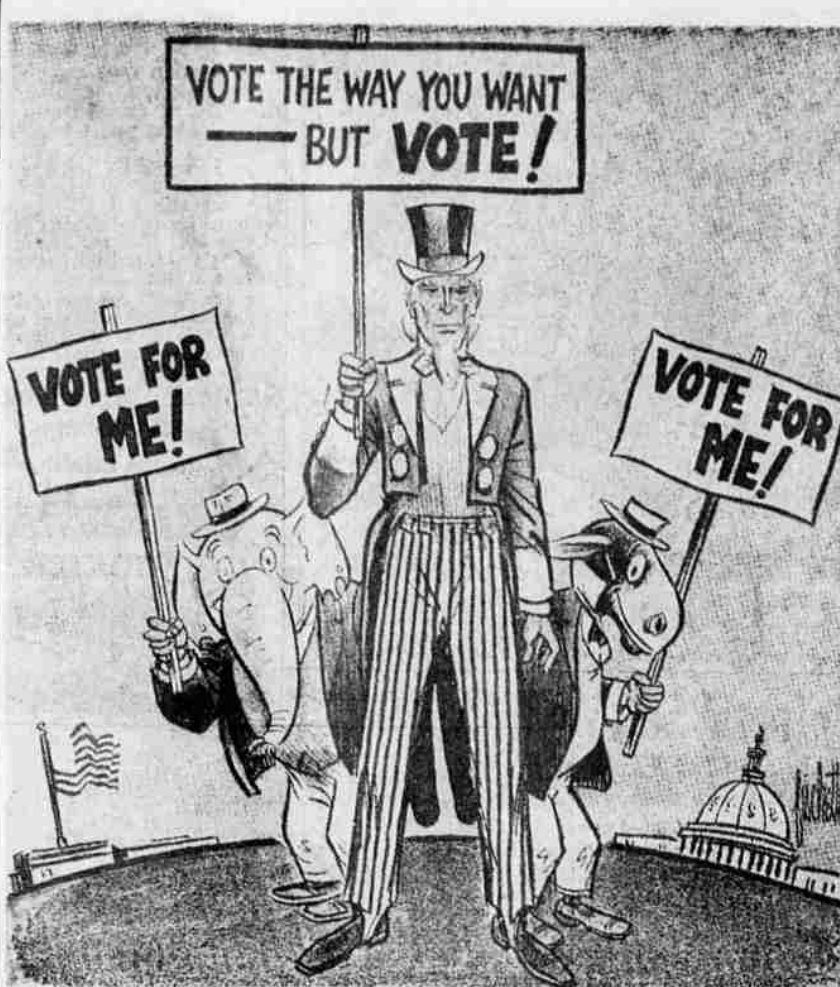
Save Your Money

Big California Turnout Seen

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A campaign in the primary. Since then, he has put on a tremendous personal drive that even had him out ringing doorbells.

He said today he sees a rising momentum in his favor as shown by "a deluge of new contributions, phone calls from new supporters, encouraging messages and victory-pitch enthusiasm of my campaigners."

Republican Sen. William F. Knowland declared his strenuous last week of campaigning, topped by a 20-hour telethon, has set off "a gigantic tidal wave of victory."

Rosenthal predicted Atty. Gen. Edmund G. Brown would defeat Knowland by a million votes in the gubernatorial race; Rep. Clair Engle would topple Gov. Goodwin J. Knight for U.S. senator by 600,000; and the Democrats would gain three congressmen for sure, maybe four.

The Brown-Knowland battle, the Knight-Knowland squabbling and organized labor's all-out war against a "right-to-work" initiative prompted revised estimates of a state vote of close to 80 per cent.

That would mean a record non-presidential election turnout of about 5,300,000 of the 6,742,421 voters. Democrats outnumber Republicans by 1,199,000, their highest margin yet in California.

Knowland and other Republicans staked their hopes on the tendency of Californians to ignore party lines in general elections. The senator anchored his own chances to his pounding on labor abuses and his support of Proposition 13, the "right-to-work" initiative which would outlaw the union shop.

Democrats are confident their persistent "Vote Democratic" appeal will pay off this time. In the primary, the Democratic ticket of mostly political unknowns bested GOP incumbents in the two-party popular vote.

Knowland, with no party opponent, staged a minimum cam-

views on the key labor issue in an appearance Sunday on the Meet the Press (NBC) television program from Los Angeles.

Brown agreed with Knowland on the need for state laws to regulate unions. But the answer, he said, is not the compulsory open shop.

He denied he was in the debt of labor bosses for union support. Knowland has depicted his opponent as a captive of such labor leaders as Walter Reuther and Harry Bridges.

"I feel under no obligation to anyone," Brown said.

Salem Chamber Cancels
Speech By Senator Morse

The Salem Chamber of Commerce cancelled a speech that Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore) was to have given this noon.

The reason, Morse promptly replied, was that "the chamber does not want to support that American institution of freedom, namely freedom of speech."

The cancellation was announced by Robert D. Gregg, chamber president, who said: "In the light of the non-partisan position of the Chamber of Commerce and the state of feeling this late in the political campaign, it was felt wise to cancel..."

Reference to the political campaign stemmed from the senator's talks last week in which he accused Mark Hatfield, Republican candidate for governor, of lying under oath in testimony in court.

Since then, there has been widespread comment from party leaders, candidates and voters. Much of it has decried the senator's reference to the case in which Hatfield was driver of a car that

struck and killed a child 18 years ago.

After the accident, in a civil suit for damages, Hatfield testified high grass obscured the child.

Morse, speaking at Medford Friday, said both the jury, and the Supreme Court on appeal, rejected Hatfield's testimony. He said, "I don't intend to let a man lie to a jury and get away with it."

J. O. Bailey, retired justice who was Oregon chief justice at the time of the appeal, said in a statement Sunday that "what Sen. Morse is trying to say, in effect, is that every litigant and every witness on the losing side in any court action has lied and should therefore be denied full citizenship rights. This simply is not true. In every lawsuit there are two sides. No two witnesses see the same situation exactly alike. The fact that testimony differs does not, in itself, indicate that witnesses have been untruthful."

In reference to the Salem speech cancellation today, Morse said at Pasco Sunday night: "I was scheduled and would have talked on a completely non-partisan issue, namely the constitutional system of checks and balances as the great preserver of our liberties."

Of the reason given by Gregg for the cancellation: "I was particularly amused... I pointed out to Mr. Gregg he ought to give the true reason for the cancellation of my speech."

Governor Dines;
Hatfield At Ease

SALEM (AP) — With the election only hours away, one candidate for governor campaigned Sunday while the other rested at his home.

Democratic Gov. Robert Holmes attended two rallies in Portland, and then went to a church dinner.

Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, the Republican candidate, rested the entire day at his home here.

In separate interviews Sunday

night with the Associated Press, both said they were hopeful of victory in Tuesday's general election.

Holmes said he was certain that Democrats would sweep to victory in races for Congress and the Legislature.

Hatfield said there was some doubt in his mind whether Republicans would gain control of the Legislature.

Hatfield said, though, he was certain he had gained new friends after being attacked by Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore).

Holmes said he was uncertain what kind of an effect Morse's remarks would have. But Holmes said he was sorry that Morse ever brought the matter up.

In a series of speeches late last week, Morse said that Hatfield at age 18 had lied under oath after killing a little girl in a car accident.

Morse said Hatfield lied in court, and that Hatfield had a tradition of untrustworthiness.

Said Hatfield: "We had every belief we had a good chance of winning before Morse made his blast. Polls showed us ahead. What effect Morse's remarks will have is very hard to tell. But we believe we have made new friends."

Holmes said he felt a deep regret that the incident was made part of the campaign. And he added:

"I don't know what kind of an effect it might have. A good many people might be persuaded that Sen. Morse is doing the right thing in building his case to show, as he says, that the GOP candidate does not have a record of intellectual honesty. On the other hand, I think there are a lot of people who resent this being brought up."

Holmes said he will spend today — the final day of the campaign — at work at his office here. His only political activity will be a television speech tonight in Portland.

Hatfield, however, will spend the entire day shaking hands in plants and offices in Portland, and appear there twice on television tonight.

Hatfield will vote Tuesday in Salem, and then spend the evening in Portland.

Gov. Holmes and his wife will drive to Gearhart, then briefly in Portland and then spend the entire evening at their Salem home.

The candidates both said it has been a grueling campaign.

Said Holmes: "I think the reason is that I've got the governor's job to do every day in addition to covering the entire state."

Said Hatfield: "We've been campaigning in every section of the state — shaking hands a la Estes Kefauver."

Holmes said that in his campaign he found "deep resentment toward the policies of the Eisenhower Administration. People in the Eugene and Roseburg areas and all through the timber belt feel that the tight money and high interest policies have caused the recession."

Hatfield said he has been elated because "People in every part of the state were very warm and very responsive. The attitude of the people has been very encouraging. Many registered Democrats have come to say they are going to cross party lines and vote for me."

Both Holmes and Hatfield said they were certain that there would be a huge turnout of voters Tuesday.

Three-Way DA Battle
Tops County Campaign

The hottest race on the Klamath County scene appears to be the three-way write-in contest for district attorney.

The three candidates for the post bring varied experiences to the race.

Humble, 55, veteran Klamath Falls attorney, has had eight years experience in the office, having served from 1941 to 1945 as deputy under L. Orth Sismore, and from 1945 to 1949 as district attorney.

Humble filed after petitions bearing 600 signatures asked him to file for the post.

Beddoe, 30, incumbent, has had previous experience in the criminal investigation office in Salem, and with the parole board in Multnomah, Marion and Klamath County. He has held the post since his appointment on April 23.

Ramirez, 31, graduated from Willamette University College of Law in 1952, and began private law practice in Klamath Falls in 1953.

The question of a vacancy in the office did not arise until after the primary when it was determined that the appointment given Beddoe was not for the balance of the term of Richard Beesley, but rather until the next general election.

Because he was not appointed until April 23, he was not a primary candidate and therefore would have had to submit a petition bearing 1,000 signatures in order to appear on the November ballot.

On September 3, Beddoe said he planned to do so but confused the deadline of August 24 because of the press of work and didn't realize his mistake until too late.

Beddoe indicated at that time he would be a write-in candidate.

Subsequently, Clarence Humble and Glenn Ramirez also indicated intentions of filing as write-in candidates for the post.

The office of district attorney currently pays \$9,300 including the state salary for the office and additional appropriations by the county court.

Another county race likely to produce a tight contest is the battle for the county commissioner spot between Fred Heilbroner and R. R. Walker. Both men are well known in Klamath County and were victorious in hotly contested primary battles.

The four-way battle for the two state representative posts also should be closely contested. The two incumbents, Carl Yancey and John Kerbow, both Democrats, face a challenge from two Republicans, Paul Landry and Ed Chilcote.

County Treasurer Eva Cook will seek reelection against Loyd DeLap, a write-in victor in the primary contest.

Julian Ager and Lyle C. Smith will be battling for the county surveyor spot.

The only race on the city of Klamath Falls level is that for councilman of Ward 5 where present incumbent Ladd Hoyt faces a challenge from Roy Weaver. James Barnes, councilman for Ward 3, is unopposed in his bid for reelection.

County Clerk Charlie DeLap said that in his estimation this was not a heavy ballot, and the counting should be fairly fast.

He would not venture a prediction on the percentage of voter turnout, but state indications predict the vote may run as high as 60 to 65 per cent.
