### Senator Morse To Visit Basin

Sen. Wayne Morse, Oregon's controversial senior senator, is scheduled to visit Klamath Falls on Thursday for a speech at Mills School at 8 p.m. Morse's appearance here is being sponsored by the Klamath County Democratic Central Committee. He will come to Klamath Falls by car from Eugene early Thursday evening and leave following the speech for Medford on Friday.

Morse has just returned to Oregon after carrying his foreign policy attack on the administration to 12 states in the form of over 100 speeches.

### Ranchers' Problems Cited By New Cattleman's Chief

"We are searching for a solution to several problems in the brand inspection program," Bert Stanley, new president of Klamath County Cattleman's Association, said this week as he was getting ready to leave for the state cattlemen's convention.

"One of the problems is financing the program," he continued, "and another is strengthening the laws so that convictions can be secured in cattle theft cases."

Stanley was elected as president of the county cattlemen at the annual meeting held last week at the fairgrounds. He succeeds Bill Marshall who served for two terms.

The new president has been in the cattle business for about 19 years. The firm, Roy Stanley & Son, was founded in Jackson County by Bert Stanley and his father. Since his father's death, the business has been owned by him and his mother and they are assisted at the Eagle Point ranch by his cousin, Gordon Stanley.

Bert Stanley and his wife and two daughters, Judith and Linda, moved to Fort Klamath six years ago after he had served on the executive committee of the Oregon Cattlemen's Association for four years from Jackson County. His mother has continued her residence at Eagle Point.

New vice president of the local county group is Alvin Cheyne of the Spring Lake district. Ray O. Petersen, county agent, remains as secretary-treasurer.

Deputy District Attorney O. W. Goakey was a guest speaker at the county convention and explained that "mishmash" is the big stickler in proving theft cases today. A brand, properly applied to a young calf, even as young as two or three weeks, will be permanent evidence of ownership for the life of the animal, it was pointed out at the meeting. The difficulty lies in getting the brands applied to calves because they don't all come on at the same time and because of the rush of other spring ranch business.

Stanley says the first major project of the organization will be to increase the membership of the association. It is estimated that less than one third of the men who actually raise or feed cattle in the county are members of the Klamath County Cattlemen's Association.

The state convention is being held at Redmond from October 30 through November 2 and the officers urged all local cattlemen to attend, if possible. George Russell of Vale is concluding his second term as president, Kent Magruder of Clatskanie is first vice president. This will be the first annual meeting at the new fall date.
