

Lebanon Prime Minister Used To Rowdy Following

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—Rebel leader Saeb Salam was talking to American newsmen. Outside machine-gun-toting rebels were whipping it up in a victory celebration.

The door burst open, and a band of beery street brawlers burst in carrying a well-dressed little man on their shoulders. They abruptly deposited the Prime Minister of Lebanon on the floor in front of Salam and left the room.

Rachid Karami, Lebanon's new prime minister, is accustomed to this kind of treatment from his boisterous followers. Soft-spoken and smartly dressed, Karami comes from Tripoli, a hotbed of pro-Nasser Arab nationalism, famed for its street brawls and violence. It takes a robust politician to keep such a following in line, but Karami so far has measured up.

He was a key figure in the Lebanese rebellion against pro-Western President Camille Chamoun last summer. Karami's rebels took over the old section of Tripoli, threw up heavy barricades all around, and held out nearly five months.

There was almost continuous firing and sniping between rebels and army. Tripoli was gripped by a general strike. Garbage was left to lie in the streets. Food and medicines were scarce.

Those were trying months, but rebel morale was kept high largely by the relaxed, unruffled

HONOLULU (UPI) — Anyone can learn the hula. That's what dancing teacher Lila Guerrero said before I became her pupil.

After a couple of hours of instruction a girl who has trouble even with the fox trot, she conceded that the hula and I were permanently out of step.

"Maybe," she said, "the best hula dancers do train right from childhood."

Miss Guerrero, who has been dancing the hula since she was five, gives lessons to Hawaiian children and on occasion teaches its swing and sway to curious tourists like me. I took my lessons in private — if I'm going to make a fool of myself, I don't want an audience.

WATCH THE HANDS

Mastering the hula's basic step isn't too hard. It's a one, two, three and tap with the ball of the foot, called the "kai wa wae" in Hawaiian, meaning feet in motion.

"Watch your hands," said Miss Guerrero, early in the course. "Let others watch the hips."

In the true hula, the motions of the hands are most important; the hands tell the story. The feet and hips just keep the rhythm.

I watched my hands and immediately ran into trouble with my bare feet (the hula always is danced barefoot.) Mostly tripping over them, because the hula means movement of all parts of the body. I had to remember that the knees should be bent slightly, my wrists relaxed, my hips doing
