Highway 99 Hearing Set

DUNSMUIR—The State Division of Highways apparently will meet a "united front" in its public hearing on Monday evening in its public hearing on the proposed highway changes in north Dunsmuir designed to make Highway 99 a full freeway in that area.

Tentative maps for two interchanges within the northern city limits and one just beyond the city were presented to the city council by Herbert Miles, district engineer for the division of highways, on October 1. Acceptance of these plans will be acceptance of the city following the public hearing slated for 8 p.m. Monday at the city hall. Miles stated in presenting the plans that construction of this project might not be undertaken for five to 10 years.

Following two luncheon meetings this week, a citizen's committee headed by Bob Dewey, planning commission member and north Dunsmuir businessman, has announced it will ask the division of highways to:

1. Provide means so local traffic can have access to all parts of Dunsmuir without using the freeway.
 2. Maintain the present frontage road (Park Avenue), altering it as little as possible.
 3. Eliminate proposed dead ends of Dwight Way and Siskiyou Avenue and join these two streets.
 4. Extend Park Avenue from the city limits to Shasta Springs.
 5. Request further study of the proposed interchange at north Third Street so that it takes as little as possible of valuable commercial sites.
- The highway department will also be asked to set up a definite program for land purchase and interchange construction so development of the area will not be held in abeyance pending completion of this project.

Pearl H. Dye Mishap Victim

Word was received Friday of the accidental death that day of Pearl H. Dye, in Grangeville, Idaho. Mr. Dye was the father of two well-known Klamath Falls businessmen, Rex Dye, executive secretary of the United Fund-Red Cross, and Jay Dye, associated in the Dye Insurance Agency with an uncle Art Dye, brother of the Grangeville man.

Mr. and Mrs. Dye had visited in Klamath Falls frequently during the last few years. He was 68 years old.

Mr. Dye, who retired a year ago after selling his machine shop and garage, was working on a dump truck when the bed fell, crushing him to death. He had been a resident of the Idaho town for many years and operated the Plymouth - Chrysler Automobile Agency for 30 years. He owned one of the first automobiles in Grangeville and the first plane, teaching residents both to drive and to fly. He was a community leader, had served on the Idaho State Highway Commission, and attended the Christian Church.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Mae Dye, of Grangeville; two sons in Klamath Falls; three daughters, Orpha Boyer, Maxine Pittman, Bonnie Scheffert, all near Grangeville; a son, Gene Dye, also of Grangeville, his brother Art Dye, Klamath Falls, and other relatives.

No arrangements have been made for the funeral.

C of C Group Adopts Rule

MOUNT SHASTA—The Inter-County Chamber of Commerce of Northern California adopted a resolution at its meeting at the Mt. Shasta Ski Bowl Lodge on Wednesday asking for legislation to require marine gas taxes to be made mandatory and the funds distributed to harbors of refuge, small boat harbors and launching facilities and access roads to these facilities.

Supervisor Jonathan C. Tibbitts of Shasta County, originator of the resolution, had reported there is already 3 million dollars annually in unclaimed marine gas taxes and much more available for this very needed development in the state should the tax be made mandatory.

Winn Price of Central Valley, president of the ICCNC, introduced a comprehensive study of land use of the United States Forest Service in this area. He pointed out the federal government is getting about \$5 for every \$1 budgeted for land management and that thousands of dollars are being lost to the area through inadequate programming. He asked that forest service budgets be planned for full land use. This resolution will be sent to the member chambers for endorsement.

State Senator Randolph Collier, scheduled to speak at the banquet session, was unable to be present. Chapman Wentworth, Bill Dickinson and Orr Apperson filled in with the history and difficulties of building the ski bowl facilities and their ultimate development.

John Strahan, manager of the Shasta County Economic Development Commission, told the audience that because of new processes manufacture of wood pulp no longer means water pollution.

"The job and the fish can live on the same creek," he said in citing timber and wood products as the area's greatest asset.

Dictators Hit By Publisher

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI)—Dr. Alberto Gainza Paz, the publisher of La Prensa, said Friday night that the surviving dictators in Latin America were obstructing the interamerican system.

The interamerican system, the Buenos Aires newspaper said, such governments were being maintained by force and were a disgrace to the interamerican system.

Dr. Gainza Paz, one of the leaders in the successful struggle against the Peron dictatorship in Argentina, said in an address before the Good Neighbor Commission of Texas that "those in our continent, or outside of it, who accept dictatorial regimes are irreconcilable enemies of America."

"They oppose the fundamental principles capable of assuring the peace, progress and the unity of our peoples," he said.

America and oppression, America and despotism are absolutely antagonistic terms, he added.

Dr. Gainza Paz recalled that Oliver Wendell Holmes, commenting about the United States, said, "Not by aggression, but by the naked fact of existence, we are an eternal danger and an unsleeping threat to every government that founds itself on anything but the will of the governed."

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Red Cross Plans Feature For Upcoming Blood Drive

An innovation in collecting blood for the Red Cross blood program will be the visit of "Baby Beaver," to four Klamath County communities during the week of October 27 to October 30. The new approach to collecting the blood vitally needed for the continuation of the Red Cross volunteer blood program is also designed to meet the increased need for blood in the new field of heart and lung surgery that is saving many lives.

It provides also for active participation of the outlying communities in providing blood without traveling to Klamath Falls or other centralized donor points.

Use of the smaller unit will cut the collection cost per pint to the Red Cross.

Baby Beaver is a small bloodmobile unit, staffed by two registered nurses from the Portland Blood Center and volunteers from the communities visited. A station wagon and a trailer bring the necessary properties to the communities, and enable the smaller towns to have bloodmobile visits impossible to schedule when the only blood drawing facility was a major unit. Each community is pledged to recruit sufficient donors to produce 50 pints of blood, and to supply volunteers who act as typists, canteen workers, custodians, and nurses aides.

The first stop of the unit in Klamath County will be at the Gilchrist High School from 4 to 7 p.m. Monday, October 27. Mrs. Leslie Norlen is in charge of donor recruitment. Mrs. Patsy Frederickson heads the volunteer staff, and Mrs. K. Osborn is in charge of properties.

On Tuesday, October 28, Baby Beaver travels to Bly where the Woman's Club is sponsoring the visit at the Bly High School cafeteria from 3:30 to 6:30 p.m. Mrs. Max Cline reports 60 pledge cards have been received to date, with Mrs. Donald Magee heading donor recruitment.
