STOCKS WALL STREET NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market ended mixed today with a slight tilt to the upside. While the tape ran behind floor transactions briefly just after the opening, trading was only fairly active. Volume for the day was estimated at 4,000,000 shares compared with 3,500,000 Wednesday. Prior to the rail upturn the market had been in a downward drift for the fourth straight day. Most day's close after the rails advanced, although losses were reduced. Declines of fractions to around a cent were rung up in motor, metal, chemical, oil and electronic issues. Tobacco was ahead. Northern Pacific spurted 5 points after directors declared a 20 per cent stock dividend and said they intended to maintain the current \$2 annual dividend rate on the increased shares. All the motors were lower with General Motors and Chrysler under most pressure. Steels were mixed with U.S. Steel, scheduled to report third quarter earnings Tuesday, ahead 1/4 point. Standard Oil (New Jersey) and Texas Co. dipped in the oils. Some aircraft issues came to life in the afternoon. U.S. government bonds turned mixed and corporates firmed slightly in quiet trading.

Grand Jury Sets Debate On 11 Cases

Two charges of first degree murder head the list of cases to be presented before the Klamath County Grand Jury next week. The cases, 11 in all, will be presented by District Attorney Arthur A. Hedde. Four cases are scheduled for presentation Monday, following Judge David R. Vandenberg's charge at 10 a.m., and seven are scheduled for presentation on Tuesday. Myron Barkley (first degree murder) accused of shooting his 20-year-old half-brother Eldon (Beanie) Cross September 6 in the Jackson Creek Guard Station cabin they shared. Barkley, 26, who had spent some time at the University of Oregon, also has admitted shooting his rifle along U.S. 97 north at the time a woman tourist was killed while riding in the back seat of a car traveling toward Bend. The case the jury will determine, however, involved the death of his half-brother. William Thomason (first degree murder), 47, a San Jose cement contractor accused of shooting Mrs. Edith Atkins after a drinking party July 21 in Klamath Falls. Mrs. Atkins' husband, Thomas Atkins, 51, one of Thomason's employees, was seriously wounded in the shooting. Eldon, Lyle Shafer and Paul R. Wilson (larceny of livestock) are charged in three separate rustling cases. The state charged Wilson, a 23-year-old rancher, and Shafer, his 35-year-old assistant, with stealing livestock from Lorenz G. VanderKamp and Adlai Johnson last spring. The pair was indicted in the grand jury's last session and went to trial which subsequently was declared a mistrial by Judge Vandenberg. The district attorney filed a similar charge the next day. Roy Lambert (embezzlement of livestock), 49, a ranch foreman near Kirk, charged with stealing hifers from his employer, rancher J. C. Miller, June 8 and June 29. Ethel Mae Lugo (assault and battery by means of force) was charged with knifing Phyllis Hood during a quarrel in a car parked near the carnival grounds July 1. Another woman accused in the knifing, Charlene Eggman, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to six months in jail. Raymond Hoover (convict in possession of concealed weapon), 26, of Klamath Falls, was arrested on a downtown street August 30 after officers found a .38 caliber revolver in his car when the car's occupants were ordered out. Clifford Barkley (statutory rape), a 45-year-old man accused of raping a 4-year-old Chiloquin girl after a drinking party July 30. Investigating officers said the child was brutally injured and required extensive surgery. Roger Wesley Cole and Virgil Wilson (larceny), both of Chiloquin and both 20 years old, were charged with stealing jacks, batteries, cables and other equipment from a contracting firm in July. The equipment was valued at \$2,500. Marshall Stevens and Willie Young (assault and robbery while armed with a deadly weapon) were arrested by state police after an unsuccessful attempt to get away with \$700 from the Low Cost Super Market in the Town and Country Shopping Center July 26. Stevens, 41, and Young, 38, attempted to shoot it out with arresting officers. Marshall Stevens (assault with intent to kill) is charged with pulling a gun on Sgt. Bruce Lattin during the market theft arrest. Patrolman William Roach grabbed the gun's hammer before Stevens could fire, officers said. Stevens subsequently told Sheriff Murray Britton he had robbed a Fresno, California, bank before coming here. That case, however, is not within Klamath County jurisdiction. Earl A. Brown (obtaining money by false pretenses), 37, Klamath Falls, is accused of cashing a \$10 check at Broadway Cleaners without having a bank account. Members of the grand jury are Nora Cashman of Merrill, foreman; Edward Downing and Jim Humphrey of Merrill, and Alice Abbot, Stuart Balsiger, Nell W. Kinney and Swan Nelson of Klamath Falls.

Cleric's Wife Crash Victim

BURNS (AP) — An automobile overturned 10 miles east of here late Thursday afternoon, killing Mrs. Louis L. Perkins, whose husband is pastor of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church here. Mrs. Perkins was driving the car, which suddenly veered off the road and overturned. Her daughter, Mrs. Peter Shuster, visiting here from Seneca Falls, N. Y., said she called out a warning but her mother did not react. She said she thought she might have suffered a fainting spell. The autopsy disclosed no heart condition. Mrs. Shuster was uninjured as was her daughter, Sue, 17 months. Her son Frederick, 5, suffered minor cuts.

Probe Continues For Lost Hunter

The search for the body of Hal Furman Jr., 18, who has been missing since the October 14 boating tragedy that claimed the life of his father and James Cline, continues on Upper Klamath Lake, as previously announced by the sheriff's office. The sheriff's office continues to send a patrol boat along the west shore of the lake daily, in the early morning when weather permits. The east shore is patrolled daily by a boat of the Klamath Lumber and Box Company. In addition the sheriff's boat does some dragging. The Basin Boaters have announced that their newly organized rescue unit will join in the search this weekend. However, this unit will go out only if weather permits. 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Congress Candidate Asks Probe Of Timber Industry

Marion T. Weatherford called for extensive examination into regulations governing Oregon's giant timber industry in a speech before headquarters here this afternoon. Stating that present procedures and requirements are forcing independent operators to pay as much as 60 per cent over the appraised price for National Forest timber, the candidate for U.S. representative for Oregon's Second District said Oregon's timber industry is sick because of unrealistic and out-moded regulations and restrictions but that a cure exists in the form of sensible legislation that will provide equal conditions in line with current and future requirements. Weatherford said, "Oregon's timber yield has not been close enough to the allowable cut and is, in fact, costing people and the second district alone millions of dollars annually because timber that is legally available has not actually been made available. He said \$3 million feet of timber representing payrolls for 600 eastern Oregon families had been lost in Baker, Union and Wallowa counties alone, in this manner, last year. Lakening a tree to a tomato, Weatherford said, "When it is ripe you had better harvest it pretty darn soon or you might as well leave it where it is. And a lost tree, like a lost tomato, is lost money."

Workers End Conclave Toil

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Preparations were nearly completed today for the conclave that will elect a new Pope of the Roman Catholic Church. Scores of carpenters and masons put final touches to temporary walls and enclosures that will shut off the electing cardinals from the outside world beginning Saturday. In a corner of the famous Sistine Chapel, where the cardinals will vote, a shiny, pot-bellied stove was ready to burn their ballots. In St. Peter's Square workmen cleaned the famous Bernini fountains and prepared the area for the throng that will gather there while the voting is in progress. The cardinals gathered for the conclave held a final congregation to make their last arrangements. Saturday morning they will gather in St. Peter's Basilica for a "Mass of the Holy Spirit," a service specially intended to beseech divine guidance during the conclave. Fifty-two of the 54 living cardinals are in Rome and expected to attend the conclave. There was still a slight hope that last-minute arrangements could be made to bring Josef Cardinal Mindszenty of Hungary here for the conclave. The U.S. Legation in Budapest where the cardinal has been a political refugee since November, 1956, was unable to obtain safe conduct for the cardinal from Communist authorities. Nonetheless, just in case, a throne for Cardinal Mindszenty has been placed in the Sistine Chapel. There are 53 such thrones, each topped by a canopy. The only other member of the College of Cardinals who will not attend is Alojzije Cardinal Stepinac, Primate of Yugoslavia. He is sick and confined by Communist authorities to his native village of Krasic.

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Bonelli Aides Dispute Law

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — Attorneys for William G. Bonelli have challenged efforts to extradite him to California on grounds he could not be tried under Mexican law. The former state official is fighting charges of taking bribes. A brief filed by his attorneys noted that his alleged offenses occurred in 1952 and early 1953, while the Mexican statute of limitations on bribery is only three years. Bonelli's attorneys argued also that the Mexican definition of bribery differs from the U. S. specification of the offense. They charged that a technical flaw exists in the presentation of the extradition case because the file presented to Mexican authorities does not include a certified copy of the law he is charged with violating as required by the U. S.-Mexican extradition treaty. Attorneys for both sides now have 20 days to submit evidence to the Mexican judge who is handling the case.
