

Personality Sketch Given Of New Pope, John XXIII

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The coat of arms of the new Pope, John XXIII, carries reminders of his two most recent posts.

On the silver and red shield are the Lion of St. Mark, a symbol of Venice, and the Fleur de Lis, once a symbol of French kings.

Pope John was papal nuncio to Paris from 1944 to 1953 and patriarch of Venice afterward.

LOURDES, France (AP)—Pope John XXIII is known in Lourdes as an initiate of the jet age of travel.

He came here last March with a delegation from the Vatican for the consecration of the underground basilica at the Lourdes grotto. The group traveled in a twin-jet French Caravelle which had been blessed by Pope Pius XII.

VATICAN CITY (AP)—"The quiet after the storm."

Thus priests of the archdiocese of Venice described Angelo Giuseppe Cardinal Roncalli when he became patriarch of the canal city at the head of the Adriatic.

The portly new pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church—henceforth to be known as Pope John XXIII—is a jovial man, a student of history, and a vigorous defender of public morals. At 76 he begins his reign later in life than any pope in 228 years. But his associates say he has a quick mind, a quick smile, good health and a determined character.

"I was born of poor parents," he told his new flock on his arrival in Venice in 1953. "Providence took me from my native hamlet and led me to travel the roads of the world, from east to west, putting me in contact with most serious social and political problems . . . (but) don't look at your patriarch as a politician or diplomat—look at him as the servant of God."

He often invited his priests to dine at his table. He walked the city's twisted streets and rode the gondolas through its canals, winning the reputation of a tireless worker.

But his tolerance and good humor did not extend to certain facets of life in the pleasure-loving city.

He closed Venice's churches to tourists in shorts, saying, "Italy is not on the Equator, and even there, by the way, lions wear their coats and crocodiles are lined with their most precious hides."

He told the 1957 Venice Film Festival the movie industry must not limit itself to "presenting the decadence of modern customs . . . Moviegoers want to see more beautiful things."

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Ike May Set Record Right On His Views On Measure

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Proposition 13 earned the spotlight on California's busy political stage today as the result of action by the White House and Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said the White House may make a direct protest against radio broadcasts using President Eisenhower's name in support of the proposition, which would end California's tax exemption for private and parochial schools.

At the same time, Nixon denounced reports that he favored the proposition as "falsification and bigotry at its worst." The vice president said he voted against the proposal on an absentee ballot Wednesday.

Hagerty made his announcement after the White House received a flood of telegrams asking whether the President had given permission for anyone to use his name in support of the tax. Protests were also received by the FBI and the Federal Communications Commission.

"The use of the President's name by any group in connection with Proposition 13 on the California ballot is completely unauthorized," Hagerty said. He added that the President considered the matter one "strictly for California voters to decide—and no one else."

Another controversial proposition—No. 18—was debated Wednesday night in San Francisco by two veteran observers. The merits of the so-called right to work proposal were discussed pro and con by retired shipping executive Roger Lapham and President Harry Bridges of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union.

The one-time antagonism between the two men has apparently been dulled by the years. In a mild debate, they confirmed what was already known—Lapham is for 18 and Bridges is against it.

In the race for governor, both candidates were on the run. Sen. William F. Knowland carried his Republican banner into Northern California and Attorney General Edmund G. Brown shifted his

Democratic campaign to the south.

Meanwhile, Knowland lost the support of the San Francisco Chronicle, which backed the Republican candidate in the primary election last June.

In a brief statement on page 1, the Chronicle said today:

"The Chronicle supported Sen. William Knowland in the primary election. Unfortunately, however, we have been unfavorably impressed with his subsequent campaign. We now no longer feel we can unqualifiedly urge his election, and therefore suggest our readers vote for the candidate of their choice."

POLIO INCIDENT UP

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Public Health Service Friday reported 233 polio cases in the nation for the week ended Oct. 23, more than double the number for the comparable period of a year ago. The agency said 155 cases, or 66 per cent, were paralytic. In the similar week of 1957, 112 polio cases were recorded.

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
