

High Court Race Rulings Have Backing Of Truman

NEW YORK (AP) — Former President Harry S. Truman braved the wrath of Southern Democrats today by making it abundantly clear the Supreme Court's school integration decision has his full backing.

With an eye to the 1960 presidential election as well as to next month's congressional contests, he told a rousing party rally in Boston Thursday night the decision is not only the law but "it is morally right."

The address, in which he accused President Eisenhower of dodging his "moral responsibility" to support the court, wound up the scrappy Missourian's 1958 campaigning except for a final speech at St. Louis Nov. 1.

By failure to give proper leadership at the proper time over the

last four years, Truman said, the way was left open for a wave of violence by crackpots and extremists.

"The President," Truman said to a cheering crowd that filled the Sheraton Plaza's main ballroom and overflowed into adjoining rooms, "has never told the nation that he believed the Supreme Court's decision was morally right."

"He has carefully avoided stating his views on that subject."

As his own views, Truman said, they are in line with those of the late Pope Pius XII when he said, "God did not create a human family made up of segregated, dissociated, mutually independent members."

That, Truman made clear in an earlier interview, didn't mean he favored reading any Democrats out of the party.

And, as he told the Boston rally Thursday night, some of the finest Democrats in the country live below the Mason-Dixon line.

Sometimes, he said, some of them "don't think right."

For instance, he argued, unless the United States settles this civil rights problem, it is in danger of losing its position as the leader of the free world.

He argued that Eisenhower should have done more than "deplete" the "83 instances of bombings of schools, homes and religious institutions traceable to the desegregation conflict."

Despite his own stout advocacy of firmness on the civil rights issue, Truman pointedly refused to go along with Democratic National Chairman Paul Butler's criticism of Southern Democrats.

He refused—on two occasions at a press conference—to say whether he thought Butler was a good chairman.

"Paul Butler has worked very hard," he said, but pressed as to whether he is a good chairman, he would say only that Butler has "worked very, very hard."

Later, Truman boarded a train for his trip back to New York and a weekend with his grandson, Clifton Truman Daniel, and the boy's parents, his daughter Margaret and New York Times newsman Clifton Daniel.

Shell-Laden Car Explodes

RIFLE, Colo. (AP) — A freight car filled with deadly eight-inch howitzer shells blew up in Debeque Canyon several miles west of here Thursday. The explosion was heard for miles.

A Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad spokesman said the blast was caused by sparks from a broken journal.

No one was injured on the freight train. Some unexploded shells were scattered along the track, and streamliners were delayed until late afternoon. A four-man demolition team from the Rocky Mountain Arsenal near Denver went to the explosion scene to remove unexploded shells.

Young Mom Saves Child

FENTON, Mo. (AP) — "I can't swim a stroke," Mrs. Norma Jean Harkins insisted. She must be mistaken.

Mrs. Harkins, 29, who is expecting her third child in three months, saved her 18-month-old son, James Jr., from drowning in the treacherous Meramec River Thursday.

The baby fell off a boat dock near their home.

"I saw Jimmy floating about 25 feet from shore," the mother said. "I jumped in and went after him. I don't know how I got there and back—the water was over my head—but I brought him to the dock and a neighbor pulled us into a boat."

Judge Feted By Inmates

CHELTENHAM, Md. (AP) — A judge was honored Thursday by inmates he had sent to Boys Village.

A dinner was held in his honor, and a cottage at the institution was named for him — Judge Charles E. Moylan of the Baltimore Evening Court.

Sam Rayburn Blasts Ike

JOPLIN, Mo. (AP) — House Speaker Sam Rayburn said Thursday that President Eisenhower has gone sour.

Rayburn, here for a party rally, predicted the Democrats would increase their majority in both houses of Congress Nov. 4.

"In 1952," Rayburn told newsmen, "I said Eisenhower was a good man, but I've felt since his hassle with the 83rd Republican Congress (1953-1954) he has gone sour."

The Republicans claimed in 1952 "we had run the country into socialism," he said, "but nobody is opposed to a single law we have passed in 20 years."

Reactor To Open New Era In Power

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho (AP) — A large ship reactor designed to prove the effectiveness of atomic propulsion for a cruiser and an aircraft carrier went into operation Tuesday at the nearby National Reactor Testing Station.

Rear Adm. H. G. Rickover, chief of the Navy's nuclear program, was present when the reactor sustained a chain reaction.

Rickover said he feels the large ship reactor will prove as revolutionary as the atomic submarine.

"We may find new, undreamed-of uses for big surface ships. These are things that must be tried out before we can fully assess their value," he said.

The prototype power plant is a huge hull with two atomic reactors driving a single shaft. It was designed for two nuclear-powered ships now under construction—the guided missile cruiser Long Beach and the aircraft carrier Enterprise.

The prototype power plant was designed and developed by Westinghouse Electric Corp. in cooperation with the AEC. The Newport News Shipbuilding and Drydock Co. built the simulated hull and installed the nuclear and machinery plant components under a subcontract with Westinghouse.
