

### Plan Group Slates Meet

MOUNT SHASTA—Frank M. Asbell, chairman of the Mount Shasta Planning Commission, states that a meeting of all planning boards in the county will be held Thursday evening, October 30, in the Shasta Lodge. The purpose is to bring about more uniform procedure, to insure a greater Siskiyou County.

Members of the Mount Shasta Commission expect to bring up a discussion of how to control the three-mile fringe area outside of towns. Gino Marconi, of the Mount Shasta board, states that while the commissions may plan, enforcement is weak.

Chairman Asbell says that an unsightly building three miles out on a town's main entrance is like having a garbage can on the front porch. Other boards may have ideas on how this can be handled, and other problems may also be settled that are now vexing the county planners, according to Asbell.

Interested non-members are invited to attend to present any constructive ideas.

### People Eye Water Deal

MOUNT SHASTA — Whether to fluoridate Mount Shasta water or not is now a live issue. A local dentist and the county physician have each come out in favor of the chemical treatment. Letters from other places where this has been done are strongly against such move.

Proponents say that fluorine will not prove harmful, and will prevent tooth decay. Opponents say that harm to the human body, and the water pipes result when fluorine is present.

One argument against the treatment is that Mount Shasta has water as nearly pure as water can ever be without distillation. No need to add impurities in an effort to improve conditions.

Published letters and circulars sent through the mail are being used to present arguments both for and against the chemical treatment. To date the opposition to the treatment appears to be the stronger among voters.

### Hatfield Hit By Neuberger

TIGARD (AP)—Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) last night accused Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, the Republican nominee for governor, of political irresponsibility.

He told a Washington County Democratic group Hatfield's promises of lower taxes and more financial aid to education "is an illusory and impossible approach to government, and every informed citizen realizes it."

Neuberger referred to a full page advertisement inserted in newspapers by Hatfield, declaring:

"It is easy to put together a self-styled program of 20 or more promises, if you do not care whether these promises are mutually consistent or contradictory—or whether they mean anything at all, when one reads the fine print."

The senator said Hatfield's "fiscal irresponsibility for political campaign purposes" will make harder the job of the governor and the 1959 Legislature.

"The whole question of state revenues," Neuberger added, "has become a political football for which Mr. Hatfield must shoulder the major share of the blame today."

### Court Slates New Tax Trial

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The U. S. Court of Appeals has ordered a new trial for William R. Foreman, of Bremerton, Wash., for conspiracy in connection with income tax evasion.

Foreman was convicted of the charges, but the appellate court recently reversed the conviction because of an unsound theory in instructions to the jury about the nature of the conspiracy charge.

In ordering the new trial Monday, the court accepted an argument presented by the government in a petition for rehearing. The court said Foreman could be tried on the basis of another theory as to the nature of conspiracy.

Foreman was accused of conspiring with Armador R. Seijas and his wife, Betty, to evade taxes on \$172,000 in 1942-45. The money was obtained by withholding profits of pinball machines in the Bremerton area, according to the government.

### Construction Plans Muled By State Education Board

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Board of Higher Education considered today plans for \$4,450,000 worth of new construction at the university and state colleges. The board's building committee tentatively approved the program Monday.

A dormitory to house 628 Oregon State College students was the largest proposed item. It would cost \$3,030,000.

A University of Oregon request to issue \$230,000 in self-liquidating bonds to help build housing units for 48 families was approved.

Hiring of an architect to plan the remodeling of the Southern

Oregon College Student Union building at a cost of \$550,000 was approved.

Planning of a \$2,750,000 classroom building at Portland State College was authorized.

The committee approved eventual construction of a \$650,000 dormitory for 174 students at Eastern Oregon College in La Grande.

Remodeling of the Oregon State College administration building for \$29,000 and removal of Wolverson House at Oregon College in Monmouth also were approved.

The board decided to hire an architect to plan a \$185,000 renovation of the University of Ore-

gon Medical School building in Portland. The first part of the project will be a \$40,000 remodeling of the second floor.

The request for University of Oregon building bonds was made by Dr. O. Meredith Wilson, the president of the school. He said an additional \$145,000 is available in accumulated reserves from family housing rentals.

Dr. Wilson said that married students now are living in temporary wartime units, have been used 10 years longer than they

were expected to last. He outlined a 10-year plan for replacement of all 374 family

units now operated by the university and to increase the number of units available to some 750.

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### American Twins Conclude Beauty Can Be Handicap

Beauty can be a handicap—and when it is shared by twins, it may mean double trouble.

That is the conclusion of two of the most famous American beauties of our times—Gloria Vanderbilt and Thelma Lady Furness, twin daughters of Harry Hays Morgan, an American career diplomat.

After having dazzled international society for more than a quarter of a century, the sisters, both widowed, now live quietly in a New York apartment and are partners in a perfume business.

"We're happy," says Lady Furness. "The tumult and the shouting are over. We haven't much money, but we don't need much."

The twins, as identical as in their debutante days, invited a few members of the press to luncheon the other day, celebrating the publication of their joint autobiography, "Double Exposure."

"Gloria wrote part of it and I wrote part," explained Lady Furness.

The twin biography is a candid and sometimes barbed recital of their tempestuous lives, which included royal romances and sensational tragedies.

Thelma discusses with objective candor her many romances, including her love for the Prince of Wales, for whom she broke up her marriage with Lord Furness, although they were never divorced.

### Wedding Rites Just Too Much

ROME (UPI)—Giuseppe Magri is a married man today, but he found the wedding service such a strain that he may have to spend his whole "honeymoon" in a hospital.

The 26-year-old groom fainted twice during the ceremony in a church in suburban Centocelle, once just as he should have been saying "I do" and again just after the priest had pronounced him married.

HILLSBORO (AP)—Washington County Sheriff's deputies were scheduled to return here today with a 20-year-old man jailed Monday at Astoria in connection with a fatal automobile accident.

Terry Smith was charged with negligent homicide, hit-run driving and violation of the Oregon basic rule.

Deputy Harold Kieve said Smith's car sideswiped another car, which swung out of control into the other lane and was hit broadside by a third car. The accident was near Hillsboro Sunday.

John Huff, 64, of Astoria, who was in the third car, was killed. Three other persons were injured. Smith was arrested four miles from the scene by Earl Hart of Portland, who made a citizen's arrest and signed a complaint against Smith.
