Klamaths Set Meet Tonight

At least two resolutions will be presented at a meeting of withdrawing members of the Klamath Indian Tribe which has been announced by Delford Lang for 8 p.m. Friday at the Klamath Agency council hall.
 A resolution requesting that minors' per capita and pro rata shares, from the sales of smaller units, be turned over directly to the parents will be presented. Lang said, "as well as one providing a different and more equitable way of handling the sale of the Klamath Marsh."
 Guest speakers will include Wayne Blair, trust officer for the First National Bank, who will discuss the handling of per capita and pro rata shares, and Earl Wilcox, recently appointed head of the land sales office, who will discuss the progress of the sales program.
 Telegrams from Sen. Richard Neuberger, regarding the status of bank loans to withdrawing members of the tribe, and from the secretary of the interior regarding representation from his office will be read and discussed. A statement showing how the withdrawing members stand financially has been made available for the meeting by Don Foster, northwest area director for the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Foster is leaving for Washington, D.C. on November 17, and has offered to take back any questions tribe members may have to secure authoritative answers.
 F. Darold Windsor, Portland attorney who has been assisting this group of withdrawing members, will again be present voluntarily to provide legal advice.
 Lang said that the withdrawing members face many problems that must be ironed out, and a serious

financial situation. He adds that the number of persons attending the meeting, the strength of any resolution presented for the benefit of the members would depend on the during the meeting. A children's movie will be shown
