

Sugar Ray Mapping Tour For Johansson

SEATTLE (AP) — Banquets and exhibition bouts and even a meeting with former president Harry Truman in Kansas City are on the schedule for Ingemar Johansson when the Swedish boxer visits America next month.

It would be no surprise if the No. 1 heavyweight challenger even tried a little tap dancing.

He has hooked up for the tour with the multi-talented middle-

weight champion, Sugar Ray Robinson. Sugar Ray doubles as night club entertainer, entrepreneur and all-round business man.

At stopovers on the tour Sugar Ray's troupe will provide the entertainment. It will include exhibitions de boxe by Maas, Johansson, Robinson and Gustav (Bubi) Scholz, who is Germany's middleweight king and nearly as hot a listie property in Europe as is Ingemar.

Joe Louis and Max Schmeling will accompany the party, but their roles have not been disclosed. Louis, at least, is a bit too heavy to fight or dance.

The party will arrive in Seattle Nov. 14 and on Nov. 16 will put on their show at the Civic Auditorium. That same day, a banquet will honor Johansson, whose chief claim to fame is a one-round kayo victory over Eddie Machon. This bout made him the top contender for Floyd Patterson's world championship crown.

It also prompted a syndicate of local business men to dream up a Johansson-Patterson title bout for Seattle next June. Bob Odman, spokesman for the group, says the champ has been offered \$250,000—the going rate—and Ingemar \$100,000 for the bout.

There will be more of this project when it is in town, and a banquet just might show up unannounced is Gus D'Amato, Patterson's manager.

Edvin Ahlqvist, agent or adviser or business manager—it isn't quite clear—for Johansson will be here, too. He may find time for a brief or longer discussion with the State Athletic Commission which claims his protegee ran out on a fight with Pat McMurry of Tacoma last summer.

The troupe is programmed to visit Vancouver, Canada, Nov. 18 to repeat its show. After that it was to have flown to Anchorage, Alaska, to put on another exhibition before Ingemar and Edvin grabbed a Scandinavian Airline plane for a homeward hop over the pole.

But now, says Odman, Mr. Truman has invited Johansson et al to visit him and appear at—Odman says—a "society benefit" Nov. 25 in Kansas City for the Truman Library, so the Alaska visit probably will be delayed.

McAlvin In Semi Round Of Senior Play

PINEHURST, N. C. (AP) — James H. McAlvin of Lake Forest, Ill., who teetered on the brink of elimination on qualifying day, was the newest star of the show today as the North and South Seniors Golf Tournament moved into the semifinals.

McAlvin met southpaw Jack Brittain Sr., of Woodhaven, N.Y., and Capt. Frederick Holmes of Riviera Beach, Fla., faced J. Wolcott Brown of Sea Girt, N.J., in 18-hole matches. The winners meet Saturday, also over the 18-hole route.

McAlvin was one of 11 men to shoot 78 in the medal round Monday. They had to play off for the last seven places in match play Tuesday morning. McAlvin won his place and has been winning ever since, including a 21-hole second round match.

He gained his semifinals berth Thursday with a rousing 3 and 2 trouncing of John McGuire of Martinsville, Ind. McGuire was fresh from a semifinal victory over Tom Robbins, the medalist, current U. S. Golf Assn. Senior champion and 1956 North and South Senior title.

Brittain, ousted Chick Evans of Chicago 2 and 1.

Brown, the reigning Southern Seniors champion and in his first North and South Seniors, trailed W. E. Baker of Durham, N. C., until he won the seventh and eighth holes to take the lead he never lost.

Holmes edged Eugene Pittman of Washington, D. C., 2 and 1.

Ducks Face Crucial Play Against Cal

EUGENE (AP)—Armed with a few new ideas, Oregon embarks today for Berkeley and a crucial Pacific Coast Conference football game Saturday with California.

A defeat for Oregon, coach Len Casanova said Thursday night, would mean that it was just another football season for the Ducks.

"It's a very important game," he said. "We have lost one conference game. California has lost none. We can't lose any more and have a chance at the title."

California now is astride the PCC with a 2-0 record. Oregon, after a 6-0 defeat last week by Washington State, is 2-1.

Oregon has yielded only 12 points in four games—but Casanova said the Ducks will have to be equally stubborn on defense to top California.

"California has a very strong offensive team. Even when they have been beaten, they have scored at least 14 points," Casanova said.

"We fell down on our fundamentals last week, things like tackling. We've had several good practices this week. The kids have worked hard."

"We're in pretty good shape. We're a pretty fast team and I hope it's dry in Berkeley. We've made a few offensive changes. We've got a few new ideas. I hope they work," he said.

"We got only two shots off in the last three minutes and we must have thrown the ball away. I don't know how many times."

George Yardley, the Pistons' league-scoring champ last season with 2,001 points, led both teams with 28, but was held scoreless during Detroit's late surge. Bob Pettit was high for the Hawks with 23.

McCORMACK SIDLINED — CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — The Cleveland Browns announced Thursday that Mike McCormack, offensive tackle and co-captain, may be sidelined for the rest of the campaign because of a knee injury suffered against Pittsburgh last Sunday.

Their running games, however, have become just as feared.

This doesn't mean that quarterbacks John Unitas of the Colts and Eddie LeBaron of the Redskins have become mere hand-off men. They're still passing and hitting.

Unitas has completed 60 out of 118 for eight touchdowns. LeBaron has thrown only 33 times and connected on 30. Four went for touchdowns.

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Beaver Boss Warns Club About UW

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Washington is a sound, posed football club despite its 0-2 Pacific Coast Conference record, says coach Tommy Prothro.

Prothro made the comment Thursday night as he finished grooming his up-and-down Oregon State team for a PCC encounter with the Huskies Saturday in Portland's Multnomah Stadium.

A crowd of 25,000 is expected. It was at the stadium last year that unranked Washington battered Oregon State's co-champions 19-6.

"Washington is a real good ball club. They mainly are a running team, but they've been passing a lot lately, too. I certainly think they will be tough," Prothro said.

"We're just going to go into the game, look at what they're doing against and try to do something else."

A defeat would spell a virtual end to OSC's title hopes, for the Beavers now have a 2-1 record.

And Oregon State, a pre-season pick as the power of the conference, twice has been upended by teams it was a heavy favorite to beat.

But Prothro said nearly all the players now have recovered from injuries. "We're in better shape than we've been for several weeks."

Fullback Jan Stinnette is a doubtful starter, the coach said. But tailback Grimm Mason, a spectacular runner, is off the injured list for the first time in weeks.

Washington is scheduled to arrive in Portland today, but the Beavers won't leave here until late Saturday morning.

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Montreal Canadiens Blast Black Hawks

The honeymoon apparently is over for the Chicago Black Hawks. After winning three and tying one of their first four games in the National Hockey League, the Hawks now have lost their last three and are in third place following a 9-1 humiliating setback Thursday night at the hands of the pace setting Montreal Canadiens.

The Hawks could have moved into a tie for first with a victory but instead they fell back a notch as the Detroit Red Wings downed the Boston Bruins 3-1 in the league's only other game.

Chicago was in contention only for one period in their game with the defending champion. Tod Sloan's goal gave them a 1-1 tie after 20 minutes of play. Then they faded rapidly as the powerful Canadiens swept through the Hawks' defense for three goals in

the second period and five in the final. Four of the last period goals came in three minutes and nine seconds of play.
