The Henley Hornets wind up a highly successful 1958 football season this weekend as they play host to the Phoenix Pirates in a Little Rogue Conference finale on the Henley gridiron Saturday afternoon.

The game also marks the inauguration of what the Henleyites hope will become an annual affair: a two-day Homecoming celebration, the first in the history of the A-2 school.

The gala event will be kicked off with a homecoming pep rally to be staged on the Henley campus Friday night, followed by the football game beginning at 1:30 Saturday afternoon and will culminate in the coronation of the queen and a dance in the school shop from 8 o'clock until 11:30 Saturday night. All Henley alumni and students are invited, according to Henley principal, George Elliott.

For coach Ted Ammerman and his Hornet squad, who have earned a 3-win, 1-loss, 1-tied mark for season play, the game marks their last possible chance to gain a tie for the lead of the Little Rogue hoop. A win over the fourth place Phoenix squad is a must for the Hornets but it will be no avail unless they understand the league leaders, the Eagle Point Eagles fall victim to last-place Rogue River. The Hornets suffered their only black mark at the hands of the Eagles when they met in the conference opener. The tie was with Alturas. Since that time the Henley crew has handled its opposition easily.

Henley, at full strength again after being plagued by injuries a good portion of the season, is fresh from a 33-0 victory over the Surprise Valley Hornets, a non-conference game, at Henley last Saturday.

Paced by halfback Burrell Guber, who scored twice himself and connected with end Leroy Larson with an aerial good for a TD, the Hornets made a fine job of the effort that kept the SV squad from ever scoring a defensive punt. New Trio Accorded Limelight

Three new individual offense leaders bobbed up in major college football this week, all taking over with spectacular performances.

Sonny Randle of Virginia nabbed nine losses last week and raised his season total to 32, the most any player has made in six games since 1952. This despite the fact Virginia's ace passer, Reece Whitely, has been sidelined with injuries the past two weeks.

Bill Austin, Rutgers' man of all work, scored three times against Lehigh last Saturday, bringing his total to 66 points. He now has more touchdowns in five games than any major college player in recorded history — 10. Howard Cook of Colorado is in second place with 53 points, including eight touchdowns.

Dale Hackett of Wisconsin took over the punt-return lead with a 64-yard touchdown gallop which blotted Ohio State's perfect record with a tie.

Only Georgia's Bob Walden, with a 47.4-yard punting average, Drake's Tom Newell, with 278 yards on kickoff returns, and Don Black, New Mexico's spectacular pass catcher who has averaged four points for every catch, retained their leads in their respective departments.

Bill Kreitling of Illinois, who has covered 426 yards on only 13 pass receptions for a 32.8-yard average, is in a class by himself in that department.

Black caught three passes against Wyoming Saturday, two of them were for touchdowns, bringing his six-game record to seven touchdowns in 10 receptions. By throwing for two touchdowns, in addition to scoring three himself, Austin brought his touchdown-responsibility total to 17 in five games.

Only two others this season have contributed even half as many points as Austin in the touchdown-responsibility department. Cook has been responsible for 71 points, and Bill Holsclaw of Virginia Tech for 58. Austin's total is 114, including six extra points.

Neale Tags Brown Best Back

NEW YORK (UPI) — Jimmy Brown, professional football's one-man flying wedge, was labeled by former Coach Greasy Neale today as the "best pro back of all time."

Brown is the former Syracuse All-America who was the pro game's rookie of the year last season. This time around he is going to knock the all-time yardage and scoring records of such as Steve Van Buren and Don Hutson into a cocked hat.

"He is out of this world," says Neale, who coached Van Buren to greatness. "Brown has to be as good as any back who ever played — and probably better."

One thing that puzzles Neale is how four clubs — Green Bay, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Pittsburgh — could have by-passed Brown when he was no better than the sixth pro draft choice in 1956.

"It's a mystery to me," says Neale of the 22-year-old 230-pound fullback who even the most cautious observers are rating as "the greatest since Jim Thorpe."

"I saw three men trying to stop him," Neale insisted. "He's the greatest. He'll break all records in only eight games, and that leaves him four more games in which to boost them out of everybody's sight — except his own."

"He does everything Van Buren could do — and more," Neale analyzes. "Van Buren made his yardage 3, 7 and 12 yards at a clip."
