The only qualified bid on any of the 35,000 Christmas trees offered for sale by the Klamath District of the Rogue River National Forest was received from Robert L. Pryor, Klamath Falls, it was announced after the opening of bids Monday by Darrel K. Frewing, district forester.

Trees were offered from 13 separate areas; bids needed to be accompanied by a deposit of 75 per cent of the appraised price. Since trees in only one area were sold, trees in the other 12 originally advertised will be made at the appraised price, for an area or part of an area.

Knotty Football Contest Solved By Klamath Man

The sixth football contest sponsored by the Herald and News attracted entries from as far away as Yakima, Washington, but the winner was a Klamath Falls man, Walter R. Bingham of 3016 Bristol Avenue.

The contest had its sticklers, including Sacred Heart's victory over Talent and New Mexico's victory over Wyoming. The only person to pick the one tie game in the contest, the 7-7 deadlock between Ohio State and Wisconsin, was Norman M. Wilson of 724 Pine Street.

Bingham missed six games and was off 19 points to take first prize. Clino Roper of 110 South

Carroll Street, one of the contest's regular entrants, took second place missing seven games and off 32 points. Bingham also netted third prize with another entry which missed eight games and was off 34 points.

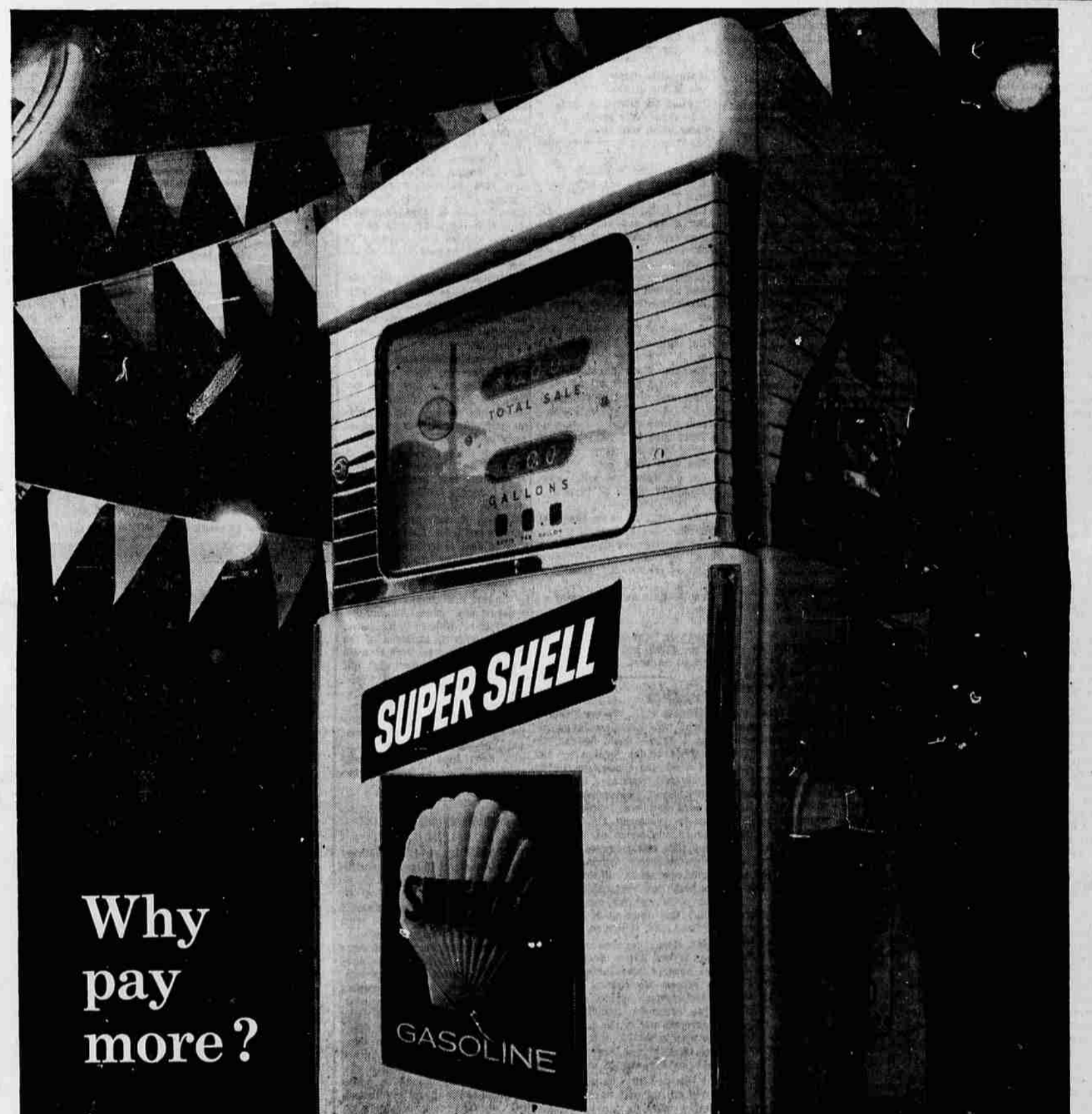
HOME LOANS GOOD
