Merrill Potato Festival Opens With Coronation

MERRILL — The 1958 Klamath Basin Potato Festival opened its 22nd annual festivities here Friday night with the crowning of Queen Myrtle Barnes of Merrill as the Potato Kingdom's new monarch.

The new queen received her royal robes of purple velvet, her jeweled crown and traditional red robes from last year's queen, Donna Carson, also of Merrill. The crown was placed on her blonde curls by OTI Director Winston Purvine who later addressed the banquet guests gathered from all parts of the Klamath Basin.

Queen Myrtle I was preceded to her throne in the Merrill Grade School gymnasium by her four senior princesses, Becky Short, Helen Collins, Malin, wearing identical blue gowns. Her junior attendants, Vicki Haskins and Janet Keck, both of Merrill, wore formal gowns of white.

The presentation of a \$100 U.S. Savings Bond from Merrill business men, a wrist watch and the queen's trophy from the Merrill Lions Club, was made by William F. Falvey, president of the club, sponsor of the two-day festival. Senior princesses were presented with \$25 savings bonds.

Dr. Frank E. Trotman, Merrill, banquet chairman, as emcee, introduced Winston Purvine who spoke on "Crisis in Everything," comparing the trend of Russian and American efforts toward world supremacy, warning that "we must have the unselfish service of every American citizen at the highest capacity of that individual in meeting the challenge set by Communism if this country is to survive. In closing, the speaker added, "Do we have the stubbornness that is required to stay

with this struggle that may last 10, 15 or 20 years? The aim of the enemy is clear: to overcome the United States of America. Our alternative is clear. We must meet that challenge or learn to speak Russian."

Runner-up in the Netted Gem commercial division was Bernard Jendzjewski, Bonanza. Other winners follow: First, least number of U.S. No. 1 potatoes in 100 pounds, Don Ratliff, Merrill; second, Marvin Thomas, Tulelake; first, U.S. No. 1 bakers, Randall Pope, Merrill; second, Mrs. Robert Petrick, Merrill.

First, largest single U.S. No. 1 potato, Henry C. Juntli, Merrill; first, 4-H club producer, Kathleen Turner, Bonanza; second, Kirby Wilson, Malin; first, high school potato exhibit, U.S. No. 1, Virgil Schmoor, Bonanza; second, Bob By Petrik, Merrill.

The Tulelake Potato Growers Association and Tulelake Business and Professional Women's Club, with a joint entry, took first on community booth. Second place went to J. W. Kerns, Klamath Falls. In window decoration competition, first place went to the Merrill Pharmacy; second to the First National Bank, Merrill Branch.

Three Persons Hospitalized After Series Of Accidents

Accidents in which cars hit a train, a boulder and other cars were investigated by state police early Saturday.

As a result of the accidents, three persons were hospitalized and three others were treated at Klamath Valley Hospital and released.

Two of those more seriously injured were passengers in a car driven by Delbert Arant, 28, 4220 Frieda Avenue, which struck an OCE logging train near Olney. State police said Arant apparently drove off the side of the road 126 feet before his car struck the second diesel engine.

Mrs. Betty Arant, 28, was admitted to the hospital with fractures of the right arm and left clavicle and other possible injuries, but was reported in fairly good condition Saturday.

Tommy Tucker, 6, a passenger in the car, was hospitalized with facial acid burns but was reported doing fairly well. Treated and released were Arant, and Tommy's two brothers, Robert, 10, and Larry, 8.

Police said the twin-diesel train, pulling 56 flat cars loaded with logs, was moving about 20 miles an hour when the accident occurred. Engineer Leslie Paul Arnett, 2135 Radcliffe Street, was not injured, officers said.

A one-car accident hospitalized Frederick C. Guyman, 46, 4036 Douglas Avenue, after his car missed a curve on Route 66 west of Keno, skidded on a bank, overturned and carried a 500-pound boulder some 22 feet before stopping, officers said.

Remarkably, officers said, Guyman sustained little more than facial bruises. He was reported doing fine in Klamath Valley Hospital where he was taken by Peace Ambulance.

Three cars collided on Route 39 at 5:20 p.m. Friday. Police said a car driven by Donald Floyd Goodenough of Tulelake tried to pass a

The meeting had been called so that the housing situation, which was delaying the activation of Kingsley Field, could be thoroughly thrashed out and work started toward alleviation of the situation. Copco Lineman Injured In Fall

TULELAKE — Calvin C. Crumrine, Klamath Falls, lineman for the last five years for the California Oregon Power Company, escaped death Friday morning in a 40-foot fall from the tower of a sub-station on which he was working.

Power company officials said that Crumrine came in contact with a 12,000 volt line and plunged to a concrete slab below. He was taken to Klamath Valley Hospital by the Tulelake ambulance where his condition Saturday was reported as fairly good.

The lineman suffered a burned right hand and knee and other injuries.

Other Stars May Use Plan

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Singer Gordon MacRae's tax plan may be used as a test case affecting claims against other celebrities.

Government attorneys in a two-day hearing challenged MacRae's right to invest in government bonds by floating a multimillion dollar loan through which — by deducting the interest — he could lower his taxes. MacRae has asked a ruling on whether he must pay a \$130,000 levy.

The Internal Revenue Service said Friday that if MacRae wins the ruling, it will affect government claims against such celebrities as Van Johnson, Nanette Fabray, Phil Harris and Alice Faye, John Wayne, Cornel Wilde and Jean Wallace, Doris Day and Marty Melcher and Gene Autry.
