## Police Report Traffic Mishap

A two-car collision on South Sixth Street was reported to city police Sunday evening by Cyril L. Cook, 2415 Ward Street, driver of one of the cars. Cook said that he was traveling east when a pickup pulled in front of him from off the street, so that he could not avoid hitting it.

Cook reported that after the collision the pickup turned west on South Sixth and drove off, taking a right turn onto Division Street, a short distance from the scene of the accident.

On the basis of Cook's report, the police traced the pickup. Some hours after the accident they arrested Don C. Fernando, 45, Chiloquin, whom they charged with failure to leave his name at the scene of an accident, and failure to yield the right of way. Fernando was sentenced to pay a fine of \$25 or to spend 12½ days in jail on the first charge, and to \$15 or seven and a half days on the second, in municipal court Monday.

**Board Mulls Porky Bounty**  
YREKA — A suggestion to place a 50 cent bounty on porcupines to curtail damage to young timber caused by the animals, was taken into consideration by the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors at a meeting held last week at Yreka.

The board also adopted a recommendation made by Siskiyou County Road Commissioner Al Powers for a 30-mile per hour speed limit on part of Pondosa Way.

Other action taken by the board was the authorization for installing stop signs at Lassen Lane and Douglas Way in the Mount Shasta area.

It was reported by the Siskiyou County agricultural commissioner, Jess Grisham, that \$5,956 in prize money was received at the state and Los Angeles County fairs, while the cost of the exhibits to the county was \$3,203 over the prize receipts.

**Dunsmuir House Razed By Fire**  
DUNSMUIR — An old two-story house, known as the old 600 ranch, was destroyed by fire early Friday evening.

The Richard Price family lived in the seven-room frame residence but Price had just taken his wife and four children to McCloud for a Halloween celebration when the fire broke out. They lost their furniture, clothing and other possessions.

The house, located just outside the city limits on River Avenue, was past saving when firemen were summoned. The U.S. Forest Service and Dunsmuir Volunteer Fire Department stood by to see the fire did not spread to trees and nearby buildings. A light drizzle also kept the fire from spreading, firemen said.

The building, reduced to smoldering rubble, was owned by the Barney Fay estate.

## Artists Name KF Woman As Art Week Chairman

A recent telephone call from Mrs. Hiram B. D. Balauvelt in New York City, national director of the 28th Annual American Art Week, to Mrs. Walter Brown, Klamath Falls, president of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, has resulted in the appointment of Mrs. Colista Dowling (Eugene H.), Oregon artist, as state chairman for American Art Week to be held in Oregon November 1 through 7. Her name will be sent to President Eisenhower with those of other state chairmen.

For the past 28 years, the president of the United States has proclaimed American Art Week and Oregon's artists have observed the occasion with numerous activities drawing attention to this important phase of culture in Oregon.

Mrs. Colista Dowling, since arriving as a child from the Midwest, has spent her life in Oregon in the art world. She is a noted Oregon artist specializing in portraiture, murals, and book illustrations. Her murals grace several Portland churches, many homes, and the Portland Woman's Club newly decorated clubrooms. She has illustrated many books including most recently Elizabeth Lambert Wood's "Cougars Pass," Abigail Wells' "Trundle Tales," a child's book of poems, as well as Kelsey Osborne's "Peaceful Conquest."

Known by many in organizations throughout Oregon, she is a long time member of the Oregon Society of Artists, is Portland Federation of Women's Organizations art chairman in the Fine Arts Department, art chairman of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, and is a member of the Portland Woman's Club, Cotarie, and Mazamas.

Mrs. Dowling has selected as her Oregon Federation of Women's Organizations Committee for the celebration of National Art Week, Mrs. James A. Hazelwood, J. P. Kirwan, William W. Waller, and John R. Leach.

Events planned by this group are radio, television and newspaper coverage to announce Art Week; the Oregon Society of Artists Art Bazaar being held in Portland November 3-7 at 1031 S. W. Morrison; the Allied Arts and Metal Guild Tea scheduled for November 15, 2-5 p.m. at 630 N. E. Halliday Street, Portland.
