There are three more days of deer hunting in Oregon and the woods throughout the state are expected to get a heavy play this weekend as hunters go all out to fill their unused tags. Anticipating one of the heaviest last weekend efforts, the Oregon State Game Commission has urged all hunters in the woods to use extra caution and help avoid accidents.

The general deer season (bucks) and the special unit hunts for either sex deer both close Sunday evening. Due to the low percentage of kill so far this season, credited mostly to the dry weather conditions, more hunters than usual will be out seeking to punch their tags. It's in these circumstances that hunters get careless with firearms and people get hurt.

Last weekend's rain and snow storms, the latter dropping lots of that white stuff on the higher elevations, started the deer moving into lower portions of the country. Reports reaching us at midweek indicated the rush of deer and hunters was on in the state line area. This is one of the finest hunting spots in the state when the deer are moving.

Observers in the Gerber Reservoir area also reported seeing more deer on the move, including many fawns and small three points. Blacktail deer seem to be on the move to the west of Klamath Falls. These animals stop Pelican Butte and other higher spots didn't care too much for the snow dropped on them last weekend and are moving down at a fast rate. Hunters should have fairly good results for the blacktail, especially if another storm hits Sunday.

CLEVELAND (AP) — The big wampum bearers in the Cleveland Indians' wigwam had their fingers in the war paint today, and it probably will be many moons before peace pipes glow again.

The current conflict comes hard upon a tribal decision not to seek a happier hunting ground south of the plains country at Houston or in the land of the sky blue water at Minneapolis.

Lined up on one side of the teepee are Charles M. Baxter Jr., his brother, Andy Baxter, and Hank Greenberg.

On the other side, controlling about two-thirds of the wampum invested in the Tribe are big chief William R. Daley and other stockholders.

Newman Collects Honors

The best football player in Oregon last week was quarterback Bobby Newman of Washington State, an Associated Press Regional Advisory Board said today.

And with his brief but brilliant performance, Newman became a leading candidate for All-Coast honors, said the board—which will pick those stars.

On a rain-soaked field at Eugene last Saturday, Newman went into the game with a knee injury, spurred a faltering drive and then dove over for a touchdown that beat Oregon 6-0.

"Anyone who can come in there with one leg and keep a drive going is a pretty fair boy," said one member of the board.

"Washington state doesn't win without Newman," he said.

When Newman hobbled off the bench Saturday in the game's second quarter, he flipped a crucial pass and later ran the final yard into the end zone.

"If he hadn't thrown that pass, called those signals or sneaked over, the score would have been 0-0," said the board member.

That touchdown gave WSC a 3-1 Pacific Coast Conference record, and kept the Cougars in contention for the title and trip to the Rose Bowl.

When told of Newman's selection, Washington State coach Jim Sutherland said: "That's wonderful. I'm sorry he didn't play more."

And when Newman was advised, he said: "It's a very great honor."

The 6-2, 190-pound senior from El Cerrito, Calif., last season led the Cougars in both passing and yardage gained.

Other board members called the 22-year-old Newman "A master of the air," and "A most poised passer."

Two 5B Grid Clashes Highlight Festival

County football fans get a double dose of District 5B action Saturday as a pair of games provide the sports highlight of the annual Potomac Festival in Merrill.

The afternoon half of the big event will pit the powerful Merrill Huskies, who are leading the pack with a 5-0 conference record, against the Jacksonville Redskins, probably the last remaining major obstacle to Merrill supremacy, in a contest to start at 2 p.m.

In the nighttime which gets underway at 7:30, the Malin Mustangs (3-2) clash with the ever dangerous Chiloquin Panthers (2-3). The Mustang-Panther battle, an annual affair, is noted for being one of the hardest fought battles in county play.

The Redskins, Merrill's foe, are currently coholders of second place on the league ladder with the Bonanza Antlers. Each owns a 4-1 mark. Bonanza, however, has already tangled with the Merrill eleven and picked up its only loss in the process. Jacksonville suffered its defeat at the hands of Bonanza.

Friday night the Antlers travel to Medford for a bout with the St. Marys Crusaders (2-3) while the Sacred Heart Trojans play host to the Talent Bulldogs in Gem Stadium. Both Talent and Sacred Heart are seeking their first victory.

WARY OF REDSKINS — Coach Al Keck's Merrill squad, despite the fact that they seem just too much for their 5B competitors, have been drilling hard in practice sessions this week being careful to avoid any feeling of over-confidence in relation to their meeting with the Redskins.

Jacksonville, the cream of the Medford side of the conference, is no pushover, their loss to the charged-up Bonanzas notwithstanding. They have turned back Chiloquin, Talent, St. Marys and Sacred Heart with little trouble. Said Keck as he watched his Merrill squad, divided into an offensive and defensive unit, scrimmage.

Despite a highly successful 4-1-1 season to date the Henley Hornets are watching their chance of gaining a Little Rogue Conference championship slowly fade, being powerless to stop the progress of the Eagle Point Eagles, who, currently riding first place with only one "counter" remaining, have only to get by the last place Rogue River Rogues to pick up all the marbles.

Action scheduled for this weekend finds both the Hornets and the Eagles stepping out of the conference to take on "non-counting" foe.

A Henley win over Phoenix (the last game of the season) must combine with an Eagle Point loss if the Hornets are to salvage at least a tie. The Henley win seems guaranteed but an Eagle loss would be the upset of the year.

Henley, 3-1 in conference play, dropped a heartbreaker to Eagle Point in their first league test, when they were forced to take the field minus the services of a number of regulars sidelined because of injuries. That game made the big difference. Since that time the Hornets have swept past all comers. During the six games to date the Henleyites have scored 103 points to 37 for their opposition.

The Hornets host Surprise Valley in a contest to be played on the Henley gridiron beginning at 1:30 p.m. Saturday. The game will be the second home appearance of coach Ted Ammerman's able 11.

The Surprise Valley Hornets, a little known squad from Northern California currently holds a tie for the lead in their own conference. Coached by Chet Lissey, the Surprise Valley team has lost only one game this year. According to Ammerman, "We are not taking them lightly, counter or not."

Eagle Point has accepted a challenge from Douglas of Winston for this week's match and then will meet Rogue River on Halloween. Henley meets the Phoenix Pirates in the season wrap up November 1, at Henley.

Are the Oregon Ducks so worried about their game with California Saturday that they've forgotten what sport they're playing? Hardly seems possible since the Ducks are favored, but Wednesday they started their daily football drill in the Oregon basketball pavilion.

Coach Len Casanova wasn't so far gone he had them playing with a round ball. He simply wanted them to work out in gym shoes against Cal's split-T offense.

The drill ended conventionally on the football field, where the Ducks held a 25-minute scrimmage. One end, Aden Kimbrough, turned an ankle during the contact session. And another, Ron Stover, was still troubled by a leg injury suffered in the Washington State game last week. Both he and Kimbrough are expected to play Saturday, however.

At Berkeley, California halfback Gus Gianulias was declared definitely out of the Oregon game because of a back ailment. The Bears earlier lost center Frank Doretti, who has a sprained ankle and bruised knee. On the credit side, starting halfback Hank Olgun was back with the team and is expected to be ready to play. He sprained an ankle last week.

The Bears, hoping to improve their Rose Bowl prospects with an upset victory over the Ducks, drilled two hours and spent 15 minutes scrimmaging.

Washington State, another Rose Bowl contender facing a tough weekend, juggled its personnel a bit Wednesday. Ted Cano, once a starting left halfback, was moved to fullback to back up Chuck Morrill and Eddie Stevens. The Cougars lost a fullback recently when Carl Ketchie was moved over to left half. In another move, reserve center Kevin Scanlan shifted to guard to help take up the slack left by the injury of Angelo Brovelli.

Southern California, Washington State's opponent at Spokane Saturday, had two reserve quarterbacks running with its first unit Wednesday. But Willie Wood, the No. 1 man, is almost certain to start against the Cougars. He has been passing up contact work to prevent a recurrence of his shoulder injury—a disability that kept him out of three games.

At Oregon State, Coach Tommy Prothro said Dainard Paulson will be his starting fullback Saturday against Washington. Prothro said he plans to use Grimm Mason, injured several weeks ago, part time Saturday.

Washington Coach Jim Owens said his Huskies should be about as close to full strength as they've been since the first game of the season. He emphasized pass defense in Wednesday's drills.

At Stanford, there was a man over in the corner of the practice field mulling "butterfingers, butterfingers." He was Coach Jack Curcio and his mulling was eminently justified. The Indians have fumbled 24 times in five games—and they were doing it in practice Wednesday. There was more bad news, too. Rick McMillen, Stanford's top back, will be out of the UCLA game Saturday because of a strained foot.

The Bruins held a two-hour closed drill at Los Angeles. They've been working out in private all week. Coach Bill Barnes has promised he'll have something new to add to his single-wing offense in Saturday's homecoming game.
