If nothing more, Oregon Tech's football team should be out to establish a "first" Saturday afternoon when they meet Oregon College of Education in a conference football game at Monmouth. The "first" would be the first Oregon Tech football victory over an Oregon College of Education team.

Coach Rex Hunsaker has dropped eight straight decisions to OCE and Chuck Daugherty, who was the first OTI football coach in 1949, bowed, in the first meeting of the two clubs. The question on the OTI campus this week is, "Will this be number 10?"

We have our doubts as to OCE's complete supreme hold over the Owls. We think this is the year Tech will reclaim some of its lost pride. For two reasons we feel that the Owls will put a damper on the jinx that has been plaguing them for nine years.

First, this OTI team has more experienced footballers on it than any other in the history of the school. For the first time, Hunsaker will be taking an "adult" squad into action against coach Bill McArthur's Wolves. In the past, Rex has had to fight the battle of OCE with freshmen and sophomores. But not this year.

Secondly, this OTI team is comprised of a real sound cross-section of boys. There isn't a "bad apple" in the barrel and their attitude shows a great deal of team spirit and will to win and work together.

There is a lot to gain for Oregon Tech this weekend. All of the odds will be against the Owls, but the Mile High Campus cannot only win its first clear-cut football championship, but Tech can be placed high among the list of the Northwest's small college football teams with a victory.

Oregon Tech's football team will stand to gain more than the above mentioned laurels by defeating Oregon College Saturday, if rumors which have reached us are true.

Across our path earlier this week came news that the OTI football squad was being considered for a post-season bowl game. Trying to track down this bit of news was hard since nobody in the "official" family would talk.

Hunsaker, athletic director and head football coach, would only say "no comment" to our questioning. This statement is sometimes a sign of disguised affirmative thinking.

This is the second time the local college football team has drawn national notice — if the rumor is correct. Several years ago as a junior college, the Owls were under consideration to play in the Little Rose Bowl and Texas Rose Bowl games. Since Tech is no longer a JC, this year's bowl offer would have to come from a small college post-season meeting.

Ortiz Wins Charnley Bout

LONDON (UPI)—Young Carlos Ortiz said today he'll wait six months before challenging for the world lightweight title despite Tuesday night's impressive victory over British champion Dave Charnley.

"I'm not ready yet," explained the 22-year-old New Yorker who had given American ring prestige a needed boost before a sellout crowd of more than 10,000 at the final boxing show in Harringay Arena.

"I don't want to fight for the title now," said the stocky, black-haired boxer-puncher, who had bloodied both of the English southpaw's eyes while easily winning referee Andy Smyth's decision.

"Give me another six months and a few more fights; then I'll be after the title," he concluded.

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Michigan Suspends Athletes

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—The University of Michigan's football and basketball captain have been suspended from their teams in connection with football gambling on campus.

Police issued warrants for the arrest Tuesday of fullback Tony Rio and basketball star Jack Lewis. Warrants also were issued against five nonathlete students.

All seven will be arraigned to-day on charges of engaging in an illegal occupation in connection with handling football spot cards. All were released without bond.

Rio and Lewis, both 21 and from Chicago, share an apartment near the university's campus.

"We are removing from their respective athletic squads both athletes involved in these charges until their cases are decided," said Michigan Athletic Director Fritz Crisler.

"The coaches know all about it," said Rio. "I told them what part I had in it—which was nothing."

"The coaches have faith in me and will wait to see what happens," he said. "I think the publicity will hurt my football. No matter what happens, people will think I'm wrong. They always take a negative attitude toward bad publicity."

Lewis was unavailable for comment. Other students arrested were: Nick E. Mitea, 21, Ecorse, Mich.; Durwood J. Collins, 22, Houston, Tex.; John A. Miller, 19, Utica, Mich.; Michael G. Dodgson, 21, Grand Rapids, Mich.; and Carl M. Riseman, 21, Detroit, associate sports editor of the campus newspaper, the Michigan Daily.

No comment was available from the five nonathletes.

The charges of the misdemeanor or carry a maximum penalty of 90 days in jail and a fine of \$100 on conviction.

College's Draw Top Gates In '58 Games

NEW YORK (UPI)—College football attendance is up 3.49 per cent nationally and is on the increase in every section of the country except the East and the Midlands.

A United Press International mid-season survey of 118 colleges which have played a total of 322 games disclosed today that 7,944,105 spectators have jammed stadiums across the country. This is an average of 24,671 per game at a 2.49 per cent increase over 1957 when total attendance was 7,652,498 at a corresponding stage of the season.

The Rocky Mountain area and the South show the largest increases and the Midlands the biggest decrease. Rocky Mountain attendance, helped primarily by the Air Force Academy, Brig-

KUHS Pels To Test Crater Comets Here

Despite the fact that two of the Southern Oregon Conference "toughies," Medford and Grants Pass, are things of the past in the 1958 football season for the Klamath Union Pelicans, the general feeling pervades the KU campus that now is no time for a letup.

Appearing in their last home stand of the year, the Pelicans host the vastly-improved Crater High Comets on Modoc Field Friday night, The Pels, (0-2), are presently sharing the league basement with the Ashland Grizzlies (0-2) while the Comets are resting in third place with a 1-2 record, their losses, like Klamath's, coming at the hands of the Black Tornado and the Cavenem.

Their win was last Friday's 40-13 clobbering of Ashland.

Comparing the efforts of coach Len Warren's Comets with those of Andy Knudsen's Pelicans against Medford and Grants Pass gives the Crater High crew at least an "on paper" edge. Grants Pass whipped the Comets 26-7 and blanked the Pels, 32-0. Medford dumped the Comets 26-0 and blasted the Pelicans 53-0. An oddity in the Medford comparisons is that both the Comets and the Pels held the vaunted Tornado to only 7 points in the first half.

Statistics for the Crater-Grants Pass game show that the Comets gained 157 yards rushing and 70 yards passing against the Cavenem while the Pels, in their match with Grants Pass, gained only 60 rushing and 24 passing. In total net yards the Comets collected 210 while holding GP to 313. The KU squad notched an unimpressive net total of 44 while the Cavenem rolled to 378.

In first downs gained the Pels earned six to the Cavenem's nine, while Crater piled up 13 as com-

pared to 14 for the Grants Passers. For a season mark the Comets have scored 133 tallies against 142 for their opponents while the Pelicans have had to settle for 25 points to 198 for their foe. The scoring totals, however, are not necessarily a true comparison of the abilities of the two teams. The Comets have included in their schedule such schools as Eagle Point, Yreka and Cottage Grove while the Pelicans have met, in most cases, stronger schools.

The Pels, because of the injuries plaguing them over the season, can field a theoretical line weighing approximately 176 this weekend while the Comets are sure of an average weight in their forward wall of 171. In the backfield the Comets take a decided advantage, showing 171 as compared to the Pelicans' 157. The term "theoretical" is used in reference to the Pelican line because the Friday starters will not be named until Thursday evening at the earliest. The weight figure is the heaviest possible combination for the KU club.

Coach Knudsen will undoubtedly start Blake Griggs, Ron Olvera, Don Story and Ron House in the backfield and Gary Kranenburg, Ron Weber, Gary Hancock, Rich Moore and Nick Insley in the line and make his remaining choices between Wayne Dennis, Roger Eastman, Brian Walker, Les Husted, Larry Bunyard, Eddie Matmiller Joe Cox, George Vinson, Gary Burt and Dick Ewing. The status of Estlin Kiger, who was injured in a car accident, was unknown at this writing.

Awarded starting slots for coach Warren's Comets are quarterback Wayne Allen, halfbacks Jim Eldred and Allen Barnes and fullback Kerm Bennett. At end positions are Tom White and Harold Twedell; tackles, Dave Brown and Doug Davis; guards, Tom Turner and George Hunt, and at center, Bill White.

To see action on the Crater defensive unit are Loyal Higginbotham, Don Gillaspie, Bryson LaCasse, Glen Cote and Derrell Williamson, who will join forces with a number who work both offensively and defensively.

Noticeable on the Crater roster are a number of Crater cage stars, among which are Wayne Allen, Bill White, LaCasse, Higginbotham and Bennett.

Tickets for the Comet-Pelican test are currently on sale at the chamber of commerce.

Chicago Ties Canadiens

The Chicago Black Hawks rallied for three goals in the last six minutes Tuesday night and tied the Montreal Canadiens, 5-5, in a National Hockey League game.

The deadlock enabled the Hawks to move into a four-way tie for second place with Detroit, Boston and New York — all of whom were idle. However, they remained a full six points behind the league-leading Canadiens.

Bobby Hull and Ron Murphy paced the Hawk rally which began with 14:05 left in the final period. Trailing 5-2, Chicago's Murphy tipped in a long shot by Hull. Forty seconds later Murphy scored again to make it 5-4.

Hull tied it up when he converted on passes by Murphy and Eric Nesterenko. Henri Richard and Bernie Geoffrion had two goals each for the Canadiens.

Cougars Move End Into QB Slot, Work For UCLA Test

Even with two injured quarterbacks, the Washington State Cougars may not be at wit's end. They may just rely on an end's wits.

Coach Jim Sutherland pulled Mike Agee out of one of the end positions Tuesday night and had him running at quarterback with the first unit. Agee's competence at the new position was such that Sutherland said he might start him there against UCLA in Los Angeles Saturday.

Actually, quarterbacking is not entirely new to Agee. He played the position part time for the WSC frosh two years ago. And he did some passing in high school.

Until Tuesday night, Sutherland had indicated he would go with his No. 3 quarterback, George Price, against UCLA. The No. 1 man, Bobby Newman, definitely is out for the week because of a knee injury. Newman's first replacement, Dave Wilson, suffered an eye injury in the USC game last week. Wilson was expected to be back at practice again Wednesday, however, and may be ready to play Saturday.

UCLA drilled behind closed doors again and Coach Bill Barnes said after the practice that he'll make at least two changes in his starting lineup. Phil Parslow will be at wingback instead of Marv Luster, and Tony Lango will replace Paul Oglesby at left tackle.

Another closed session was held at Corvallis, where the Oregon State Beavers are getting ready for their critical game with California. Cal goes into the weekend with a 3-0 record in Pacific Coast Conference action and the Beavers are right behind at 3-1.

OSC Coach Tommy Prothro said California's Joe Kapp "probably is the best T-formation college quarterback I have ever seen."

"When the season started," Prothro said, "I felt Cal would be improved. But I sure didn't think they would improve this much."

From Berkeley, however, there was evidence that Oregon State will see more than the T-formation Saturday. Cal Coach Pete Elliott said he'll use the single wing against both OSC and UCLA.

The Bears haven't employed this formation since the Michigan State game early in the season.

Cal may be two men short for the OSC game. Center Frank Doratti has a sprained ankle and left halfback Hank Olguin has two of them.

Washington Coach Jim Owens ran his squad through another vigorous scrimmage and remarked: "They were hitting better, but they'll have to improve a lot before they're ready to take on Oregon."

At Eugene, Oregon's first unit ran through an offensive scrimmage and scored three touchdowns in 17 minutes against reserves.

The doctors had encouraging

words for the Southern California Trojans. Willie Wood, USC's first-string quarterback, will be ready to play against Stanford Saturday. Wood, injured early in the season, had trouble with his left arm in the WSC game Saturday, but the medical staff said he emerged in no worse condition than he entered.

At Stanford, guard Larry Lacey and halfback Dick Bowers returned to practice after being idled by injuries. The Indians scrimmaged against USC plays and Coach Jack Curtice said: "We've got a long way to go but I think we're making real progress."

Idaho Coach Skip Stahley, drilling for another non-conference game—against San Jose State—said three of his men may be idle Saturday. Fullback Ken Hall, end J. D. Lawson and halfback Mike Sheeran were injured in the Arizona game last week.

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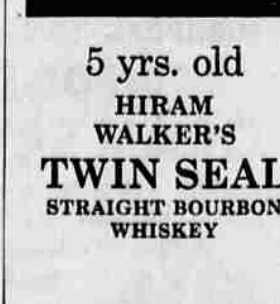
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
