### Singer Planning Tribute To Memory Of Al Jolson

 HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Echoes of Al Jolson will reverberate through the nation's living rooms Tuesday night when Eddie Fisher pays tribute to the late mammy singer, accompanied by Jolson's oldtime pianist.  
 Eight years ago this week Jolson died in a San Francisco hotel room. At his side was Harry Akst, Al's piano-playing sidekick.  
 "I'd known Al since 1908," Akst recalled between rehearsals for Fisher's NBC-TV program. "It was in Atlantic City that we first met. I was only 12½ years old—one of the original Tin-Pan-Alley song-pluggers."  
 "We continued our friendship right up through the 20s when he was the biggest star on Broadway. He helped me by plugging my songs, and I wrote a few good tunes for him, too—'Am I Blue?' 'Baby Face,' and 'Dinah.' Eddie will sing all three of 'em Tuesday night."  
 Akst, white-haired and ruddy-faced, is 64 years old, and a recent heart-attack victim himself. "We both came out to the coast when Al started making movies," he said. "Then, in the early 30s,

he was all washed up. Joley didn't think he was through, but everybody else did.  
 "During the dark days we used to go to the fights and play a lot of golf. Al always had plenty of money, but he missed the spotlight and the audiences. It was killing him."  
 "This story about Al has never been told. We used to ride around Beverly Hills looking for parties with six or seven cars parked out in front and all the lights on. Then I'd ring the doorbell and ask perfect strangers if they could use some entertainment, adding that I had the great Al Jolson in the car."  
 "Almost always they were happy to have us come in, and Joley would sing all night—for free, and Hollywood's great comebacks.

### Enrollment Up At Oretch

Enrollment at Oregon Technical Institute for the 1958 fall term reached a total of 1,019 students. This represents a four per cent increase over 1957 when 981 students enrolled at the institute.  
 Analysis of enrollment reflects the continuing trend toward the technological areas of instruction at OTI. The School of Technical Associates shows an 8.3 per cent over 1957 and a 13.7 per cent increase over 1956.  
 During this same period, enrollment in the School of Industrial Technology has been declining. A 1.73 per cent decrease appeared this fall following a 10 per cent decrease in 1957 over 1956. The School of Agricultural Technology shows a 16 per cent increase over 1957 which offsets the 16 per cent drop of one year ago.  
 Electronics technology has become the most popular program at the institute, with enrollments this year of 165 students, or a 25 student gain over 1957.  
 Diesel technology with a total of 133 students, represents the next largest class. Other popular courses offered are medical technology, office machine technology, highway technology, surveying technology, auto technology, auto body technology and machinist technology. Each of these number in excess of 40 students.  
 The 1958 fall term marks the beginning of the 12th year of school at Oregon Technical Institute. In July 1957, 31 students registered to begin the institute.

### Court Notes Slight Gain

The Klamath County Court has noted some progress in its campaign to acquire rock sites and cinder pits on the Klamath Indian Reservation, but the progress to date hasn't been enough.  
 The Portland area office of the Bureau of Indian Affairs gave the county permits to use rock and cinder from reservation sites until August 31, 1961, or sooner if the land involved should be sold.  
 This arrangement has no permanency, County Judge Charlie Mack said, and isn't satisfactory at all. The county wants title to the sites, plus access roads to them, because it soon will be responsible for maintaining reservation roads.  
 So the issue still is very much unsettled so far as the court is concerned.  
 More pending business developed following a visit by Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore) earlier this month.  
 Neuberger forwarded court inquiries about getting more than five per cent of timber sales on certain lands where it must maintain roads, and about a Bureau of Land Management policy to charge for use of a rock permit on Stukel Mountain.  
 Those issues aren't resolved either.

### Six Goats Sold, Wrong One Kept

HOLLY, Mich. (AP)—Farmer Peter Bower sold six of his seven goats last week when he found them nibbling on electrical wiring in the barn.  
 A fire Sunday destroyed the barn. Damages were estimated at \$8,000.  
 Bower said the seventh goat probably started the blaze by chewing on the wires. It died in the fire.
