quickie in the first 20 seconds of the third quarter after capitalizing on a Pelican fumble of the Grants Pass kickoff. Not content with this, Dean was instrumental in boosting comrade Dick Hayes to the one yard line from where the Cavemen quarterback plunged over for another six points before the stanza was five minutes old.

During the fourth quarter Dean added six more points for good measure while Cavemen coach Mel Ingram was using almost every reserve on his bench. Sophomore halfback Ray Meek notched the last GP touchdown with barely two minutes remaining in the game when he broke loose and dashed 45 yards along the sidelines for another center.

The vaunted toe of fullback Larry Drake was successful on only

one of three conversion attempts while reservist David Lyons booted the PAT following Meek's touchdown.

The Pelicans, sorely missing the services of fullback-guard John Hancock who sat-out the contest because of a broken ankle sustained in the clash with Medford, were unable to muster their defenses in time to quell the Grants Passers.

The Pels, unable to put together an offensive string, garnered only 44 net yards as compared to 378 for the Cavemen. Fourteen attempted passes by quarterback Blake Griggs were good for three completions totalling 24 yards and resulted in Griggs being charged with a minus .81 yards on the ground as time after time he was forced to "eat" the ball as the GP defenders poured through the weakened Pel line, or covered the

man in his sights. The Cavemen intercepted three of Griggs' tosses and picked off the only attempt of reserve Jack Riley to complete a long, down-field desperation heave in the waning seconds of the test.

The contest saw Pel punting specialist Bob Drape and his Caveman counterpart, Larry Drake, each get away seven boots with only percentage points separating their averages. Drape marked 39.28 while Drake, who was successful on a number of coffin-corner tries, registered 30.57.

In the gloom of the Pelican dressing-room following the bitter defeat, KU coach Andy Knudsen observed, "No comment."

The jubilant Grants Pass mentor, Ingram, said, "I played nearly everyone on my bench and I am especially pleased with the way my reserves came through. Did you see the way Meek (a sophomore) shook off those tacklers when he made the 45 yard run? Dean is great, isn't he? We have a week's rest before meeting Medford and we are going to need it—Medford may have too much for us. We'll see."

Sacred Heart Whips Talent In 5B Fracas

Coach Jerry Kempf's Sacred Heart Trojans defeated the Talent Bulldogs, 32-12, Friday night at Gem Stadium as they broke open a comparatively close contest with three touchdowns in the last quarter.

The Trojans were sparked by the fine running of senior halfback Tom Amberg, who tallied three touchdowns.

Sacred Heart opened the night's scoring as they took the opening kickoff and drove 35 yards in eight plays, capped by Amberg as he scored on a reverse from 7 yards out. The score favored the Trojans, 6-0, as the point-after-touchdown pass fell incomplete.

The Trojans added their second six-pointer of the game to the scoreboard two minutes later when sophomore fullback Allan Thill rammed around left end 35 yards to pay dirt, behind some crisp blocking. Quarterback George Hurley flipped a jump pass to end Mike Brumbe for the extra point and the score was SH 13, Talent 0.

At this point, the Bulldogs seemed to gather themselves together as they stopped the strong Trojan running and passing attack for the next two quarters.

The Bulldogs tallied their only two touchdowns of the contest in the third period, one when quarterback Ed Skrudrick threw a scoring pass to halfback Sam Knudsen, the play good for 33 yards and the other when Skrudrick fought his way for 33 yards and a touchdown. Skrudrick displayed good broken-field running as he was seemingly tackled several different times. Both extra

point attempts were foiled by the defensive-minded Trojans.

Two minutes after the start of the fourth period SH found the scoring column as Amberg sprinted 46 yards down the sideline for six points. The extra point was raked up by Brumbe as he took a Hurley jump pass, and the Trojans led, 20-12.

The Talent offensive and defensive attack sputtered out completely as the spirited Trojans scored again with 4-15 left in the game. It was an odd twist of fate that SH raked up the touchdown as quarterback Hurley was hit from behind and he tried to hand the ball off on the three yard line. The ball flipped into the air and landed in the end zone unnoticed. Hurley dived over the line of scrimmage and fell on the ball, and the score favored the Trojans, 26-12.

With only 20 seconds left in the game, the Trojans scored their final touchdown as Amberg plunged over from the one yard line. Hurley's kick for the extra point failed and the final score was Sacred Heart 32, Talent 12.

Sacred Heart piled up 382 total yards and 17 first downs and Talent had 221 total yards and eight first downs.

Liston Sweeps Ring Win

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Only the final bell prevented big Charles (Sonny) Liston from knocking out durable Bert Whitehurst Friday night in his pursuit of a match with heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson.

The 212½-pound Liston, winner of all except one of his 21 pro fights, sent Whitehurst reeling clear out of the ring with a flurry of blows at the end of the 10th and final round.

Referee Harry Kessler had reached the count of eight—and the glassy-eyed Whitehurst was trying to climb back through the ropes—when the final bell sounded. He was dazed and it was obvious he could not have gone on with the fight, Liston's 14th consecutive victory.

Liston, who has won 12 of his fights by knockouts and is rated ninth among Patterson's challengers, praised his opponent in the nationally televised heavyweight fight for his gameness.

"He was determined not to be knocked out," Liston said. "He hung on. He covered up. He did everything—but he just wouldn't go down."

Whitehurst, a 190-pound journeyman fighter from Baltimore, said other ranking contenders are steering clear of Liston, a former St. Louisian now fighting out of Philadelphia.

"None of the top boys want to fight this guy," Whitehurst said. "I asked for him, but it just seems I can't handle him."

"There's no doubt about it. He'll go to the top. He reminds me of Joe Louis. You know, I fought Louis, but of course he was on the way downhill at the time."

The 25-year-old Liston said that, naturally, he would like a shot at the title but he indicated he doesn't expect one in the immediate future. "I'd be glad to get a fight with any of them up there in the top five."

Pep Barrone, Liston's manager since he moved to Philadelphia, said he thought Liston "could have gone another five rounds at the same pace."

Top Ranked Schools Win; Jefferson Rolls

Seven of Oregon's top high school football teams piled up smashing victories Friday night. Two, however, were defeated. And one was tied.

The Jefferson Democrats rolled on, this time 46-6 over Franklin, another Portland League squad. It was the 18th straight victory and the 7th this season for the Democrats.

Coach Tom DeSylvia cleared the bench. The Renfro brothers led the onslaught as usual. Raye scored four times and Mel went over twice.

The Democrats churned out 523 offensive yards—75 per cent of it by Raye Renfro and quarterback Terry Baker.

The Jefferson season point total—332—shattered a 38-year-old Portland League mark set by Washington's champions of 1920 at 317.

The victory virtually assured the Democrats top billing for the fifth straight week in the Associated Press poll of sports writers and broadcasters.

No. 2 Medford belted Eureka, Calif., 33-0, but Crescent City, Calif., stopped No. 3 Roseburg 25-13. This dropped once-led Roseburg from the unbeaten ranks.

Only Jefferson and Medford remained unbeaten among major Oregon prep squads as ninth place Baker fell 19-6 before Milton-Freewater.

North Salem, No. 4, dropped Sweet Home 42-0 and became the first team to qualify for the state tourney.

Astoria, in fifth, bowled over Hillsboro 31-0. The victory, a giant stride toward the Metropolitan League title, was paced by the two TD's each of Jerry Olson and Larry Hill.

Marshfield topped South Eugene 34-0. North Bend was tied 19-19 by Springfield. Grants Pass beat Klamath Falls 32-0 and McMinnville defeated Tillamook 36-14.

A pair of Portland Leaguers just below the big ten easily defeated opponents. Roosevelt dropped Madison 31-7 and Cleveland beat Benson 32-6.

Norm Patera, the driving Cleveland fullback, broke two 27-year-old Portland League records. He scored three TD's and one extra point, which brought his individual season scoring mark to 118 points.

This was one more than the 7-game record of 117 set back in 1931 by Bobby Grayson. He also tied the 9-game record of 118 set by Paul Goddard of Lincoln last year.

All other prep teams ranked in the poll secondary won handily. The scores were Willamina 41, Philomath 0; Redmond 43, Madras 0; West Linn 52, Tigard 7; Pendleton 31, Hermiston 6; Vale 54, Payette (Idaho) 0; and Oregon City 33, Newberg 0.

Cards Bomb Japan Stars

TOKYO (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals slaughtered three pitchers with 13 hits Saturday to win their second straight from Japan's All-Stars 8-2 in a rain-soaked game called after six innings.

Stan "The Man" Musial got a three-bagger and two singles in four tries. He scored one run and batted in another.

A four-run blast in the fourth chased Japan's sensational Kazuhisa "Ironman" Inao, hero of the Japan "world" series, from the mound and also sent Takao Kajimoto to the showers.

Winning pitcher Larry Jackson doubled in one run. Don Blasingame singled in another. Musial's single produced a third and Joe Cunningham doubled around the fourth.

Hawaiian Bill Nishida came in and halted the uprising, yielding only one further Cardinal run—Ken Boyer's sixth-inning score on Cunningham's grounder to second after stealing both second and third.

The Cardinals scored twice in the second on Alex Grammas' single and Blasingame's double and again in the third on Boyer's sacrifice fly after Musial had belted his three-bagger.
