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ference lead with 3-0 records. The two clubs have beaten common foes — Portland State, Eastern Oregon and Southern Oregon in previous conference play.

For the season, the Owls hold a slight advantage over Bill McArthur's squad having posted a 4-1 record, losing only to Hamilton Air Base. Against college competition the Owls are undefeated going into this game. OCE has an even-odd 3-3 record, winning the three counters and losing the non-counters in pre-season scheduling.

A early Friday morning check of the Owls' "sick list" indicated only two Tech footballers doubtful of seeing action, and two others who might be held to limited action because of injuries acquired this past week. Halfback Charlie "Go Go" Wilson and end Dale McCulloch are the biggest questions as the club departed this noon. Wilson hasn't worked at all this week because of an ankle injury and McCulloch has been sidelined part of the week because of a pulled leg muscle.

The two other questions are end Norman Hooper and fullback Earl Green. Hooper received a blow on the head Wednesday, and was thought to be out. But a complete checkup Thursday revealed he was not hurt seriously and may be ready to go by game time Saturday. Green has been hampered by a shoulder injury, but worked out with the first unit Thursday, and could be starting Saturday if the pain has disappeared.

Hunsaker said he would probably open against the Wolves with Ardel Hamilton and either Ralph Norgaard or Dale McCulloch at the two end spots Saturday afternoon. At tackle will be Dick Hill and Arnold Metcalf while the two guard positions will be filled by Andy Cook and Allen Jones. Bill Barrington will be at center.

In the Tech backfield, quarterback Charlie Gantner will be leading the Owls attack. Halfback Dietzel will be given to Al "Tiger" Everson and Otis Foster who will move into Wilson's spot. The fullback starter depends upon Green's physical condition at game time. If Green doesn't start, then backfield coach Ralph Carr will use either Allen Leach or Troy Koonitz as a replacement.

The OTI defensive alignment, which has limited opponents to just six points in the last two games, will get a severe test this weekend. The job of stopping the Wolves' offense, sparked by quarterback Jimmy Bowlen is a man-sized task. Bowlen is said to be the best back in the conference this year and one of the greatest all-around stars ever to play in the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

Bowlen, who can run, pass and even play a second position to be a pass receiver, will be helped by a couple of speedy halfbacks. Bob Gates and Jerry Flug are high on the list of conference ground gainers along with another possible backfield starter Mel Marquardt. Oregon College will also have the services of three-year letterman Charlie Harris, a quarterback-fullback who is returning after two years in the service.

Leading the Oregon College line-man will be end Frank Colburn, a 190-pound ex-Marine who has been mentioned among Northwest small college stars for Little All American honors. Len Breuer, a two-year letterman senior, was injured in the Southern Oregon game last Saturday, and may not be ready to go full — strength against the Owls. If Breuer is ready, McArthur's forces will be solid in the middle of the line.

A 50-car caravan of Oregon Tech students along with the school pep band is scheduled to leave the campus early Saturday morning for the trip to Monmouth for the game. The "owl" campus has been buzzing this week with spirit never witnessed before at the Mile High school.

Besides the OTI-OCE "crucial," the other three OCE members take life easy and meet non-counting opponents. Portland State faces Linfield Saturday night at Roosevelt Field in Portland. Southern Oregon plays the semi-pro Seattle Ramblers at Coos Bay Saturday evening. Eastern Oregon completes the weekend schedule with a game against College of Idaho at Caldwell in another night game tomorrow.

LSU To Meet Miss Saturday

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Just about everything except football was forgotten today as first-ranked Louisiana State made last-minute preparations for its Saturday night spectacular with sixth-ranked Mississippi.

Baton Rouge residents, always among the most rabid fans, said they had never seen anything like the spirit on the LSU campus. Even Coach Paul Dietzel has found it impossible to control the students. They interrupted practice earlier in the week with an impromptu pep rally on the field. Gov. Earl Long proclaimed Saturday "Louisiana State University First in the Nation Day" in honor of Dietzel's unbeaten team. But the governor refused to predict which one of the perfect record teams will win. "I just hope LSU wins," he said.

The game, which will draw an anticipated overflow crowd of 65,000-plus, is a natural from all standpoints. Scalpers reportedly are getting \$15 for a \$4 ticket. The winner will take undisputed possession of top spot in the Southeastern Conference race. LSU, which has won its first six games for the first time since 1909, is 3-0 in conference play. Ole Miss has a 2-0 record. Regardless of the outcome, both teams will be prime bowl prospects.

LSU, propelled by its All America halfback candidate Billy Cannon, is a six-point favorite.

According to a story in the New York Daily News, the world champions of baseball have offered pitcher Johnny Kucks and Tom Sturdivant plus infielder Bobby Richardson for Washington pitcher Pedro Ramos, a right-hander who won 14 and lost 18 for the last place Senators in 1952.

The Tribe general manager believes he would have a better chance of obtaining Richardson from the Senators than the Yanks. Cleveland is in need of a second baseman and sought Richardson last winter.

Lane admitted he also had been interested in Ramos.

Trotters Big Help Says Wilt

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Fantastic basketball player Wilt (The Stilt) Chamberlain says the experience he's getting as a Harlem Globetrotter is preparing him for the challenge he'll meet as a Philadelphia Warrior next season.

The 7-foot Chamberlain, twice an All-American at the University of Kansas, quit school as a junior to turn pro for Abe Saperstein's Globetrotters. He made his first appearance as a pro in this area Thursday night and scored 30 points as the Globetrotters defeated the Hawaii 50th Staters 69-50.

"I missed the college enthusiasm and the many friends I made at Kansas," Wilt said, "but I'm happy in pro ball. I'm picking up a lot of the tricks of the trade and I hope it will help me when I play NBA against such a guy as Bill Russell next year."

Chamberlain said the pros play it tough and "I knew I had to learn a lot more about the game before I got into the big league." Wilt was drafted by the Warriors in his senior year at Philadelphia's Overbrook High School for delivery in 1953.

Since leaving Kansas just before completing his junior year final examination Wilt has maintained a scoring average of about 30 points for the Globetrotters' European tour and 12 games in this country.

Birds Eye Lee MacPhail

BALTIMORE (UPI)—Lee MacPhail may wind up as the Baltimore Orioles' general manager and farm system director in the team's latest shake-up.

The son of former New York Yankee boss Larry MacPhail was identified as one of the men under consideration for the Orioles' dual position Thursday. He currently is player personnel director for the Yankees.

The elder MacPhail, now a breeder and owner of thoroughbred horses at nearby Bel Air, Md., admitted his son had been contacted about joining the Baltimore organization but declined further comment.

Paul Richards has served as field manager and general manager of the Orioles since 1955 but reportedly is seeking an assistant. The Orioles also must find a replacement for Executive Vice President Bill Walsingham, who resigned Wednesday.

Wilber Hired By Cincinnati

CINCINNATI (AP) — The Cincinnati Redlegs today added Del Wilber, former catcher for the St. Louis Cardinals, Philadelphia Phillies and Boston Red Sox, to their scouting staff. He managed Louisville of the American Assn. last season.

Redleg Farm Director Phil Seghi said Wilber would serve as area supervisor in the North Central states with most of his work being centered in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri and the Dakotas.

Yank Runaway Clips AL Attendance Mark

CHICAGO (AP)—The New York Yankees' runaway race in the American League was reflected today by a sharp drop in official attendance figures for the 1953 season which attracted slightly more than seven million fans.

The total was the second lowest in 13 years. In 1953, attendance was 6,964,076 and in the war year of 1945 it was 5,580,420.

American League headquarters reported a 1953 total attendance of 7,296,034. That was 900,184, or 11 per cent lower than the 8,196,218 attendance in 1957.

As early as May, the Yankees were 10 games in front of the AL pack.

Six clubs reported a decrease from 1957. Minor gains were shown by the other two clubs.

The 1958 attendance compares with the all-time league record of 11,150,099 set in 1948.

Three clubs—New York, Detroit and Boston—each drew more than one million fans at home, but each also reported a drop compared with attendance last year.

The Chicago White Sox showed the biggest single loss among the clubs—338,217. The Sox, who finished in second place, drew a total of 795,451 at 77 games in Comiskey Park. In 1957, when they also finished second to the Yankees, they drew 1,135,668.

Baltimore's drop in attendance from 1957 was nearly 200,000. The 829,991 fans at 78 games in 1958 compared with 1,029,518 last year, a decrease of 199,590.

The 1,098,924 who went to 77 games in Briggs Stadium in Detroit compared with 1,272,346 last year, a drop of 173,422.

Cleveland, which 10 years ago set a league attendance record of 2,620,627, drew 663,805 fans, a decrease of 38,451 from the 1957 turnout to 722,256.

Even the mighty Yankees, who had the league's biggest season attendance mark with 1,428,438, showed a loss of 68,696 in patronage at the stadium.

In Boston, the 1,077,047 faithful who went to 77 games in Fenway Park were 104,040 fewer than the 1,181,087 last year.

The small gains were made in Kansas City and Washington. The Athletics drew 925,090, a gain of 24,023 over 1957.

The Senators, with the lowest total in the league, had a gain of 18,209 over 1957 with 475,288.

The league reported attendance was 3,543,313 in 241 night games, an average of 14,703. In 225 night games last year, the total was 3,889,023, an average of 17,285.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Frank Selvy, recently obtained from the St. Louis Hawks, has been placed on the active list by the New York Knickerbockers. The Knicks will drop a player to make room for Selvy after a workout today.

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
