

### UF Planning To Re-Solicit In Order To Attain Goal

Talk of steps now being taken toward re-soliciting many individuals who have already contributed to this year's United Fund-Red Cross drive was heard at the last of the campaign's weekly report luncheons, held Wednesday at the Pelican Cafe.

Rex Dye, United Fund executive secretary, told drive workers that a committee which is re-evaluating each division with a view to possible re-solicitation was due to report its findings next Monday. Thayne W. Cole, associate chairman of the drive, is in charge of this committee.

"Despite the fact that we show today total contributions of only \$117,478.10 toward our goal of \$150,000, there is no reason for despair," Dye said. "Many persons have already indicated their willingness to increase their giving to help us reach our goal, which is a realistic one and not inflated."

"The efforts of the next three or four weeks may produce truly surprising results."

Dick Laudenschlager, drive chairman, told the meeting that no further report luncheons were planned but that each chairman should submit an up to date report on his division to drive headquarters, no later than 4 p.m. Tuesday.

Cole announced that the county library was being considered for one of the drive's "outstanding citizenship" awards, and Dye said that the library employees had been of great help in getting the county to set up a payroll deduction plan for county employees.

### Mayor Hits Trolley Slash As Cut In Transportation

PORTLAND (AP) — Mayor Terry Schunk said Thursday night the withdrawal of 31 trolleys from service by the Rose City Transit Co means the firm has begun liquidating the city's mass transportation system.

"It's most unfortunate that this has happened," Schunk said. "I realize now that the company is in the process of liquidating."

Speaking at a City Council meeting to the transit firm's lawyer, Ralph H. King, Schunk said, "Your action today serves warning on the public that it will be without mass transportation very soon."

"You might as well know that," King replied. "I think we could give you a year more at best."

King told the council of the action as it met to consider an ordinance requiring the company to give public notice if it wanted to take the trolleys out of service.

King said the action was necessary because of a pending federal tax matter, but said he was unfamiliar with the details of the matter.

During an earlier fare crisis, the council voted the firm permission to withdraw its trolleys, then failed to repeal the law. The permission, which would have nullified the pending ordinance took the company out from under the jurisdiction of the state public utilities commissioner.

### Oregon Pilot Crash Victim

GOLD BEACH, Ore. (AP)—Elder Costelloe, about 60, who operated a Gold Beach flying service, was killed Thursday when his small private plane hit a canyon wall near the Pacific Ocean and burst into flames.

Sheriff Glenn Sabin said Costelloe crashed minutes after taking off in his single-engine craft en route north to Bandon. The weather was clear.

"A woman who saw the plane in the air said Costelloe apparently was trying to circle back to Gold Beach," Sabin said.

"Mrs. Wesley Collier, who lives in a trailer house along the beach, said she saw it fly toward the hill. Then she saw flames and heard the explosion," he added.

### Promotion Due Rogue Ranger

LAKEVIEW—Effective November 16, Vernal E. Taylor, district ranger on the Rogue River National Forest, will be promoted to the fire control staff on the Fremont Forest here, according to Clayton Weaver, supervisor.

Taylor is a native of Ogden, Utah, where he attended elementary school. He was graduated from the University of Washington School of Forestry in 1932. He worked for six seasons on the Olympic National Forest, starting in 1928 while attending school. In January, 1934, he received his appointment as a forester on the Ouachita National Forest, Arkansas. In April, 1934, he was promoted to district ranger on the Ouachita where he remained until transferred to the Rogue River forest in September, 1953.

The Taylors expect to move to Lakeview about November 13. Their oldest son is a Marine fighter pilot in Japan. A daughter, Barbara, lives in Ogden, and a son, David, is at home.

### ABANDON NUCLEAR REACTOR

LONDON (UPI) — Britain has decided to abandon a nuclear reactor at the Windscale atomic energy plant similar to one that became overheated last fall. The Atomic Energy Authority announced Thursday that it would cost \$1,400,000 to reprocess the equipment shut down following last year's accident, and that the reactor wasn't worth it.

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### Portland Girl In Love With GI Who Knifed Her

PORTLAND (AP)—A 19-year-old girl says she has fallen in love with a soldier she first saw when he knifed her last August here.

Miss Pat Grimes sat in the courtroom of Circuit Judge Martin Hawkins Thursday when Pvt. Alfred Gust, 21, Fort Lewis, was convicted of knifing another woman, Mrs. Josephine Jacks.

Police said Gust earlier admitted knifing Miss Grimes, Mrs. Jacks and another woman within a 24-hour period on Aug. 2 and 3. The specific charge was assault with a dangerous weapon.

"I'll wait no matter how long it takes," Miss Grimes said. The knife wound he inflicted on her hip when she refused his offer of a ride took 11 stitches to close.

Later, she signed a complaint against Gust. Then Gust's mother wrote to her, so she visited the soldier in jail.

"It bothered me that I was helping send him away," she said. "I felt sorry for him. I felt it wasn't his fault that it happened."

Gust, formerly of Houston, Texas, was one of 11 children. His father died when he was two.

The jury recommended that Gust, who pleaded innocent by reason of insanity, be given psychiatric help. A pre-sentence investigation was ordered by the judge.

Miss Grimes said that after she visited Gust, they corresponded between visits. She said he promised to quit drinking.

"He is the most considerate guy I've ever known," she said. "It seems so good to be needed."

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
