

Rural Schools To Get Disc

YREKA—Glenn Barnes, president of the Siskiyou County Farm Bureau, announced today that every rural school in this county will receive a high-fidelity recording of the national anthem soon. This is being sponsored jointly by the American Heritage Foundation and California Farm Bureau Federation.

"The foundation's new recording will fill a serious vacuum," said Barnes. "Although high-fidelity was introduced in 1947, this is the first high-fidelity rendition of the Star Spangled Banner to appear on a single disc."

Louis A. Ruzoni, president of the California Farm Bureau Foundation, said, "It is hoped that this new high-fidelity recording will instill a deeper appreciation of our national anthem in the thousands of young Americans attending our schools and colleges."

The records have arrived at the county farm bureau office and will be presented within the next few days to each rural school that wishes to use them. The schools are arranging a special program on citizenship for the occasion.

The records feature the music of two world-famous orchestras; the Boston Symphony Orchestra with Charles Munch conducting, and the Chicago Symphony Orchestra with Fritz Reiner conducting. These records will be provided without cost as a public service by the non-partisan, non-profit American Heritage Foundation. The farm bureau is cooperating in the nation-wide distribution.

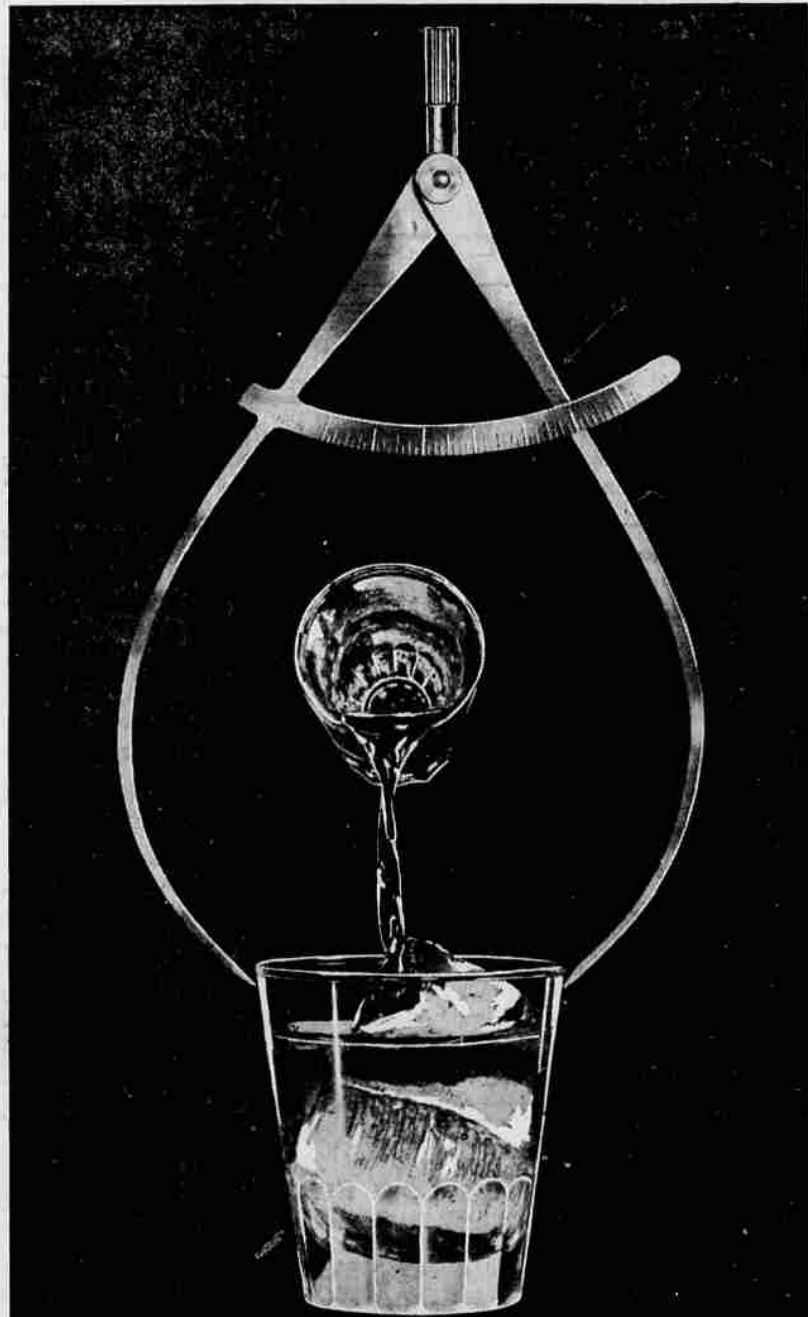
