1952, he drove in 129 runs and he batted .313. All this while playing his position flawlessly.

Shorts on last weekend's Oregon Tech - Southern football game:

Ex-OTI quarterback Jack Brown who is now playing for Southern Oregon told Tech coach Rex Hunsaker after the game he didn't see anything all afternoon except a wall of blue (OTI uniform colors) ... and Brown's words have backing ... OTI intercepted four of Jack's tosses ... he only completed four, a season low.

The Tech coaching staff found a punter with a heavy toe when they cleared their bench in the fourth quarter ... freshman Troy Kootz, a halfback, fullback, end, center or what-have-you from the small community of Brownsville got away two kicks for 95 total yards, an average of 47.5 per boot.

Besides that, Kootz, who hadn't played prior to the SOC contest, carried the ball three times for 12 yards and an average of 4 yards per try ... the Owl coaching staff is very high on this B Shrine game star and is counting on lots of football from him in the next few years.

The last extra point didn't mean too much to the OTI football team ... while coaches Hunsaker, Carr and Miller were searching to get a complete PAT unit on the field, most of the Tech gridders were crowded around the front of the Southern Oregon College routing section trying to get the "Owl" and "Tomahawk" back from the Red Raiders ... every athletic event between the two schools features the presence of these two items ... if SOC wins the Ashland students get the stuffed bird and Indian war weapon ... if Tech wins, as was the case, then the Mile High Campus houses the two items ... and judging from the OTI footballers' interest before the game was officially over, they really wanted the trophies back on this side of the mountains.

Public address announcer Jim Boyle is still smiling over a tackle credit he made during the game ... with the Owls in possession of the ball, fullback Earl Green broke through the line for a nice gain and at the last second when in the SOC secondary he decided to change direction ... standing right in his path was Bill Graham, manager of the local Johns-Manville plant, who was one of the game's four officials. ... Green ran right over the top of Graham but couldn't keep his balance and fell ... over the PA speaker came Green carries for a gain of seven yards, the stop made by Graham.

Southern Oregon's passing attack rated fifth in the nation among small college statistics keepers last week at this time ... we haven't seen the "stats" this week, but doubt it the Raiders are still one of the nation's leading passing clubs after running up against a stubborn OTI aerial defense. ... Southern Oregon completed only four of 17 attempts via the air lanes, had four intercepted and gained only 44 yards ... you don't keep pace on a national scale with only 44 yards a game.

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## Matthews Captures Ring Win

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — You'd hardly guess by listening to young Len Matthews today that the unbeaten lightweight prospect had just successfully passed his most important ring test.

Somewhat dejected despite his unanimous 10-round decision Tuesday night over crafty Orlando Zulueta, Matthews complained, "I never really got a good shot at him. He taught me a lot but I'd like to fight someone who would throw more punches."

Zulueta, 30-year-old Cuban veteran of 110 fights, seemed relieved that he had survived two knockdowns and lasted the distance.

"The kid's got class," Zulueta said.

The bout was the 15th for Matthews, a 19-year-old Philadelphia who only once before had gone 10 rounds. The greater experience of the Cuban showed in early rounds when he held his own strictly on his boxing and countering punches.

He inflicted an inch-and-a-half gash over Matthews' left eyebrow midway through the fourth round. As Matthews explained it afterwards: "I wanted to get him suddenly, as fast as I could." He said trainer Quenzell McCall warned him against this, cautioning that he might leave himself open.

Matthews, at 133, two pounds less than Zulueta, said he took McCall's advice, but it didn't look it from ringside. He started moving faster and throwing harder and more often, apparently worried that ring physician Alfred Ayella Jr. would stop the fight.

Zulueta, whose record now is 63-36-11, couldn't cope with Matthews after that. He was floored in the sixth for the mandatory eight count when Matthews caught him off balance. Then a left uppercut and a right to the head in the seventh put him down with authority.

The Cuban, who had been knocked down previously only by lightweight champion Joe Brown, was through at this point.

He clinched more and resorted more to using his head at close quarters in a futile attempt to open the cut beyond repair.

## Chicago Cards Adding New Formations To National Football League Program

CHICAGO (AP) — This is the year of varied formations and the Chicago Cardinals are adding spice to the already hopped-up National Football League.

Coach Frank Ivy, who took over this season after winning three Grey Cups in four years with Edmonton in the Canadian League, has introduced the double wing-T and triple wing-T in the pro loop.

His success is a matter of record. The Cardinals are tied for second place in the Eastern Division and lead the entire league in total offense. They have lost two of their four games only because of failings on defense.

Ivy's innovations come from Canadian football, which is played with 12 men who toss the ball around as if they were on a basketball court.

These wing formations enable a team to exploit the passing game as attested by the Cardinal record of 63 completions in 119 attempts for 1,023 yards and 8 touchdowns.

"We may sacrifice a little straight power," says Ivy, "but we also have four or five men to pass to quickly. Also our backs are close enough so that they can take the ball and run with it."

In the double wing-T, the Cardinals split their ends as wide as desired. The quarterback and fullback remain in regular T-formations.

This gives the halfbacks an advantage of several yards if they are used as pass receivers. They can also pull back and block for the passer.

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
