OUT OF DOORS with Field & Stream

Deer season is over for another year and the sportsmen will turn their full attention towards waterfowl and upland game bird shooting now. And like deer season, everyone is looking for a touch of bad weather.

This "blue bird" weather has not been conducive to good duck and goose shooting. But surprisingly strange is the fact that many hunters are finding good results in duck shooting despite the "poor" good weather conditions that prevail over the state. With as many birds as we have in this vicinity, the first few days of stormy weather we get should produce some of the best hunting years in this country for several years.

A very good population of birds has been noticed on Upper Klamath Lake, and hunting spots surrounding the lake have been getting a big play from local scatters. Public shooting grounds at Shalwater Bay and Pelican Bay on the west side of Upper Klamath have both been producing good shooting. Upper Tulana farm territory on the east side of the lake has also been fair to good for bird shooters.

A check by local game agents on Shalwater and Pelican Bay earlier this week revealed an average of four ducks per hunter, which is a very good ratio for this type of hunting. Most of the birds seem to be pintails or mallards with a great number of shovellers also noted.

The state line and Miller Island Road shooting areas have been only fair. The weekends at these two spots are poor due to the number of hunters out and the "high altitude" shooting of many weekend gunners. But those nimrods out during the week days have been getting some nice birds, mostly mallards. Several private duck clubs south of Klamath Falls report good shooting on the weekends from birds feeding in the Klamath River area.

Last week we made a slight slip of the typewriter in explaining regulations regarding possession of waterfowl.

We mentioned that a person needed to possess a license and duck stamp when having ducks or geese in possession. We should have said the stamp was necessary only for "taking" birds—hunting in other words.

To possess birds people are requested to have in their possession the name of the hunter who bagged the birds and the date they were taken. The hunter's license number is not necessary but would make matters clearer if and when the holder of such birds happened to be checked.

Hunting should be good in many areas of Oregon when the 1958 Elk season opens Saturday, November 1 according to word received this week from the Oregon State Game Commission offices in Portland.

The commission added that if past records hold true, only 17 per cent of the expected 33,000 hunters will bag elk.

The general season ends November 16 on the coast range and November 25 in the Cascades and Northeastern Oregon sections. The commission said there would be plenty of elk this year and the best hunting probably will be in the Wallawalla and Blue Mountains of eastern Oregon, Clatsop County.

On comparative records, OTI should rule the favorite, but being this is the Wolves' homecoming game and OCE always points for Tech, coach Bill McArthur's club will undoubtedly be a three to six point choice at kickoff time Saturday afternoon.

Oregon College whipped Eastern Oregon 19-7 while the Owls defeated the Mounties 27-6, giving Tech a nine point advantage. But McArthur's team tripped up Portland State 22-7 while the best the Owls could do was muster a 31-21 decision, making OCE a five point choice on comparative scores.
