Dior Successor In NY; Designs For Women Only

NEW YORK (AP)—Yves Saint-Laurent, 22-year-old successor to the late Christian Dior, doesn't care whether men like his clothes or not, just so women wear them. "Consider men? Never! Why should I?" asked the youthful Parisian designer, in New York for the opening of his American spring collection. "Reminder of the almost universal male protest against the recent chemise and trapeze silhouettes, the slight, bespectacled youth shrugged and remarked: "Sometimes a fashion which conceals the figure is more intriguing than one which does not. I think a woman should look mysterious — not too much revealed." His current collection, however, is highly revealing above the belt, running to plunging necklines and off-shoulder effects which appear

somewhat hazardous. Belts are high, but the general silhouette is rounded, both above and below the belt, with a number of full skirts in both daytime and evening fashions. Saint-Laurent inherited the mantle of the storied Dior about a year ago, and his life since has been devoted solely to carrying on the great tradition of his mentor, acknowledged dictator of world fashion. But when asked if he found it hard to live up to the standard of Dior, he replied: "Not at all!" For four years, since the age of 18, Saint-Laurent has been designing for the house of Dior and he indicates that he has no doubts as to his ability to carry on. His New York appearance wound up a two-week tour of the United States, during which he visited Los Angeles, San Francisco and Chicago. He sails for Paris Saturday aboard the liner United States.

Police Arrest Ex-Convict

POCATELLO, Idaho (AP) — Police arrested a young ex-convict and his pistol-packing, 14-year-old wife Tuesday night after a brief gun battle. The man was wounded. Officers halted the pair at the open window of a local garage. The man, peppered in the hip by a blast from one cop's 12-gauge shotgun, emptied his .45-caliber automatic before giving himself up. None of the four officers was hit and the man's wound was not believed serious. Police identified him as David LeRoy Oriss, 22, of Ft. Cotten, N. D. His wife, Betty Jean, did not take part in the gunplay, but officers found a loaded pistol on her when they searched her later. The police were called to the City Motor Co. here after the manager, making a nighttime visit, saw two persons in his office. Oriss told police Lt. Earl Boyce he had been in prisons in Texas and Montana most of the past four years, and is currently on probation from Wisconsin.

Skin Irritations Increase Noted

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Skin irritations on women's hands have increased tremendously since detergents have been manufactured as substitutes for common soap, a Mayo Foundation dermatologist says. The specialist, Dr. Louis A. Brunsting Sr., told the Oklahoma City Clinical Society that detergents may destroy layers of skin leaving no defense against skin trouble.

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Halt Further Work On Dam, Urges Interior Secretary

WASHINGTON (AP) — Stopping further dam construction on the middle Snake River was urged Tuesday by Interior Secretary Fred Seaton, who said the area must be preserved as a fish producing area. In a letter to Army Secretary Wilbur Brucker, Seaton said the middle Snake basin up to and including the water shed of the Imnaha River is the key remaining Columbia Basin area for production of salmon.

The Army Engineers are believed to be considering a number of dams in the area below the Imnaha. These, Seaton said, "would present grave problems for the maintenance and development of anadromous fish production in the area."

Triplets Said 'Not Unusual'

LOS ANGELES (UPD) — Shy, soft-spoken Shiraz Kondo, 39, childless in 10 years of marriage until she gave birth to triplets this week, said today she saw nothing unusual about such an event. "In fact, I don't think there's anything unusual about a woman of 39 just having a baby for the first time. Naturally, we were surprised. We had expected one or two — but not three. I didn't say anything. I was too surprised, I guess."

Mrs. Kondo and her husband, Yoshio, 41, always wanted children from the time of their marriage, she said. "About three years ago I had a miscarriage," the petite, pretty brunette said. "We were very sad about it." She said they never planned on having any special number of children — just children. The arrival of the three non-identical girls at Queen of Angels Hospital Sunday within six minutes meant a change in their plans. "I think we're going to be busy for a while. We recently moved into a new two-bedroom apartment. I think that we'll have to find something larger soon." Kondo is a landscape gardener who works every available daylight moment six days a week. He was at the hospital during the births, which occurred from 12:09 a.m. to 12:15 a.m.

Seaton urged early adoption of studies concerning the multipurpose possibilities of sites above the mouth of the Imnaha. Preliminary investigations indicate there are storage sites of considerable potential which can be developed now, he said.

He recommended that the Army join "in deferring the planning and recommendation of any more dams" in the middle Snake below the Imnaha "until such time as competent fishery authorities agree that the problem of passing fish over high dams, both upstream and downstream, has been solved."
