Former manager of the Washington, D.C. office of the Christian Science Committee on Publication, Mr. Watt has traveled widely.

During World War II, he served as chaplain in the United States Army. A graduate of the Illinois Institute of Technology, he was formerly associated with various engineering companies in the United States and abroad. Later he was director of research and western manager for the Advertising Checking Bureau, with headquarters in Chicago. He has devoted his full time to the practice of Christian Science healing and to the service of the Christian Science organization since 1942.

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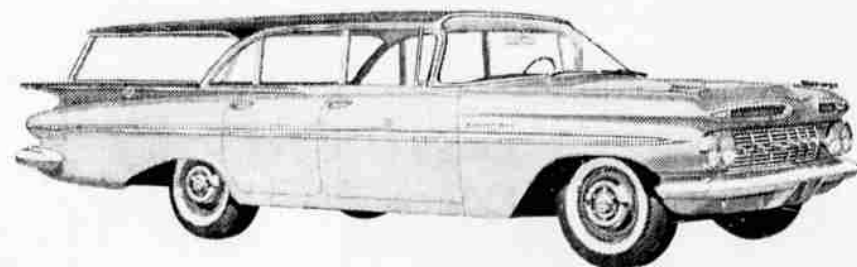
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
