Scientists Develop Popcorn That Leaves Noise In Sack

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Scientists are claiming a new major breakthrough: They've invented noiseless popcorn.

A National Geographic Society news bulletin reports that the silent type makes little or no noise when chewed. The silence in movie theaters could become nerve shattering with nothing to be heard but the sound track.

Unfortunately, there's a drawback. The noiseless sort isn't actually popcorn. It's made from sorghum and expands only 17 times its original size when popped—a comparatively small ratio. For this reason, the product with the low decibel count isn't yet commercially appealing.

Nonetheless, scientists at the Agriculture Department and at Purdue and Cornell universities are carrying on popcorn research that began 20 years ago.

The first corn popping was carried out by the American Indians

long before there were any theater lobbies, or for that matter, white men in this country.

White settlers took up the idea but popcorn really didn't get going until around 1890, the National Geographic reports. During World War II, the scarcity of sweets contributed to its popularity and the introduction of popcorn stands in the movie houses created the present day boom.

Scientists are still trying to figure out exactly why popcorn pops and why some hybrids explode nicely while others don't even try.

They've determined that the ability to pop is related closely to the percentage of soft starch in a kernel—the softer the starch, the poorer the popping.

They've found that flint corn used for livestock feed pops pretty well; dent corn, another feed type, pops feebly. Four corn and roasting ears won't pop at all.

YREKA—Mrs. Effie Butler and Mrs. Ora McGregor, both of Yreka, and Mrs. Roy Townley of Montague discussed rock gardens and ground cover plants at the October meeting of the Yreka Garden Club.

Mrs. Butler opened the discussion by listing a variety of ground cover plants, popularly used for rock gardens, mentioning in particular lily of the valley as one of the best plants for ground cover. She also recommended the use of dwarf daffodils and grape hyacinth for an added touch of color. Mrs. Butler also recommended the use of light porous lava rock as being especially beneficial for rock gardens, as it helps keep plants and roots moist and cool, as well as providing lime.

Mrs. Townley spoke on the cover plants which were the hardest for the Siskiyou area, and stated that the Arbis and Veronica, not only are a healthy plant, but most colorful.

The culture of outdoor geraniums was the topic of Mrs. McGregor's talk, wherein she described the care and rooting of the plant, added some useful methods of the procedure that would result in good, strong geranium plants.

Mrs. Carol Kelley, president of the Yreka club, announced that the topic for the November meeting would be on peonies.

The landscaping of the new high school grounds, which is to be a project of the Yreka club at no cost to the county, was reported on by Mrs. Esther Sullivan.

Demos Have Good Chance To Control Oregon Senate

SALEM (AP)—Democrats have a strong chance of controlling the 1959 Oregon Senate for the first time since 1878.

But it's a toss-up whether they will retain control of the House of Representatives, which they won two years ago for the first time in 20 years.

In the Senate, the Democrats have 12 holdover members who do not face reelection this year. Another Democratic senator—Dan Thiel, Astoria—has no opposition. This means that to win control, all the Democrats have to do is win three contests in next Tuesday's election. Their chances are good, since they are favored to

win that many races in Multnomah and Clackamas counties.

The 1957 Senate was split 15-15. Half of the Senate is elected at each general election.

The Republicans have only three holdover senators. Two other GOP members—Francis W. Ziegler, Corvallis, and Carl H. Francis, Dayton—are unopposed.

So, even before the election is held, the Democrats are assured of 13 seats in the new Senate, while the Republicans are assured of only five. There is heavy campaigning going on for the 12 contested seats.

The Senate is losing several of its stalwarts, which means that the

1959 Senate will be handicapped by lack of experienced men. Among those who did not seek reelection this year were Sens. Howard C. Belton (R-Canby), dean of the Legislature with 11 sessions behind him; Phil Brady (D-Portland) and Truman A. Chase (R-Eugene), 9 sessions; Rudie Wilhelm (R-Portland), 6; Warren Gill (R-Lebanon), 5; and Lee Ohmart (R-Salem).

Four 1957 House members are seeking Senate seats. They are Reps. Eddie Ahrens, Turner, and Edwin E. Cone, Eugene, both Republicans; and Richard E. Groener, Milwaukie, and William A. Grenfell Jr., Portland, both Democrats.

In addition, Elmer Deetz, Canby dairyman, is running as an independent, although he formerly served in the House as a Republican.

Democrats controlled the House last year by a 37-23 margin in the regular session, and 36-24 at the special session. The difference was that Rep. Joe Rogers, Independence, switched from Democratic to Republican between the two sessions.

Twenty-six Democratic and 14 Republican members of last year's sessions are running again. This means that the House might have more experienced men and women than in recent years.
