State To Vote On Measure That Neither Side Favors

SALEM (AP)—Oregon often has public vs. private power battles. But in Tuesday's general election, the people will vote on a measure that neither side likes any more.

This measure, No. 10 on the ballot, would amend the 1932 amendment to the state Constitution. That 1932 amendment authorizes a state power commission, but the Legislature never has put it in force.

The principal feature of this new measure is that it would let the state obtain federal power, and thus allay fears that an Oregon power shortage might result from the federal power going to the public agencies in Washington state.

It also would permit the state to sell power at wholesale and in large blocks to industry.

It was a compromise approved by the Legislature, but neither side likes it.

Arguments for: It would guarantee Oregon's share of federal power and attract new industry.

Arguments against: The state should stay out of the power business. It would favor large industries at the expense of small consumers.

COUNTY HOME RULE NO. 11 This measure would permit the voters to adopt other forms of county government, and to give county officials power to legislate.

Counties now are creatures of the Legislature, which decides exactly what counties can and cannot do. By contrast, cities do have legislative powers.

Arguments for: This will enable counties to take care of their own problems, especially those in suburban areas. It would bring government closer to the people.

Arguments against: It would result in higher taxes. Counties get along all right now, as there is nothing wrong with having to go to the Legislature to solve county problems.

COUNTY DEBT NO. 6 Counties now can't have more than \$5,000 in debts, except for roads, to suppress insurrection and repel invasion. This would let the Legislature fix higher debt limits. If it passes, this limit would be two per cent of the true cash value.

Arguments for: Counties need to issue bonds for capital improvements, especially for sewers and roads in suburban areas.

Arguments against: Counties should do all their financing through tax levies. Bonds lead to higher taxes.

STATE INSTITUTIONS NO. 8 This measure would permit the Legislature to enlarge, reduce or abandon state institutions outside

of Marion County, after 10 years after they are established.

This can be done now only by a vote of the people. It would let the state hospital at Pendleton, and the tuberculosis hospital at The Dalles.

Sponsors say it would give the Legislature more flexibility in

keeping institutions up to date. There is no known opposition.

TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITALS NO. 12

Under this measure, the Board of Control would be allowed to close either of the tuberculosis hospitals at The Dalles or Portland, or both. Atty. Gen. Robert Y.

Thornton says it is unconstitutional.

The state doesn't need three tuberculosis hospitals any more. No decision has been made yet whether to close the tuberculosis hospital at Salem, or the one at The Dalles. There is no known opposition to the measure.

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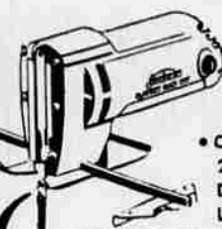
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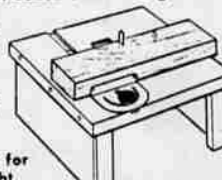
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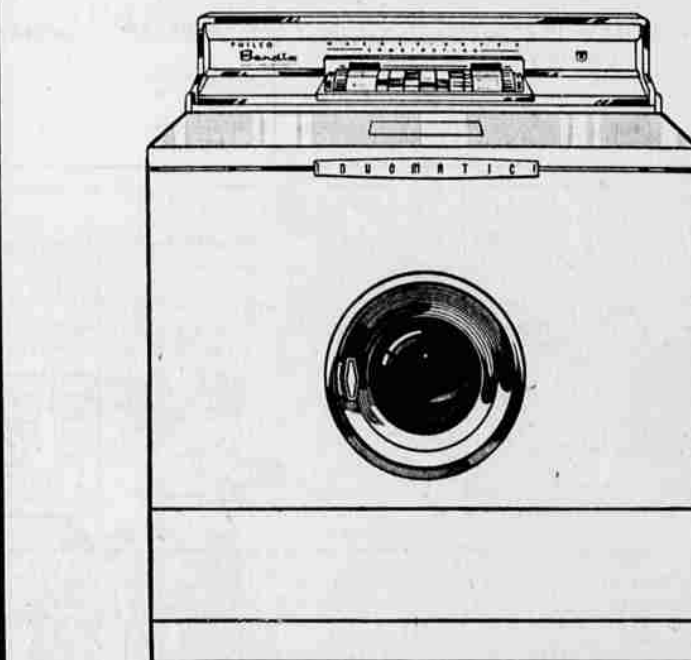
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
