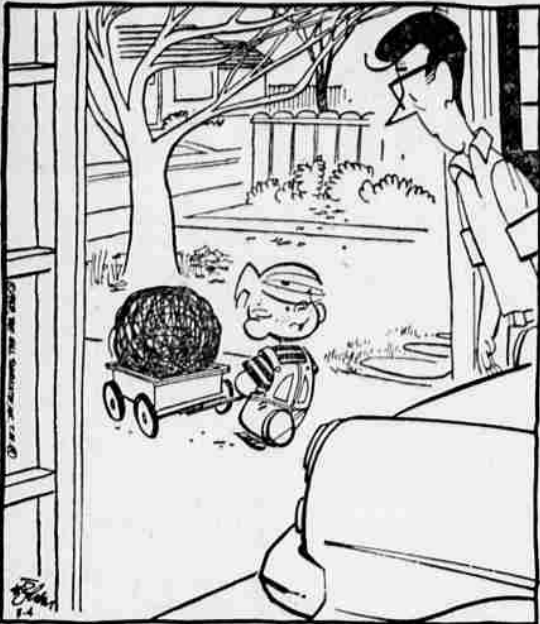

Ex-Wife Hits Film Star

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Actor Sterling Hayden hates women, his former wife says.

Mrs. Betty Ann de Noon, 36, filed in Superior Court Monday an affidavit that says in part: "If he had devoted the attention to our lives that he did to hating his first wife (actress Madeleine Carroll) and his mother and women generally, maybe we could have had a successful marriage."

"I stood by him for many years while he unsuccessfully consulted analysts about his very serious sexual problem."

Hayden, 42, and his ex-wife are battling in court over custody of their four children. They were married in 1947 and divorced in 1955.

Kingsley Aide Assumes Post

Star Doesn't Like Labels, Especially The Brando Type

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Quickest way to raise the hackles on Paul Newman is to liken him to Marlon Brando, a comparison which doesn't sit well with Marlon, either.

Asked point blank if he patterned himself after mumble Marlon, Newman froze with anger.

"Why does everyone have to put labels on actors?" he demanded. "I never fails. Sooner or later every newcomer to Hollywood is told he is 'another somebody or other.'"

"First they said I looked like Brando. Then it was agreed that we had the same 'quality.' All I want to know is what quality? I have yet to have anyone come up with the answer to that."

Paul simmered down somewhat, admitting that Brando does have a "quality."

He explained it as a "rebellious attitude, which I don't believe I have. I've also been compared with Jimmy Dean, but Jimmy's quality was a lost little boy point of view."

In addition to their physical resemblance, Newman and Brando share an Actors Studio background and draw similar roles in pictures—usually heavy drama laced with complicated characterizations. Both have played fighters, cowboys, soldiers and in costume epics.

Currently Newman is starring in Warner Brothers' "The Philadelphian."

West To Offer New Proposal

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Western Allies will ask the Soviet Union to join in developing a vast military inspection system capable of blocking a surprise nuclear attack by any great power for perhaps 10 years.

Any system worked out now would have to be overhauled after a decade, it was explained, to take into account new weapons.

The proposed system would mean an end to much secrecy in the Soviet Union, and officials are not optimistic.

The first round of talks opening Monday in Geneva, Switzerland, is designed to be highly technical—to see whether Communists and Western experts can agree on the requirements of a workable inspection arrangement.

If the meeting makes progress, officials indicated, the United States is prepared to provide the Soviets with some now-secret information about radar and probably other devices which could be used in detecting military mobilization moves, missile and aircraft flights and the like.

Woman Rides Bus Sans Clothing

TORONTO, Ont. (AP)—Wearing a pair of glasses and nothing else, a woman boarded a bus in Toronto's East End, rode a dozen blocks without a word and got off.

The driver told police the woman appeared to be about 35 and completely at ease. She paid no attention to his look of surprise.

Police were unable to find the woman. The temperature was 40 degrees.

Harrison Likes It Lonely While Other Stars Cluster

LONDON (AP)—Rex Harrison, who indicated he just wants to be alone, got a private dressing room today and a "Mr." on the door for tonight's royal command variety performance.

Ten other big male stars, including master of ceremonies Max Bygraves and America's singing star Pat Boone, found themselves herded together in dressing room No. 2.

There were plenty of arched eyebrows in private among the scores of artists taking part in tonight's show before Queen Elizabeth, Prince Philip, Princess Margaret and Queen Mother Elizabeth.

But no one ventured a complaint.

One of the producers of the show at the Coliseum Theater explained the situation: "He (Harrison) is generally regarded as being a trifle temperamental—some big stars are, you know. We don't want any last minute hitches, especially over who should share his dressing room."

Harrison, who acts his way through the songs of "My Fair Lady," will rush over from the Drury Lane theater with other members of the cast after his own show to wind up the royal show.

So dressing room No. 1 will be empty most of the night anyway.

Crowded into No. 2 are many leading lights in the British vaudeville world. They include Stanley Holloway, who is a co-star of Harrison's in "My Fair Lady."

Bygraves, a jolly sort, said he had taken it for granted Harrison would be with all the boys in Room 2.

"What everyone should realize is that this is a charity show and we are all mucking in together," he commented—and that was all.

"What does it matter, anyway?" asked Boone.
