How did the New York Giants put an end to the growing myths that Cleveland was invincible and Jimmy Brown superhuman? Chuck Conerly pitched and Sam Huff caught. It was that simple. Conerly, 37, tossed three touchdown passes, including the clincher to Alex Webster in the fourth quarter as the Giants upset the previously undefeated Browns 21-17 Sunday.

And what did Huff catch? Two handoffs of Jimmy Brown.

The massive 230-pound Huff, specifically assigned to handle Brown man-to-man from his middle guard position, held Brown 50 yards under his average. Only once was Brown able to break away on a long gain.

The victory moved the Giants into contention for the Eastern Division title in the National Football League with a 4-2 record. First-place Cleveland now is 5-1.

In the Western Conference, Johnny Unitas pitched two more touchdowns as Baltimore won its unbeaten string to six games by thumping Green Bay 36-0. It was the 21st consecutive game in which Unitas has tossed for a TD, moving him to within two of the all-time record.

The Colts' victory coupled with the Chicago Bears' 41-35 loss to

Los Angeles as Jon Arnett ran wild, brought them closer to their first title since entering the league in 1953. The Colts are two games in front of second-place Chicago, now 4-2.

In other games, Pittsburgh defeated Washington 24-16; San Francisco edged Detroit 24-21; and Philadelphia and Chicago's Cardinals played to a 21-21 tie.

Giants 21, Browns 17

The Giants came back from a 17-7 halftime deficit. They were back in the game on a Conerly to Webster touchdown pass that covered 15 yards. In their winning drive the Giants got two breaks, riving the kicker and pass interference penalties. Webster wrapped it up, taking Conerly's flat pass on the 19 and eluding two tacklers to score at 2:50 of the final quarter.

Unitas played only part of the game, leaving shortly before the half after he was kicked in the back. George Shaw took over and tossed three touchdown passes, scored once himself and completed 12 of 14 aeriels in the route. The Colts should be more thoroughly tested next Sunday when they play the Giants in New York.

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Oregon State Takes Turn Smelling Roses

That tantalizing aroma of roses centered in the Pacific Northwest Monday but with a whiff still remaining for some Pacific Coast Conference members to the south.

Such a situation existed in the Rose Bowl race after Oregon State's Beavers beat California 14-8 to grab the front-running position.

Still in contention, however,

Washington State's Cougars stayed in with a 38-20 triumph over UCLA at Los Angeles. The Cougars play the Beavers Saturday at Pullman in the top game of the West Coast week. California entertains UCLA, Stanford goes to Oregon and Washington plays at Southern California, Idaho travels to Montana for a non-conference game.

EXTRA VICTORIES

The standings show OSC with 4-1, followed by California 3-1, USC 4-2 and USC 3-2. The extra victories by the Beavers and Washington State came over Idaho and won't make much difference in the Rose Bowl figuring since the Vandals play only three PCC games. But the victory over Cal could be the big decider if OSC and California finish out their schedules without further blemish.

Southern California flashed a strong running attack and solid defense in turning back Stanford 29-6 while Washington beat Oregon 6-0.

Idaho fell to independent San Jose State 41-6.

California dominated the statistics, but Oregon State won at Corvallis as halfback Paul Lowe proved the man in the clutch. The Bears opened the scoring with a 56-yard march. Fullback Billy Patton cracked the final three yards and Wayne Crow threw the conversion pass to Tom Bates.

The Beavers tied the count when center Doug Bashor intercepted a pitchout from quarterback Joe Kapp and dashed 31 yards to score. Dainard Paulson circled end for the conversion. Lowe went eight yards to score the winning touchdown in the third quarter after halfback John Horrolo intercepted a Kapp pass and brought it to the California 43.

On the statistical side, California gained 291 yards to 113 for the Beavers and ran up 20 first downs to 6. But the Bears' final chance ended in the fourth period when a 60-yard advance died on the OSC 9.

OVER-POWERED

At Stanford, the Trojans overpowered the Indians with Hillard scoring twice—on a 3-yard run and 23-yard pass—and Angelo Cane and Don Buford making the other two scores on runs of 18 and 25 yards.

Two Stanford first half fumbles led to two touchdowns and Troy led 21-0 at the end of the first half. The Trojans gained 312 yards on the ground to 67 for Stanford.

Washington State, operating without ace quarterback Bobby Newman, led all the way against UCLA. When UCLA closed the count to 14-8, Cougar quarterback Dave Wilson uncorked a pass to Bill Steiger on a scoring play covering 66 yards. The Bruins then drove 67 yards to close the margin again, but Cougar halfback Chuck Morrell took the ensuing kickoff and dashed 33 yards for another WSC tally.

Washington's Luther Carr caught a screen pass from Bob Hivner in the final period against Oregon and threaded his way 37 yards to score the winning touchdown. It marked the first PCC victory for the Huskies who three times have lost to conference foes.

San Jose State, with Mike Jones passing beautifully, scored four times through the air and twice on the ground to rout Idaho at Boise.

But the handsome, 34-year-old Tiger boss couldn't chill the bowl fever sizzling among LSU fans today. It began with LSU's 26-6 opening victory over Rice and has picked up steam each week.

Sugar Bowl officials were in the press box Saturday night when LSU tumbled unbeaten Mississippi 14-0. The Tigers now have won seven with Duke, Mississippi State and Tulane left.

Bowl representatives cannot contact LSU officially until it completes its schedule Nov. 22.

The Rebels were the most successful team this season in halting halfback Billy Cannon, Tiger All America candidate.

Mississippi punts and kickoffs were aimed cautiously away from the fleet 200-pounder, top ground gainer in the Southeastern Conference.

Cannon gained 34 yards in 11 carries against Mississippi for an average of slightly more than 3 yards.

In six previous games the junior halfback carried 64 times for 425 yards and a 6.2-yard average.

SMU Great Back In Suit

DALLAS (AP)—Don Meredith's back and Southern Methodist is ready to make its move.

The Methodists, who got inspiration for victory over Georgia Tech just because Dangerous Don, the mighty, passer, was on the bench called on the confident quarterback to touch down Texas. He did with a touchdown pass and his own TD score as SMU rallied to win 26-10 and jump back into the Southwest Conference race.

Meredith had been out of action for 12 quarters when he finally got back into the lineup. It was for three downs against Georgia Tech and he flung a 22-yard pass for a touchdown.

Saturday, Don was used sparingly against Texas because his inactivity had made him rusty. He came into the game with SMU trailing 10-0 in the third period.

Meredith, who set a new collegiate record last year with a 596 average for completions, isn't up to that this season but he still has quite a record considering the time played. He has thrown 34 and completed 36 for 667 and 448 yards.

Southern Methodist has Texas A&M, Arkansas, Baylor and Texas as Christian to play. Fans think SMU will take those unless something happens again to Meredith. So, SMU is hoping for a TCU victory over Rice. Only in that way can the Methodists get into the championship race. Because the Meredith-minus Mustangs lost to Rice.
