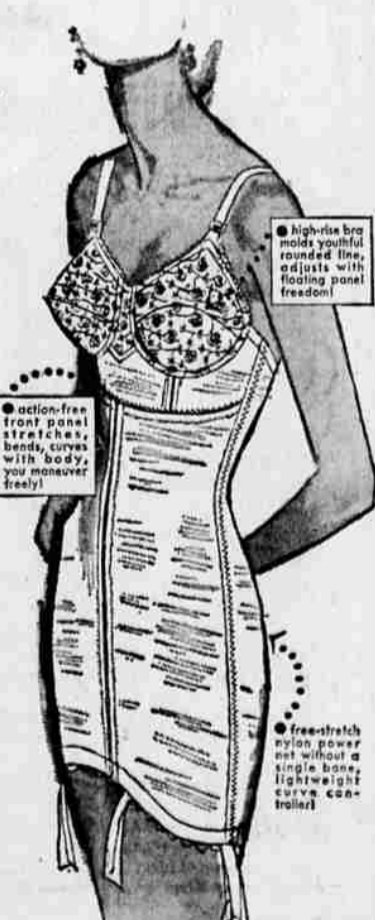
WHITE WOOLENS
