Bruce Frojen, in charge of the program, showed a Disney film on Alaska. The next meeting will be November 18.

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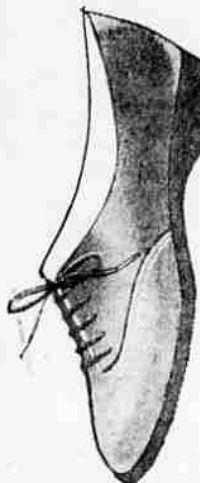
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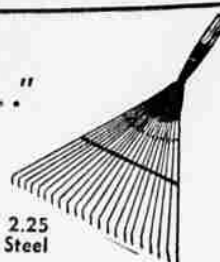
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
