New Car Owners Face Rate Hike

NEW YORK (AP)—Owners of longer and wider 1959 cars will be charged 15 to 30 per cent more to park them in some city garages.

The decision to boost rates for larger cars was reached at a meeting of the executive board of the Metropolitan Garage Board of Trade.

The board said a lower rate of increase will apply to regular customers, while transients will pay the higher rate.

Monthly rates now range from \$22 to \$30.

Korea Republic President Pledges Aid Against Reds

SEOUL (UPI)—President Syngman Rhee pledged recently that the United States will "never be alone" in its fight against Communism.

The United States and other "free" nations can count on the support of South Korea with its 720,000-man armed forces in any war against Communist countries including Communist China, he said in an exclusive written interview with United Press International.

New Cocktail Alarms Meds

CHICAGO (AP)—The scrap iron cocktail is the newest bootleg drink to alarm the medical profession.

The concoction—popular along skid rows—is started by dumping yeast, cracked corn or corn meal and sugar into a large metal drum. Rubbing alcohol and moth balls are added. A dash of the cleaning agent Clorox speeds up fermentation.

The drink produces bizarre and serious mental effects. Few patients could drink more than half a pint in six to eight hours and remain conscious. More than half the patients studied suffered from tremors and hallucinations identical to delirium tremens. The symptoms disappeared when drinking was halted.

Writing in the Journal of the American Medical Assn., a team of South Carolina scientists said the drink has a metallic iron taste probably caused by strong concentration of alcohols and traces of metal from the mixing container.

The report on 50 patients suffering from drinking the concoction was made by Dr. Richard H. Gadsden, Ph. D., and Doctors R. Ramsey Mellette and William C. Miller Jr., of Charleston, S.C.
