

Portland Hit By Explosion

PORTLAND (AP)—An explosion rocked the quiet, sleeping neighborhood. Shrapnel was hurled through windows 250 feet away. Then a torrent of water rushed down the street.

Residents of the area tumbled from their beds and found a gaping hole where a fire hydrant had stood.

Police said someone—probably Halloween vandals—placed a 15-stick charge of dynamite around the hydrant Saturday morning and then set it off.

The explosion shattered the hydrant, broke a water main and left a gaping hole four feet deep and seven feet wide.

Ninety houses in the area were without water for seven hours—except for that which poured into basements.

Hopefuls List Contributions

WASHINGTON (AP)—Marion T. Weatherford, Arlington Republican, reports he has spent \$8,201 in his campaign for election as representative from Oregon's 3rd Congressional District.

He lists contributions of \$6,311. Rep. Al Ullman (D-Baker), seeking reelection to that office, gave his expenditures as \$300 and his contributions as \$33.

Other expenditures and contributions reported by Oregon candidates in preliminary estimates:

Rep. Edith Green (D), Portland, none and \$2,568, all turned over to the Edith Green Committee; John Johnston, Astoria Republican seeking Mrs. Green's seat, \$16,532 and \$17,933; Rep. Walter Norblad, Stayton Republican, \$1,729 and \$2,272; Robert V. Thornton, Salem Democrat, Norblad's opponent, \$1,550 and \$1,107; Rep. Charles O. Porter, Eugene Democrat, no expenditures or contributions; Paul Geddes, Roseburg Republican seeking Porter's seat, \$560 to be reimbursed by Geddes for Congress Committee, and none.

The law requires congressional candidates to file two reports—a preliminary accounting before the general election and a final report afterward.

LOW BIDDER

PORTLAND (AP)—A Lebanon firm has submitted the low bid for bank protection works along the Santiam River.

The Army Engineers said the \$56,356 bid was submitted by Floyd Graham Construction Co. for work near Jefferson.

British Women Face Panty Loss

LONDON (UPI)—Thousands of British women are in mortal danger of losing their panties at any moment, the tabloid Sunday Pictorial warned Sunday.

It said a big manufacturer of women's panties had admitted his firm was gluing the elastic waistbands together instead of sewing them and that the glue sometimes gives way after repeated washing and ironing.

The Pictorial said the Countess of Haddington was one of the first victims and that anyone could be the next. It happened when she was opening an exhibition at Edinburgh a week ago, it said.

But it had good news for the future. The firm is now sewing the elastic together, it said.

HONOR HERBERT HOOVER

NEW YORK (UPI)—The National Institute of Social Sciences announced Sunday that former President Herbert Hoover will be the first person in 59 years to receive for a second time its gold medal for service to humanity.

Hoover received the award in 1918. Institute President Frank Pace said others to receive the 1958 gold medal will be James R. Killian Jr., special assistant to the President for science and technology; Negro soprano Marian Anderson; and Robert B. Anderson, secretary of the Treasury.

Dick Campaigns In Alaska; Plugs GOP, Slaps Truman

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP)—Vice President Nixon hurried through this vast territory, which will soon become the 49th state, with plugs for the Eisenhower administration, jabs at former President Truman and some cheerful words for the Republican party.

Nixon will wind up his whirlwind tour of Alaska with speeches here today.

The vice president again reported that his cross-continent swing has revealed a late surge for the Republican party. He said here that Republicans have a good chance of ousting Democratic governors in the states of Iowa, Kansas, Oregon, New York and Rhode Island. But he would make no specific forecasts on the House and Senate races.

New Record Set By Jet Airliner

BOSTON (AP)—A four-jet Pan American Airways Boeing 707 flew nonstop from Boston to Paris Sunday in 6 hours and 3 minutes, a record for the hop.

The plane, with a normal cruising speed of 575 miles an hour, carried 111 persons and crew. Capt. William Moss Jr. of Huntington, N. Y., was at the controls.

The previous Boston-Paris record—8 hours and 55 minutes—was set in 1951.

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Second Quint Now Mother

MONTREAL (AP)—Two of the Dionne quintuplets now are mothers. Annette, Mrs. Germain Allard, gave birth Sunday to a boy weighing 8 pounds 1 ounce.

The 24-year-old mother and her son were reported doing well at a suburban hospital. The father, a finance company official who also is 24, said they had discussed naming the baby Francois but hadn't decided finally.

Annette and Allard were married Oct. 12, 1957. Her sister Cecile, Mrs. Philippe Langlois, had a boy Sept. 15. Another sister, Marie, also is married. The unmarried quintuplet, Yvonne, is a nurse, and the fifth sister, Emilie, died four years ago.

TELECAST CORONATION

ROME (UPI)—Millions of Europeans will be able to watch the coronation of Pope John XXIII over a continent-wide television hook-up Tuesday. It will be the first TV presentation of a papal coronation.
