NFL 'Battles' Set Sunday

The National Football League's park packing operation even on a quiet Sunday, adds some feudin' and fussin' this time around—to the jingle of the coin boxes from coast to coast.

"Wait 'til we get you Sunday," was the Colts' reply after Marshall took outspoken exception to a Colt player's quip that the Redskins didn't give him train fare home when he was cut from the roster a few years back.

"Wait 'til we get you back home," was coach Frankie Albert's answer to the Bears' 28-6 whipping of the 49ers in Chicago two weeks ago.

Henley Rolls In 33-0 Game

Coach Ted Ammerman's Henley Hornets rolled over the Surprise Valley Hornets, 33-0, yesterday afternoon on Henley's home field.

A small, sun-splashed crowd saw the Hornets score three minutes after the opening kickoff, as halfback Burrell Guber capped a 59-yard drive by sweeping 10 yards around left end.

Only a minute and one-half later Henley tallied again as fullback Gary Pippin picked up a 5V fumble and rambled untouched 45 yards to pay dirt.

Still in the first quarter, Henley added two points seconds later as Bob Chapman tackled Wayne Dolan, who was attempting to punt, in the end zone for a safety.

Three minutes after the start of the second period the Hornets tallied as Leroy Larson picked off a long pass from Guber and plunged into the end zone, the score in Henley's favor 33-0.

With only one minute remaining in the third quarter, halfback Tom McBride plunged over from two yards out, capping a 40-yard scoring drive.

Henley's final touchdown came with seven minutes remaining in the game as Guber cut over left tackle from six yards out, fullback Phil Swisher kicked the extra point and the final score stood at 33-0.

The defensive-minded Hornets allowed the visitors past the midfield stripe only once, that in the first quarter.

Coin Boxes Rattle

Merrill Nearing 5B Crown

MERRILL — The Merrill Huskies roared their way to within a victory of a virtual cinch for the District 5B football championship as they handed the Jacksonville Redskins a blitzkrieg 60-19 defeat here Saturday afternoon.

The victory, the sixth straight against no defeats for the vaunted Merrill squad, was the afternoon game of a Saturday doubleheader highlighting the annual Klamath Basin Potato Festival in Merrill. Main and Chiloquin clashed in the evening game.

It took the Huskies exactly seven plays, two of which were run by the Redskins, to break into pay dirt for the first time. Fullback Troy Patterson lunged over from the two after the Redskins fumbled two plays after the kickoff.

Patterson collected another six-point just four minutes later as he skittered 55 yards down the sidelines to give the Huskies a 12-0 bulge. A placement by Bud Maupin, who was successful on six of nine tries before the contest was over, boosted the count to 13-0, and from here on the Merrill crew never looked back.

Quarterback Dennis Salvadori picked up six more points before the first game ended as he sneaked over from the one. Again Maupin converted and the score was 20-0.

The Redskins broke into the score column with only three seconds gone in the second period as Ron Davis scooted into the end zone from the 12 following a 43-yard romp by quarterback Doyle Branson. A running try-for-point by Branson failed and the Redskins had narrowed the margin to 20-6.

One minute later Salvadori faked a pass which ended with Bud Maupin scampering 27 yards for a TD off the old "Statue of Liberty" play. Maupin booted another PAT squarely through the uprights and the Huskies were on their way with the board reading 27-6. Before the second stanza came to a close the Huskies counted 33 points to bring the halftime count to 33-6.

Three minutes after the third quarter opened Salvadori was successful with an 11-yard heave to Maupin that brought the score to 60-6 and coach Al Keck started to empty the Merrill bench.

The Merrill squad gets its chance to sew up the crown as it faces the Chiloquin Panthers in a game to be played in Chiloquin Saturday, November 1.

Rams at Los Angeles, the Pittsburgh Steelers challenge the Giants at New York, and the Philadelphia Eagles meet the Packers in Green Bay.

The Colts lead the Western Conference with a 4-0 record, one step ahead of the Bears (3-1), who suffered their only loss at Baltimore.

Their opponents, the Redskins, have only a 2-2 record but past performances mean less than little in this neighborhood rivalry, where no more than 10 points have separated the teams in their last five meetings.

Both the Bears and the 49ers (2-2) have an explosive scoring punch featuring breakaway halfbacks Willie Gailmore of Chicago and San Francisco's Hugh McElhenry.

The Colts are 7½ point favorites over Washington, and the Bears listed at 6½ over the 49ers.

The Cardinals (2-2) are steadily improving under coach Pop Ivy's spectacular "triple wing" offense but the Browns, 4-0, and rolling toward another Eastern Conference title, are still 6½ favorites.

The Rams (2-2) are favored by 9½ points to make it two in a row over defending champion Detroit, which has three losses and a tie to show for four starts.

The Giants are listed at 6 over Pittsburgh, while Green Bay (0-3-1) is a 3 point choice against Philadelphia (1-3).

Bonanza '11' Cops Victory

MEDFORD — Three big breaks paved the way to a 21-7 District 5B football victory by the visiting Bonanza Antlers over St. Mary's here Friday night.

Led by center Tom Ellis and back Dan Norik the Antlers kept pace in the district race by knocking over the Crusaders. The game was knotted at 7-7 at halftime but the Klamath County team scored once in each of the final two periods of play to claim the nod.

On the first series of downs in the contest, Ellis broke through to block a St. Mary's punt and two plays later Jimmy Conner scored from one yard out on a plunge.

St. Mary's tied the score with a second quarter touchdown on a 44-yard pass, run play from Bob Evans to brother Dick. Al Cooper ran the extra point over to tie the score.

Gary Dayley scored in the third period for Bonanza on a one-yard run after Fred Acklin recovered a St. Mary's fumble on the Crusaders' one-yard line. In the last period, Ellis intercepted a pass on the St. Mary's 35-yard line and returned it all the way for a touchdown.

the U of O Ducks to only 150 yards on the ground and through the air Saturday, it marked a five-year low for coach Len Casanova's club. . . . LA Has Ex-Husky Ace In

SEATTLE (AP)—The tough little guy looked up at the big tough guy and said "just how good do you wanna be, George?"

"George," he said, "you can be the best tackle in pro football, if that's what you want."

"George, if you get to be the best tackle in pro football you can sign five-figure checks, if that's what you want."

If you don't think that's what George Strugar wanted you should take a look at the Rough Ram from Benton next time a Los Angeles game is available on your picture tube. He has teamed up with an old enemy, linebacker Les Richter, to smash people from the Other Side.

The Rams obtained Richter, the California Club, in exchange for 11 football players — an entire team—and they've never regretted the swap. They got Strugar on a draft choice that was part of a swap for some forgotten football player; they haven't regretted that, either.

The little guy who did the talking to Strugar when George was a 1957 rookie is Joe Madro, Ram line coach. Although Madro played football for Ohio State he is not a big man. Next to Strugar he looks like a midget and Strugar is only the third-largest Ram, even if he does weigh 258 pounds.

Madro had an apt pupil, as we could have warned him. One can't forget when Strugar came out of Benton with a desire to play bit of tackle for the University of Washington. At that time he may or may not have been thinking of five-figure checks—the time being in the heyday of the Greater Washington Advertising Fund — but he was thinking about mashing the Other Side.

One remembers the day the green freshman was put to scrimmaging against the varsity and in about an hour there almost wasn't any varsity.

Strugar never did make All America and he was picked in the third round of the pro draft—and only then at the insistence of Bert Rose.

Rose was publicity man at the university and had a hand in getting Strugar to select Washington as the fount of his education. Later Rose took up the publicity cudgel for the Rams and insisted they take Strugar when he became a draft eligible in 1956.

The Rams might have passed him if they hadn't picked up that extra draft choice in the swap.

Strugar's roommate is Jon Arnett, a solid humk of halfback, who says he was a Strugar admirer while playing for Southern California. "I figured anybody that tough would be a great one to know if you got in a tight spot. There are some real aggressive tackles in this league, but I'm glad to be running against them instead of Strugar."

Madro says flatly Strugar has the physical equipment and native toughness to be "one of the highest paid tackles in professional football."

As for George, he admits he loves the game, finds that all pros have great pride in their work, delights in the challenge to "beat the opposite guy on every play," and adds:

"Of course, the championship and the attendant financial benefits are a factor." That's the way a modern, educated football line-man speaks of a five-figure check.

A 19-yard pass from Dunn to Stan Eckert brought the first SMU touchdown. Dunn, hammered through the line for a yard and the second TD. Don Meredith, the celebrated SMU passer who has been out with an injury, went in for a golden moment in the fourth period to throw 22 yards to the ever-present Christopher for the third.
