CHILQUIN — Coach Al Keck's powerful Merrill Huskies clinched the County 5B title as they pounded out a 40-7 victory over the Chiloquin Panthers here Saturday.

The Huskies were led by a pair of hard-running halfbacks, John Haskins and Bud Maupin. Haskins was a stickout on both offense and defense, scoring one touchdown on an 83 yard pass interception and one a seven yard sprint. Maupin tallied twice, once on a 15 yard run and the other on a 72 yard run. The 170 pound Maupin also kicked the four Merrill extra points, missing only two.

Once again, it was fullback Ron Hoggarth who led Chiloquin as he dominated the Panther running and passing attack.

Merrill drew first blood with five minutes left in the first quarter as Maupin tallied from 15 yards out on an end sweep. Maupin's kick split the goal posts to make the score 7-0.

Early in the second period the Huskies added seven more points to their total when Maupin galloped 72 yards to pay dirt after cutting off tackle. His kick was again good and the score was 14-0.

On the last play before the end

of the first half, the Huskies scored again as fullback Troy Patterson plunged over a guard from one yard out and Maupin's kick was good. The score was set up by Haskins who intercepted one of Hoggarth's passes and returned it 26 yards to the Chiloquin 25, Merrill scoring three plays later.

The Merrill squad opened the third period with a 48 yard scoring drive capped by Haskins, as he tallied from the seven yard line. Maupin's near-perfect toe made the score 28-0.

Chiloquin threatened two minutes later as end Lyle Hall recovered a Husky fumble on the Merrill 19. The threat was abruptly stymied as Haskins intercepted another one of Hoggarth's passes and romped 83 yards untouched down the sideline for another Husky TD, increasing their lead to 34-0. Maupin's kick was wide.

Coach Gordon Kuist's Panthers took the kickoff on their own 47 and drove 33 yards in 11 plays, capped by Hoggarth as he plunged over from the one yard line. The

170 pound junior also scored the extra point on a sweep around left end.

The highlight of the fourth quarter Panther scoring drive was two key passes by Hoggarth, one for 13 yards and the other for 11 yards.

With the Husky reserves playing most of the second half, the championship Merrill team finished the afternoon's scoring as quarterback Dennis Salvadori sprinted around end and into the end zone from five yards out. Key play in the Husky drive was a 53 yard pass play from Salvadori to Maupin.

Final statistics favored the Huskies as they piled up 292 total yards and 15 first downs to Chiloquin's 181 total yards and nine first downs.

The "Three Horsemen" of the Merrill back field, Maupin, Haskins and Patterson, racked up tremendous yardage on the ground as shown by the following statistics: Maupin, 139 yards on nine carries for an average of 15.4; Haskins, 67 yards on nine carries for an average of 7.5; Patterson, 50 yards on 12 carries for an average of 4.2.

Bonanza Clobbers Trojans

The Bonanza Antlers clamped a cinch on the second place spot on the District 5B football ladder as they overpowered the Sacred Heart Trojans, 51-0, in Gem Stadium Saturday afternoon.

The win gave "Erv" Ellis' Antler squad a 6-win, 1-loss record for the conference season while it spelled just the reverse for the outgunned Trojan 11.

The big gun in the Bonanza attack was Gary Atwood who romped for a 60 yard TD, another for 40 yards and capped his effort with a 17 yard tally before he left the game at halftime. Atwood also skinned an end for a point-after, for good measure.

Gary Dayley and Dan Nork each contributed a pair of Antler six-pointers: Dayley on runs of 60 and 43 yards while Nork was busy intercepting passes. Nork scored on two of three interceptions, one for a 30 yard TD and one for 25.

End Chester Schuler hauled in a 28 yard strike from quarterback Jim O'Connor for the last Bonanza counter and Nork and O'Connor each added a successful running try for point.

Coach Jerry Kempf's valiant Trojans topped the Bonanzas in the pass department in spite of the interceptions as quarterback George Hurley hit on three of eight attempts. In first downs the Trojans also registered on top, collecting eight to six for the Antlers.

Both teams used every available player in the contest. SHA has a 17-man roster while Bonanza has 22.

Bonanza left little doubt as to the outcome of the game as they scored three plays after inheriting the ball from the stymied Trojans shortly after the opening kickoff.

LAKEVIEW — The Lakeview Honkers put the cap on a highly successful conference season as they swarmed over the Madras White Buffaloes, 33-18 at Lakeview Friday night.

For coach Howard Hopper and his Honkers the victory marked revenge over the Buffaloes for a defeat handed them last year at Madras; the only loss the Lakeview squad has suffered in three years of league play.

The win boosts the Honkers into a District 7 A-2 playoff at Vale next Saturday afternoon. Vale and Lakeview meet for the right to contest the District 8 A-2 winner in the quarterfinals of state playoffs.

Sheer determination aided the Honkers in getting off to a seven point margin only five plays after the Madras kickoff and from there on they were never seriously threatened by the Buffaloes. The Madras squad counted in the second stanza and picked up a pair of TDs in the fourth as Hopper emptied his bench.

Stan Newman and Mike Deming each netted 85 yard touchdown romps and Newman broke away for a TD from the nine. Gordon Tracy and Bertron Daron contributed to the success as Tracy went for 40 yards and Daron plunged from the one after a 30 yard pass play from Glen Wells to Pinky Eganoff to Daron set up the score.

The handwriting is on the wall here now. If this levy isn't okayed by the voters Tuesday, we may find our youngsters paying for such services as playing tennis, hiking in our parks, playing softball or baseball or just using a swing, teeter-totter or slide.

Let's not make our youth pay for filling their empty summertime hours.

Last summer we noticed the first real sign that the local recreation department was not keeping pace with the present day requests being made on it. We had 800 boys participating in either softball or baseball. That's a big number, but there is more of the story to be told.

There were between 300 and 400 other youngsters who didn't get a chance to play ball because there was no room for them because of lack of facilities and leadership.

If this measure is defeated by the voters, the number of non-participants may increase this summer.

Let's make sure that boys have a chance to play softball or baseball this summer.

The job of heading up the Klamath Falls Park and Recreation Department lies in the hands of Bob Bonney.

Bonney's staff isn't overmanned to be sure. Besides himself, he has an office secretary and four year-around maintenance men. Four men to take care of all of the Klamath Falls park and recreation holdings isn't much.

This number is two less than were employed to manage the developed areas three years ago.

During the summer, part-time additional help is needed to supervise the playground areas and handle the direction of the softball and baseball programs. Another man is hired to water and cut the lawns which surround the city playgrounds. Without some help in finances, these park and recreation department employees may be dropped out of the program.

Let's see that Bonney has the personnel to adequately run a complete and well-rounded department.

Henley Hornets Fall To Phoenix Pirates

A stinging upset and an injured football player dampened the enthusiasm of Henley High students and alumni gathered for a Homecoming celebration as the Phoenix Pirates went home with a 13-7 victory over the Hornets and all-conference center Joe Tacchini went to the hospital for treatment of a shoulder separation Saturday afternoon.

The Hornets, who have sailed through Little Rogue Conference play on the strong end of a 4-1 record to wind up in the second place position, entered Saturday's match with the Pirates accorded an outside chance of gaining a tie for the top spot in the league provided they beat Phoenix and Eagle Point over the Hornets and all-conference center Joe Tacchini went to the hospital for treatment of a shoulder separation Saturday afternoon.

The Henley squad was taken by surprise as the Phoenix eleven displayed a powerful ground attack that netted a Pirate TD after the first period was only seven minutes old. The Pirates added seven points in the second stanza to give themselves a margin which combined with a strong pass defensive to prove enough to keep the Hornets in check.

The Hornets were held scoreless until early in the fourth frame when they caught hold and hauled in a Pirate touchdown. A fumble with only four minutes remaining in the game gave the Hornets another life but again their passing attack bogged down and the Pirates took command once more to run out the clock.

Phoenix collected 237 yards rushing as compared to 124 for the Hornets although Henley garnered 10 first downs to eight for the Pirates.

Henley, playing what coach Ted Ammerman called one of their poorest efforts, was unable to sustain drives either through the air or on the ground. Quarterback Gary Beher, whose throwing arm has accounted for a number of Hornets scores in other games, was able to hit for only one good pass out of nine tries, and that only good for one yard. Phoenix, who preferred to stay on the ground, tried four aerials and was successful on one.

An exchange of punts early in the first quarter resulted in a rough conflict in midfield that left Joe Tacchini sidelined with an injured arm. Tacchini left the contest when it was four minutes old and was taken to the hospital before the end of the game.

The Pirates notched their first six-pointer in the Jacksonville match as he counted one touchdown on a four yard run and then tossed a perfect 25 yard aerial to teammate Wayne Cabler for another. Ken Perreard, an end, hauled in a 19 yard toss from halfback Doyle Branson for the other Redskin tally.

Statistically the Mustangs were the better team but the scoring punch just wasn't there. In first downs the Malin squad picked up 18 to 12 for the "Skins. Fumbles were the main factor in the Mustang defeat; Malin lost the ball five times while Jacksonville only bobbled one.
