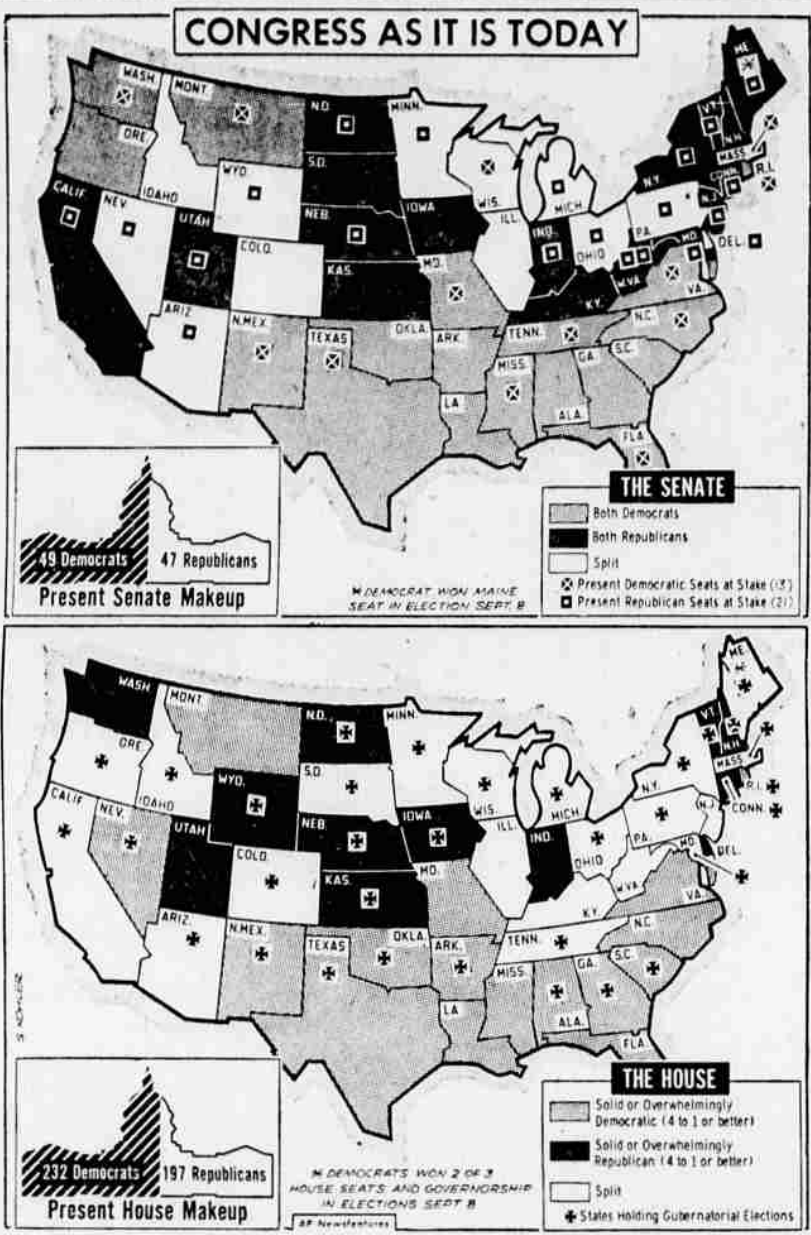

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## Nixon Ends U.S. Campaign, Plans Three Talks In Alaska

SEATTLE (AP)—Vice President Nixon wound up his continental United States campaign tour Friday night with a plea for election of a Republican Congress to support the administration's "peace without surrender" foreign policy.

The vice president, his wife and their two daughters headed for Alaska Saturday.

They plan stops in Juneau, Anchorage and Fairbanks in behalf of GOP candidates running for two seats in the U.S. Senate and one in the House in a special election Nov. 25.

In his last stateside speech before the Nov. 4 election, Nixon told a Republican rally at Everett, 30 miles north of here, that the only way to beat Communist forces without war is to be strong militarily, be firm diplomatically and wage peace unceasingly.

All 217 seats in the auditorium were filled and more persons gathered outside.

"In dealing with dictators—first with Hitler and then with the Communists—we have learned that a weak policy is a war policy, a firm policy is a peace policy," Nixon said.

## Prepare 'Break' At San Quentin

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. (UPI)—San Quentin officials calmly announced Saturday that a hole will soon be drilled in the prison wall big enough to drive a truck through. What's more, there won't even be a prison guard there.

The officials explained that the wall is being opened up so that trucks can get to the site where a new chapel will be constructed, without rumbling through the prison yard all night.

As for the missing guard, closed circuit television cameras will be trained on the hole in the wall. Moreover, the second a prisoner starts for the outside, the TV watching guard will sound an alarm.

## Paper Strike Averted Again

NEW YORK (AP)—A strike of New York's seven major dailies was averted Saturday on the basis of a fourth tentative agreement hammered out during early morning hours.

The New York Newspaper Guild had reached tentative agreement with the Mirror, Journal-American and World-Telegram and Sun. Negotiations with the Times continue, and sessions with the Herald Tribune and Post are recessed until Monday.

At the Daily News, Guild and management representatives agreed to "stop the clock" and ignore the midnight deadline to continue talks. They came to terms shortly before 3:30 a.m.

The papers have said they would all stop publishing if a Guild strike against one or more resulted in refusal by craft union employees to cross picket lines. Thus a strike call against either the Times, Herald Tribune or Post could shut down all seven papers. The 6,200 Guild members include editorial and commercial employees of the dailies.

All four tentative settlements provide for package increases of \$4 a week in the first year of the contracts and \$3 weekly in the second year.

All agreements are subject to Guild member ratification.

## Attorney Buys Crumbling Fort

BALTIMORE (AP)—Benjamin Eisenberg has bought himself an island and a tumble-down fort and is now open for suggestions as to what to do with it.

The attorney paid the government \$10,010 for the 3 1/2-acre Baltimore Harbor island, site of Fort Carroll.

The hexagonal man-made island is located just off the shipping channel. The fort was built in 1848 by a young Army colonel who later became Gen. Robert E. Lee.

Now inhabited by rats and seagulls, the fort never fired or received a shot in anger.

## Burro Booted From GI Service

# Cesium Ring Will Treat Cancer

NEW YORK (NEA)—With the cause of cancer still undiscovered, the latest hope for halting this killer is now being crated for shipment to The City of Hope National Medical Center which devised it.

It's called the Cesium Ring, and if it works according to plan, it will broaden the gap between life and death and give biology more time to find the cause of cancer.

The Cesium Ring is a radioactive unit that will bombard diseased cells with the equivalent of one million volts of gamma ray energy—a range considered today to be the optimum in cancer therapy.

But what this potent mechanism resembles more than anything else is an over-sized washing machine, with two X-ray heads that run on a track around the window.

And in place of the window is apparatus for holding a stretcher. The patient placed in the Ring can receive X-ray therapy from any point on the circular track that surrounds him.

While Westinghouse, which built the new Cesium Ring, estimates the cost at \$40,750, the amount is low enough to put the unit well within the reach of most hospitals and clinics. And the long life of the Cesium means that the price can be amortized over a longer period, with a lower cost for treatment.

The new Ring will be shipped from the Westinghouse plant in Baltimore, Md., to The City of Hope in Duarte, Calif., by special van with stops in 35 cities across the nation. One stop in Oak Ridge, Tenn., will be made for nuclear physicists and engineers to place two 1,000-Curie encapsulated elements of Cesium in the X-ray heads.

By the time the Ring is installed in Duarte, it will be ready for daily use.

But for The City of Hope, the new Ring is only one of 150 major research projects in the battle against cancer and leukemia. Experiments like the Cobalt Bomb—and the Cesium Ring—are proved in Duarte before being released for use by therapists throughout the nation and the world.

MOUNT VERNON, Ill. (AP)—A woman screaming hysterically stood by her car pointing toward the roadside.

Motorists climbed from two other cars and found what appeared to be the blood-smeared bodies of two women, one in a ditch and the other suspended from a tree.

Several other cars had stopped and a traffic snarl had developed Friday by the time the alarmed motorists discovered the "bodies" were mannequins, smeared with catchup and presumably left there by Halloween pranksters.

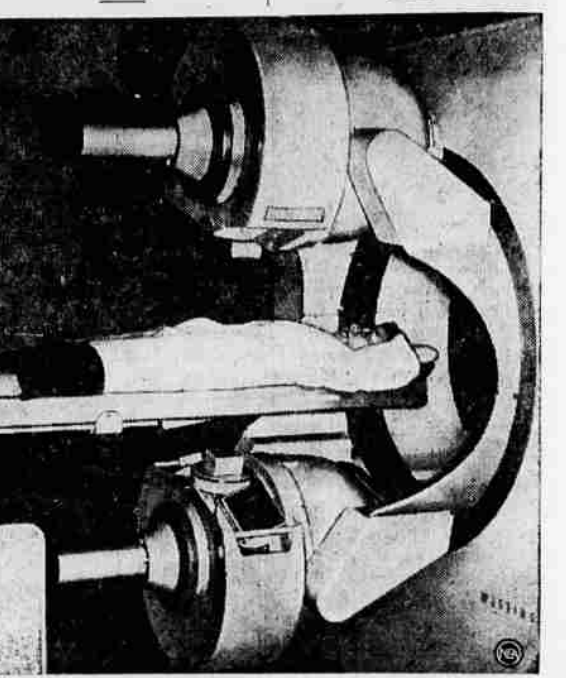

## Wife No. 4 Enters Probe

SALINAS, Calif. (UPI)—The untangling of the marital affairs of the late author John McPartland became more complicated Saturday for probate judge Stanley Lawson with the entrance on the scene of a fourth wife.

Lawson postponed until Nov. 20 a hearing on the writer's estate when an attorney for Mrs. Jane Luebbing McPartland said Friday his client was married in 1940 to the author of "No Down Payment," a sex-packed best-seller two years ago.

McPartland died suddenly last Sept. 14 at the age of 47. At that time he was living with Eleanor McPartland. It was afterwards learned that the 10-year alliance was in common law only and that the author was also legally married to Ida McPartland, of Mill Valley, Calif.

An earlier marriage to Mrs. Tanya Glick, of Los Angeles, came to light and Mrs. Glick said McPartland had been married to someone before her, which, if verified, would give the author five wives. She said she and McPartland were legally divorced.

Mrs. Luebbing, now living in San Francisco, said through her attorney she had no interest in McPartland's money except that she wanted it to go to the five children of Eleanor, the woman with whom McPartland was living at the time of his death.
